Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching – Professor Fox is a committed and successful teacher at all levels. As an undergraduate classroom teacher he has had a solid performance with a diverse portfolio of courses. He has had even better success at the graduate level. Professor Fox is well integrated into Ph.D. advising. He served two doctoral committees last year and is currently serving (chair of one) on five committees.

Research – Professor Fox’s research is in the field of empirical industrial organization (IO), which combines models and data to better understand the functioning of markets. Although many empirical IO researchers are applied, his research agenda is more methodologically oriented in that he focuses on the process by which models are combined with data. Professor Fox has compiled an impressive publication record. He has two papers in the top general-interest journals and several in the top specialty journals. His research has relevance for regulation policy in a wide range of sectors and he has found a broad and attentive audience. Professor Fox has received three grants – the most recent one is a joint project with a faculty member in the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science

Service – Professor Fox has provided exemplary service to the university and to his profession. In the department he was a member of two committees and he organized a departmental seminar.

He has served as associate editor for three journals and he does a large amount of refereeing at the best journals. He received an excellence in refereeing award from the *American Economic Review* in 2012. He also co-organized or has been on the scientific committees for six conferences in the past five years.

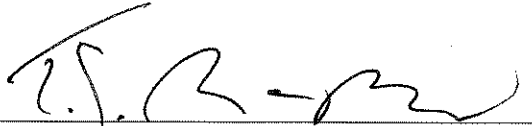
