Summary of Evaluation:

<u>Teaching</u>: Professor Lahiri's teaching is characterized by its range and creativity across different levels of the curriculum and across genres and fields. She teaches courses in Anglophone and global literary studies, post-colonial studies and Bollywood cinema. Her numerical scores on student evaluations are consistently above the school- and university-wide medians. Her courses are of interest not only to students in English but also to those in South Asian Studies and in the Department of Film, Television and Media. Two of her courses fulfill the college's Race and Ethnicity requirement and she is a much sought out mentor by a diverse range of students. Equally impressive is the work she has done with Honors students, having supervised five theses, served on the Honors committee, and read a thesis each year that she has been at UM. Likewise, she has mentored and served on the dissertation committees of Humanities graduate students.

Research: Professor Lahiri's research situates itself in multilingual environments through and against official, imperial English, while rendering a complex and agile account of many vectors of such transmission, including: print internationalism, the vernacular and the classical, the national, transnational, and the supranational, neologisms, critical race theory, translation, and language politics among others. Professor Lahiri's significant publications include her monograph Imperfect Solidarities: Tagore, Gandhi, Du Bois, and the Global Anglophone (2020), as well as four peer-reviewed articles. She has also published a number of shorter articles and reviews. The articles are in journals such as *Interventions*, *Comparative Literature*, and *Black Camera*—all considered premier journals in their respective fields. The monograph is published

as part of the prestigious Flashpoints series at Northwestern University Press. Professor Lahiri's book and her articles have been recognized by scholars to have shifted the debates and brought new energies and attention to the field of postcolonial studies.

Service: Professor Lahiri served for two years on the department's highly-demanding executive committee. She also has served as a mentor for the MICCHERS program for three years and served on English's graduate admissions committee for two years. Beyond the department, Professor Lahiri has mentored students, organized symposia (e.g., one through South Asian studies on Bollywood cinema) and hosted guest speakers. She has served on editorial boards of journals on a national and international level, and all indications are she will engage further with the profession at large with her promotion and the recent publication of her book.
