Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching – Dr. Schaefer has a solid record as a fine teacher at the University of Michigan-Flint, and at prior institutions. In three semesters she has taught six different preparations, advised extensively, participated in general education reform efforts and proven herself to be a committed and exacting teacher.

Research – Dr. Schaefer is a significant, emerging scholar in the field of critical criminology. Over a six year period she has published six articles, five of them in peer-reviewed journals, one in an edited collection. In the past eight years she has nineteen presentations at academic conferences. Peer evaluation of Dr. Schaefer's scholarship confirms both the high quality and significance of her work, and also her promise of future productivity.
