Summary of Evaluation

Teaching – Since his arrival at the University of Michigan-Flint, Professor Kupperman has taught twenty sections of five different undergraduate courses, eighteen sections of eight graduate courses, and twenty-one independent study courses. In every course he has taught, student evaluations have rarely fallen below the highest ranking. Student evaluators frequently comment on his positive and supportive demeanor, his knowledge of his subject, and his love of teaching. Faculty colleagues who have observed his classes have been similarly impressed by his ability to engage students in the very methods they will be expected to utilize in their own classrooms. They note that he is well-organized, provides clear and interesting presentations, fosters constructive interaction, and models excellent teaching techniques.

Research – Professor Kupperman's research interests are situated throughout the field of education. He has seven publications in print. Five of the publications in print are in refereed journals. He is co-founder and co-chief editor of *THEN:* A Journal of Technology, Humanities, Education and Narrative. He has made twenty-nine presentations at state, national and international conferences. He has developed and implemented the Technology in Education Master of Arts specialization. He has developed and implemented the Technology in Education Global Program.

"Dr. Kupperman's work in the founding and editorship of the online journal *THEN: Technology, Humanities, Education and Narrative* fits the Boyer component of scholarship of teaching, which educates and invigorates future scholars by effective communication of a core of significant knowledge. Lest it appear that Dr. Kupperman has ignored the traditional notion of the 'scholarship of discovery,' a concept akin to traditional research, I have noted he has co-authored significant articles published in well known peer reviewed journals, such as *Journal of Educational Computing Research, Journal of Learning Sciences, Journal of Research on Technology in Education,* and *International Journal of Learning* (primary author)."
