Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching: Professor Kim Killu is rated excellent in teaching. Since her promotion to associate professor, Professor Killu has authored and taught 10 different courses, six of which were new online courses, initiated two new undergraduate program majors in emotional impairments and cognitive impairments, and participated in the development of the Master of Education in Special Education, university's first online master's degree. She has supervised 45 independent study students (EDK 680) and has served as the faculty advisor for one-half of the students in the special education program. Professor Killu and the courses that she teaches are highly rated by students, consistently above the college's mean rating. Student comments indicate that her courses are academically challenging, yet practically applicable and useful, and they offer many opportunities for students to engage actively with the content. Professor Killu has maintained an exemplary record of teaching that serves as a model for colleagues and current teachers, and for the new teachers she prepares.

Research/Scholarship: Professor Kim Killu is rated significantly capable in scholarship. Since Professor Killu's promotion to associate professor in 2002, she has been actively engaged in scholarship related to the study of emotional impairments, mental health, and the inclusion of persons with disabilities in mainstream educational settings. She has published six articles in refereed journals and one invited article in *Educational Leadership*, the flagship journal of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development. Professor Killu's articles have appeared in major special education journals with low acceptance rates. She has also published three book chapters, co-edited a book, served as participating co-investigator on three externally funded grants, and presented numerous refereed papers at prestigious state, national, and international conferences.

Professor Killu's record of excellent service demonstrates not only her strong commitment to the college, university, and community but also the high regard her colleagues have for her.
