Summary of Evaluation:

<u>Teaching:</u> Professor Chenoweth is rated excellent in teaching. He has taught six courses, including Introduction to Anthropology, Introduction to Archaeology, Prehistoric Archaeology, Cultural Ecology and Evolution, Who Owns the Past?, and Archaeological Field School. Three of these courses were brought to the university by Professor Chenoweth. In addition, three were adapted into online or hybrid courses. Professor Chenoweth consistently receives very solid student evaluation ratings, with his courses averaging 4.28 on the instructor rating. His courses are well-structured and are geared around critical thinking assignments. He is a highly engaged teacher who challenges students in the classroom. Based on their observations of Professor Chenoweth's classes, the faculty concur that he is an effective and valuable instructor.

Research: Professor Chenoweth is rated excellent in research. During his four years at UM- Dearborn, he has published one monograph, a co-edited volume, has another edited volume under contract with an expected 2019 publication, and has also edited a three-volume handbook. He has also published four articles (two of which are in the flagship journal *American Anthropologist*), and five book chapters. Professor Chenoweth's research focuses on how religious groups work through material culture. He examines how communities are created through practice and the material culture involved in those identifications. Most of his work has been on the Religious Society of Friends—known as "Quakers"—and how the Quaker community dealt with conflicting influences and priorities while maintaining a global sense of self. He has also studied sites in the Caribbean, initially focusing on Quakerism in the British Virgin Islands where the group's ideals directly conflicted with racial identifications and an economic system centered on race-based slavery. His research has significant implications for how we understand religious practice and identify.

Service: Professor Chenoweth is rated excellent in his service. He has spent significant time working on the development of the anthropology discipline, including creating an archaeology curriculum and establishing facilities and resources for that program. Professor Chenoweth was heavily involved in the Anthropology Internal Review and External Review in 2017. He has served on two search committees for tenure-track anthropology faculty. These contributions are vitally important in the basic running of the small discipline. He has served on the Department Executive Committee and College Curriculum Committee. He has been the chair of the Development Committee for the Society for Historical Archaeology and was elected by its membership to the Nominations and Elections committee. In summary, he is a valued colleague and makes significant contributions both inside and outside the university.

He has demonstrated a sound development of his Caribbean research over the period he has been a faculty member at the University of Michigan-Dearborn, and he has demonstrated evidence of new work focused primarily on contemporary archaeology. His work is securing visibility in historical archaeology and there is no reason to believe that he will not continue to grow as a scholar."

Reviewer E: "Dr. Chenoweth is producing both a quantity and quality of scholarship that at a minimum holds its own with his peers and realistically has out produced most of his peers. I really do not see any cause for concern with his scholarship. I think he has clearly distinguished himself in the field of historical archaeology and is someone who I consider to be a rising star in the field."

He balances theoretically sophisticated work with practical application and traces threads of religious practice and identity across time and space, ensuring relevance as he breaks new and important scholarly ground."
