Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir


Kathryn Moseley, M.D., M.P.H., clinical assistant professor of pediatrics and communicable diseases in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on May 31, 2016.

Dr. Moseley received her A.B. (1974) degree from Harvard University and her M.D. (1978) and M.P.H. (2009) degrees from the University of Michigan. She completed her pediatric internship (1978-79) at the University of Texas at Houston, her pediatric residency training (1979-80) and general surgery residency training (1980-81) at the Henry Ford Hospital, and her neonatology fellowship (1981-83) at the Children's Hospital of Michigan. She joined the University of Michigan faculty as a lecturer in 2002, and was promoted to assistant professor in 2006, and clinical assistant professor in 2014.

An exceptional clinician and research scientist, Dr. Moseley is a leader in the fields of bioethics, neonatology, primary care pediatrics, health disparities, and health services research. For eleven years, Dr. Moseley was the director of bioethics for the Henry Ford Health System in Detroit, Michigan, overseeing a busy ethics consultation service. She joined the University of Michigan in 2002 with a joint appointment in the Program in Bioethics and the Child Health Evaluation and Research Unit to conduct research on the racial differences in health care decision-making she discovered doing clinical ethics consultations and how those decisions are impacted by culture and trust. She recently received a \$2.1 million grant from the National Institutes of Health to conduct a 5-year trial of a culturally-tailored intervention to decrease the incidence of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome in the African American community. She also co-chaired the Pediatric Ethics Committee and directed the ethics consultation service at the C.S. Mott Children's Hospital.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **Kathryn Moseley, clinical assistant professor emerita of pediatrics and communicable diseases.**
