Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching: Described as intelligent, enthusiastic, charismatic and inspiring, Professor Castro is well on her way to becoming one of the most effective teachers at the School. She has a high level of rhetorical skills combined with a flair for engaging her audience. She has a natural ability to connect with undergraduates and graduates alike as evidenced in the high rankings of her course evaluations. Professor Castro teaches an exceptional range of topics, and has added to the Department of Musicology's curricular offerings by developing courses in world music, the music of Latin America and the Caribbean, and the music of Asia. This wide spectrum of courses is supported by a full collection of multimedia pedagogical tools as well as by her own performance examples. Professor Castro's courses are in high demand by graduates and undergraduates, and there is no doubt that she has made a lasting and positive impression on them.

<u>Professional Activities</u>: Professor Castro is a scholar of the musical cultures of the Philippines and Filipino Americans, and in the theoretical areas of nationalism, identity, and cultural politics. Her recent scholarly work, *Musical Renderings of the Philippine Nation*, is under contract by Oxford University Press. The external reviewers view this work as a landmark publication for Filipino musical research. In addition to this book, she has several articles in progress. Professor Castro has published in very prestigious and select journals, and she shows every promise of continuing to make significant scholarly contributions to her field. Her leadership of (and compositions for) several Filipino rondalla ensembles enhance her scholarly work and her teaching. Her combination of intelligence, charisma, and oratory make her a sought-after speaker at numerous conferences here and abroad.

Service: Professor Castro renders an exceptionally high level of service to the department, School, University and her profession. Within the Department of Musicology, she is a member of the Graduate Committee, the Lecture Committee, and the Ethnomusicology Exams Committee. She is also the editor of the newsletter *Ethnomusicology at UM*, the curator of the Musicology Lab, and the Department's web master. Her service to the School has included participation on a faculty search committee, membership on the undergraduate curriculum, and alternate membership on the graduate curriculum committee. Within the University of Michigan, Professor Castro has served the Center for Southeast Asian Studies with an elected term on the Center's Executive Committee and membership on the Center's Undergraduate Language Scholarship Committee. She has served on the International Institute's Fulbright interviews committee. Professor Castro's service to her profession is also remarkable; she is currently serving as an elected council member of her national professional organization, the Society for Ethnomusicology, and as a member of the program committee for the next national meeting. Then again, she has served on (or chaired) program committees for chapter meetings of the Society on three occasions since 2001.
