Summary of Evaluation

<u>Teaching</u>: Professor Scott DeGregorio's teaching is rated as excellent. He has taught twelve different English courses since coming to the UM-Dearborn. Professor DeGregorio has also developed and taught four new courses for the English curriculum. He has also taught a graduate course at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. A faculty observer of his teaching noted that his courses are well designed; his assignments are appropriate and challenging, designed to foster critical engagement with each course's texts and ideas; and his web pages constitute an extensive, useful resource that is incorporated actively into the class. The majority of students in his courses praise Professor DeGregorio's knowledge and enthusiasm. Students frequently commented favorably as well on the attractive, well-designed web pages created for each course. Students often noted that he is a challenging teacher, but one who makes them rise to his expectations.

<u>Research</u>: Professor DeGregorio's research is rated as excellent. He has achieved an outstanding publication record since his appointment at UM-Dearborn, including two books, ten scholarly articles in top tier peer reviewed journals, and twelve book reviews. This is truly substantial scholarship not only in quantity but, as the reviewers emphasize, in quality as well. Professor DeGregorio has already achieved a reputation in his field as a top notch scholar whose contributions are truly impressive.

He has served as English discipline representative on the Humanities Department Executive Committee, and has been a member of four faculty search committees. In addition, he developed the web page for the English discipline and served as a member of the discipline's curriculum committee. Professor DeGregorio has shown that he is available and committed to service at the discipline and department levels.
