#### Summary of Evaluation:

<u>Teaching</u> – Professor Wang is a committed teacher who routinely teaches two courses in Women's Studies annually. Her teaching broadly covers topics on gender in modern Chinese history and global feminisms. In addition, she recently developed a new core course for Women's Studies minors entitled "Gender, Race, and Nation." As a testament to her teaching impact, graduate students in one of her classes mobilized themselves to form the Center for Chinese Studies' Interdisciplinary Workshop, providing an opportunity for peer review of worksin-progress.

<u>Research</u> – Professor Wang has been a remarkably prodigious scholar who has established herself as one of the leading scholars on feminism in twentieth-century China. Her forthcoming book, <u>Finding Women in the State</u>, makes a critically significant contribution by highlighting the roles played by women and feminist activists in China's socialist movement. She has received funding for her work from a variety of prestigious organizations, including three awards from the Henry Luce Foundation and six awards from the Ford Foundation, among others. Taken together, Professor Wang's scholarship is marked by in-depth archival research, broadly creative use of historical cultural material, and a tenacious determination to uncover the stories of

feminist activists in modern Chinese history and the feminist agenda they promoted.

Since 2005, she has co-directed the Fudan Joint Institute for Gender Studies at Fudan University, involving numerous Michigan faculty members and graduate students in cross-cultural exchanges of teaching and scholarship.
