Subject: Central Student Government (CSG) Regent Report February 2025

President Grasso, Members of the Board of Regents, and Executive Officers of the University, it is my pleasure to submit the following report.

---

It is an honor to present this report on behalf of the student body, as well as my partner and President, Eric Veal Jr., who sends his regards. For those whom I have not yet had the pleasure of meeting, my name is Lucas Korn, and I serve as the Vice President of Central Student Government.

As we move through the winter semester, the Executive, Assembly, and Judiciary of Central Student Government continue to advance our shared commitment to accessibility, inclusion, and student engagement. Building on the strong foundation established during the fall semester, our administration has remained focused on institutionalizing student voice within University governance while delivering tangible programs and resources that directly support students' academic, professional, and personal well-being.

The fall semester marked a period of significant growth and momentum for CSG. During the opening months of the academic year, our administration prioritized meeting students where they were and introducing them to the resources, services, and opportunities available through the student government. Through events such as Festifall, Pie-A-Rep, Pride Outside, Welcome Week, Town Halls, Scavenger Hunts, Trivia, and more, CSG engaged hundreds of students and gathered valuable feedback that helped shape our policy agenda for the year.

As the semester progressed, CSG shifted from outreach toward institutionalizing student engagement. We launched 2 cornerstone initiatives, the Bridge Program and the Diplomatic Corps, designed to place student organizations and student perspectives at the center of University dialogue. Through regular consultation with student organization leaders, these programs created a sustainable, two-way communication channel between students and decision-makers, ensuring that advocacy efforts are informed by lived student experiences across schools, colleges, and identities. Complementing this work, we expanded our focus on first-year engagement through the development of the First-Year Advisory Council, designed to elevate early student voices and strengthen leadership pipelines within student government.

Programming during the fall semester reflected our commitment to wellness, inclusion, and community-building. Our Speaker Series brought nationally recognized advocates and alumni

leaders to campus to engage students in conversations around mental health, advocacy, and leadership. We partnered with CAPS to host Fresh Check Day on the Diag, creating a visible and accessible space for mental health education, and hosted a range of community-centered events, including the Pickleball Tournament, the Hail-O-Ween 5K, Maize & Blazers in collaboration with the University Career Center, and a housing resources panel co-hosted with Beyond the Diag and Student Legal Services. Together, these initiatives underscored our belief that student engagement must extend beyond policy to include care, connection, and access.

As we move further into the winter semester, CSG's Executive, Assembly, and Judiciary have continued to advance our shared commitment to accessibility, student engagement, and impactful programming. Building on the strong momentum established during the fall semester, our administration has remained focused on delivering initiatives that meaningfully support students' experiences at this great institution.

Throughout the early part of the second semester, CSG has launched and expanded initiatives designed to improve access to essential resources. Notably, the Grocery Bus Program, a free CSG-sponsored bus from campus to Trader Joe's, was successfully implemented by our policy team, increasing students' access to affordable groceries. In addition, CSG began distributing free LSAT, MCAT, and GMAT test preparation materials from The Princeton Review, ensuring that students pursuing graduate and professional education have equitable access to critical academic resources.

CSG has also continued to prioritize student-facing programming that fosters community, wellness, and civic engagement. We hosted a well-attended town hall with Congresswoman Debbie Dingell, which provided students with a valuable opportunity to engage directly with federal leadership through thoughtful dialogue and discussion. Building on first-semester successes, we reprised our Pickleball Tournament and Maize and Blazers, in collaboration with the University Career Center, where students can build their professional wardrobe with no cost.

In February, CSG hosted Night at the Museum at the Kelsey Museum of Archaeology, providing students with after-hours guided tours. We also continued our flagship sustainability initiative, Go Blue Goes Green, which invited students to donate clothing that was transformed into a free thrifting pop-up at the Michigan Union.

Recognizing the academic pressures of the semester, CSG emphasized wellness and stress-relief programming through events such as the Self-Care and Stuff-A-Bear event, bracelet-making programming, and additional opportunities designed to support student well-being.

Additionally, CSG has continued its support of the Big Hearts Blood Battle, an intercollegiate blood donation initiative running through late February that encourages civic engagement and life-saving public health participation.

Beyond programming, CSG is sponsoring Airbus transportation for Spring Break, providing affordable and reliable transit to and from Detroit Metropolitan Airport. This initiative reflects our continued commitment to reducing financial and logistical barriers for students.

As we move into the second half of the semester, CSG remains focused on sustaining high-impact programs, expanding access to resources, and strengthening collaboration with campus partners and University leadership. These efforts continue to reflect our belief in student government as a conduit for advocacy, service, and meaningful engagement.

We are deeply grateful for the continued collaboration and support of the Board of Regents and University administration. We look forward to continuing this partnership and ensuring that student voices remain central to the University's mission and direction.

**Completed Initiatives:**

*Hope for Holidays:* In late November, the Student Government collaborated with Staff Senate and the Department of Public Safety to support the campus pantry and adopt two local families, demonstrating our commitment to community well-being. With support from Walmart and Lowe's, and DPS Chief Tennies' student-first partnership, we provided essential items and resources to make the season brighter for those in need.

*Senate Resolution:* Student Support & Community Dialogue. In line with this resolution, the student government is organizing a community dialogue on February 10th to promote understanding and engagement, inviting community members to participate.

**Ongoing initiatives:**

*All-Michigan Student Government Conference:* We are planning to host an all-Michigan student government conference at the University of Michigan-Dearborn on March 21, 2026, bringing student leaders from across the state together for collaboration and shared advocacy. This upcoming event reflects our dedication to fostering leadership and unity among student governments statewide, encouraging pride in our collective efforts.

*Ramadan Goodie Bags:* As Ramadan approaches, we are preparing our annual on-campus goodie bags so that fasting students can break their fast with greater convenience.

**Conclusion:** The Student Government remains steadfast in serving and representing our students. We look forward to building on this momentum throughout the semester.
