# Summary of Evaluation:

Professor Rahman is rated excellent in teaching. He has provided two new Teaching: courses for the History and African and African-American curricula. He covers both American and African history (a unique combination that derives from his research expertise in African diaspora studies) at both the survey and upper-division levels. Student evaluations of his teaching are quite positive. On average, students rated him 4.48 as an instructor, with 5 being the highest. Students' overall evaluation of Professor Rahman's courses average 4.45. Students are both challenged and impressed by him, and we see their appreciation for his commitment to teaching and his philosophy. Professor Rahman views the teaching of history as not just a personal passion, but also as a social duty to inform. In this light, he has developed from experience various ways to teach history so that it broadens students' minds to the fullest degree during the hours they spend in his classroom. Using the dialectical method of Hegel, he has sought to help students arrive at what they see to be "true" amidst a flurry of interpretations of various historical data. This approach is reflected in the diverse and challenging assignments Professor Rahman requires from his students: group cooperation, group and individual tests, and written assignments based on examinations of first person accounts from various historical periods. Both his teaching methods and philosophy represent models for excellence in teaching according to the common standards formally adopted by the history discipline in 2005.

<u>Research:</u> Professor Rahman's research is rated excellent. For the history discipline, the gold standard for promotion from assistant to associate professor is a peer-reviewed, booklength, research monograph, rather than a series of articles. This is not an idiosyncratic approach by the History Discipline at UM-Dearborn, but represents the standard in the field of history

generally. Professor Rahman's book, *The Regime Change of Kwame Nkrumah: Epic Heroism in Africa and the Diaspora*, is the centerpiece of his research case. It is a careful study, based on archival research and interviews, and well situated within the new historiography of African American Diaspora studies. The high quality of this work, as much as the very rapid pace in which Professor Rahman was able to bring his work to publication, is clear evidence of excellent performance as a researcher. In addition, his new book chapter, "Marching Blind: The Rise and Fall of the Black Panther Party in Detroit, 1942-1971," in *Liberated Territory: Untold Local Perspectives on the Black Panther Party*, anticipates his book-length project of the same title, and so, prospects for his future research productivity are excellent.

Service: Professor Rahman's service is rated significantly capable. He has shown a dedication to campus-wide and college-wide service that is both unusual in an assistant professor and impressive. In his more than four years on this campus, he has served on the University Budget Committee, Faculty Senate, and the African/African American Studies and Criminal Justice Advisory Boards. In addition as a faculty advisor in CASL and mentor for the Women's Resource Center Program, Professor Rahman has engaged in service that provides the most direct and beneficial influence a professor can have with students outside of the classroom.
