I am pleased and honored to submit the following report to you on behalf of the Central Student Government (CSG). Below is an update on CSG's ongoing and recent projects as we continue to serve the students of this University.

Ongoing CSG Projects

- The Association of Big Ten Students (ABTS) Summer Conference:
 - Last weekend, CSG welcomed over 70 delegates from all 14 Big Ten Schools to our Ann Arbor campus. The delegates included the student body president, vice president, executive team members, and elected representatives from each institution. The summer conference serves as an opportunity for information sharing, networking, cross-campus collaboration, and empowering the collective Big Ten student voice. The conference also included keynote addresses from Congresswoman Debbie Dingell, Dean Laura Jones, and President Schlissel. Ultimately, the Michigan delegation hosted a successful conference, and CSG looks forward to its continued participation in ABTS.
- New Executive Team Positions:
 - Central Student Government will soon announce the addition of a chief diversity officer and external relations officers to the executive team. The executive team created the new positions with hopes to improve student organization collaboration and communication while ensuring CSG improved its effort in encouraging student organizations to fulfill the objectives of the DEI plan. The new positions and the 2018-2019 executive commissions will be announced in an email to the student body in August.
- Summer Assembly Fund Distribution
 - The Summer Assembly allocated \$10,000 during the Spring 2018 and Summer 2018 terms. The funding helped registered student organizations pursue summer programming, including on-campus events and national conferences. Some of the student organizations funded include Detroit Urban Debate Education, Men's Rowing, Bridges of Disciplines, and Michigan Sahana. CSG will return to its regular funding disbursement cycles through Student Organization Funding Committee (SOFC) in the Fall.
- CSG Welcome to Michigan Programming
 - Central Student Government will host its annual Pride Outside: LGBTQ Welcome on Labor Day as a part of the Welcome to Michigan programming. The annual event is conjunction with the Spectrum Center and O-STEM. Additionally, CSG will host its firstever nontraditional student welcome the third week of fall semester. The event targets students including, but not limited to, transfer students, first generation students, international students and student parents. A specific date a location will be announced in the coming weeks.
