# Summary of Evaluation:

<u>Teaching</u> – Professor Zhukov has taught very well-received courses on modern warfare, political economy of Russia and Eurasia, empirical models of conflict, and security studies. He has advised a number of senior thesis students and has served on fifteen dissertation committees. He has also chaired or co-chaired four dissertation committees since he joined the department in 2014.

<u>Research</u> – Professor Zhukov has created the empirical basis for understanding civil conflicts and state repression. This meticulous work has overturned conventional wisdom about the logic of violence in civil war. He has built an empirical portrait of Islamic insurgents, replacing previous speculation. He has also built a new empirical foundation for the study of the legacies of violence.
