# Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching: Professor Hyde is a stellar instructor and mentor, with ratings that are invariably superb and glowing letters from students. His large lecture course and the senior seminar he has developed receive remarkably high ratings from students on the evaluations. He taught Introduction to Psychopathology with ratings of 4.9 in winter 2020 (self-reported due to COVID). His senior seminar received perfect 5.0s for both Q1 and Q2. He is an exceptional mentor. Since 2018, he has mentored thirty-five undergrads and supervised two honors theses with one winning the Pillsbury Prize (for the best Honors Thesis in Psychology). He offers information sessions to undergraduates about graduate and professional schools and other opportunities. His approach to mentoring undergraduates is highly valued, with five going onto post-baccalaureate Intramural Research Training Awards at NIH, six in Ph.D. programs in psychology, and many others in medical school and social work programs. For graduate student mentoring, Professor Hyde has chaired four Ph.D. dissertations and served on committees of three more. Thanks to his effective mentoring, three of his trainees have excellent faculty positions (Penn, Maryland, St. John's) and a graduate student is a post-doctoral scholar at Harvard.

<u>Research</u>: Professor Hyde's research examines youth and families from a developmental psychopathology perspective, with three objectives: 1) to understand the development of psychopathology, especially youth antisocial behavior, by integrating biological and contextual factors across development; 2) to build and test models of genetics and brain that also consider ecological variables and development; and 3) to understand how adversity affects the developing brain. His research emphasizes understanding these questions in those at most risk, such as children

and families from low-income conditions. Youth antisocial behavior is a major public health concern. Yet, effective treatment and prevention of antisocial behavior is challenging, working only for some youth and families and with time-limited gains. This may be due to heterogeneity of the antisocial behavior diagnosis, a lack of understanding of specific risk factors, and the various contexts within which these behaviors emerge. Professor Hyde's research addresses these shortcomings via detailed examination of developmental contexts, sophisticated analytic procedures, neuroimaging, and genomics. Professor Hyde has published 112 articles, including fifty-three since his tenure review. Moreover, since his tenure review, he has received many prestigious awards and has been very successful in obtaining funding support for his research.

<u>Service</u>: Professor Hyde has been an exceptional citizen since arriving at the UM, but his service and leadership have increased markedly since 2018. In the department, he provides valuable service to the clinical science area, chairing the graduate admissions committee. In 2015 and 2020, Professor Hyde played a key role in conceptualizing and writing the five-year renewal for the Developmental Psychology NIH training grant which was successfully funded both years. University-level service includes: election to the Faculty Senate Assembly, service on the Rackham Task Force on grad student mental health, and representing the views of the faculty by serving on an advisory committee to the UM president and provost in their response to the COVID-19 pandemic. He is now a faculty representative for the Advisory Board on Intercollegiate Athletics and the Academic Performance Committee, and he is on the faculty search committee for the Institute for Firearm Injury Prevention. Professor Hyde frequently participates on NIH study section panels, serving on seven study sections—including chairing one—since 2018, and he is now a standing study section member. He has served as editorial board member and consulting editor for well-regarded journals and been awarded for his detailed and thorough manuscript reviews.

Hyde be promoted to the rank of professor of psychology, with tenure, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts.
