Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir

Randall K. Ten Haken, Ph.D., professor of radiation oncology in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on January 31, 2022.

Professor Ten Haken received his B.S. degree in applied mathematics and engineering physics and his Ph.D. degree in nuclear physics from the University of Wisconsin, Madison in 1972 and 1978, respectively. He began his academic career as an adjunct assistant professor at the Rush College of Health Sciences in 1983. He joined the University of Michigan faculty as an assistant professor of radiation oncology in 1984, and was promoted to associate professor in 1989, and professor in 1996. Professor Ten Haken also served as an associate professor of radiological health, environmental and industrial health from 1995-2006 and adjunct professor of nuclear engineering and radiological sciences from 2001-11.

Professor Ten Haken published well over 250 articles in scientific peer-reviewed journals, presented more than 120 extramural invited presentations, and authored more than 50 book chapters. His work has supported state-of-the-art patient care and continued improvements in radiation treatment planning. Professor Ten Haken has been a valued educator throughout his career and frequent invited speaker while remaining active with local, national and international committees and service. He was awarded the William D. Coolidge Gold Medal from the American Association of Physicists in Medicine, the highest honor in the field, in 2020.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming Randall K. Ten Haken, professor emeritus of radiation oncology.
