#### <u>Summary of Evaluation</u>:

<u>Teaching</u>: Professor León Crespo is an accomplished and inspiring teacher and mentor who has found ways to share her specialist knowledge of modern Latin American architecture, theory, and transnational modernisms, along with her commitments to decoloniality and feminist thought, in an accessible manner to a diverse student body. Her pedagogical strategies focus on collaboration and active engagement, encouraging students to gain a broader understanding of the Western Hemisphere and to reconsider their place in it. She is currently serving on four dissertation committees.

Research: Professor León Crespo has an accomplished record of published, forthcoming, and completed works of scholarship, including a book and numerous articles. They reflect deep research, a close attention to artistic, intellectual, and political connections and contexts, a serious engagement with theory in the humanities, and fine readings of primary material, be it buildings, plans, spaces, texts, images, or films. She is especially skillful in bringing out revealing "echoes" between institutions and in drawing out the connections between architecture and politics. She also has made a significant contribution to globalizing studies in modern architecture and to exploring the intersection of architecture and discourses of decoloniality.

Service: Professor León Crespo is an outstanding citizen of the profession and her two departments. Her activity in the governance of both History of Art and Romance Languages and Literatures has helped to bring together scholarship, teaching, and service in order to broaden diversity and inclusion at all levels. Since her arrival in 2015, she has organized over twenty scholarly and teaching events, including regular conference panels and several workshops on anti-racist and decolonizing methodologies; feminist pedagogies to teach the foundations of collaboration, intersectionality and empowerment; and Latin American architectural history from the perspective of the South.

Professor León Crespo's scholarly productivity is high, and she is making significant contributions to the fields of architectural studies, urban studies, and cultural studies, with wellrespected publications in English and Spanish. She has proven herself to be an excellent and creative teacher, and already has established a strong record of service and leadership in her two departments and scholarly fields. For these reasons, the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts and I recommend that Assistant Professor Ana María León Crespo be promoted to the rank of associate professor of history of art, with tenure, associate professor of romance languages and literatures, with tenure, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, and associate professor of architecture, without tenure, A. Alfred Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning.
