On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of Philosophy and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Gordon Belot as professor of philosophy, with tenure, effective September 1, 2008.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Gordon Belot attended the University of Toronto where received his Bachelor of Science in 1991 and Master of Science in 1993. He completed his Doctorate at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Following a two-year appointment as a postdoctoral scholar at the University of Pittsburgh, Professor Belot began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Princeton University. He was appointed as an associate professor at New York University in 1999 and a tenured associate professor at the University of Pittsburgh in 2004.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Belot is among the top philosophers of science of his generation. He writes on difficult areas of theoretical physics with extraordinary clarity and philosophical subtlety. His papers appear in the top journals in his field, including *The Journal of Philosophy* and the *Philosophy of Science*, and they appeal to a wide audience.

Professor Belot is a splendidly clear lecturer, even when teaching on difficult topics. He is very successful at the graduate level and a good, if demanding, undergraduate teacher.

On the recommendation of the faculty of the Law School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Susan P. Crawford as professor of law, with tenure, effective September 1, 2008.

ACADEMIC DEGREES:

Professor Crawford received a B.A. in 1984 from Yale University, and a J.D. in 1989 from Yale Law School.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD:

Since completing her J.D., Professor Crawford clerked for the Honorable Raymond J. Dearie in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of New York. In 1990 became an associate with the law firm of Blanc Williams Johnston & Kronstadt. In 1992 she joined the firm of Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering as an associate; and partner in 1997. In 2003 she joined the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law as an associate professor; was awarded tenure in 2008.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION:

Professor Crawford is a relatively junior scholar (for a lateral hire) who we believe is likely to become one of the leading national figures in intellectual property law. She is remarkably prolific, and in a short time she has written a number of articles that contain wonderful insights into what is simultaneously an extremely complex and yet open-textured and plastic area of law, concerning the internet, telecommunications, and cyberspace. Among her scholarly articles are *The Internet and the Project of Communications Law*, which explores the internet not just as infrastructure for delivering information but as a platform for creating completely new modes of communications and thereby creating new human conversational communities; *Internet Think*, which addresses fundamental questions about what the internet really is (and from whose perspective); *The Radio and the Internet*, which draws analogies between the FCC's current rules for allocating a newly available band of wireless spectrum to the agency's regulation of the radio spectrum in the 1930s; and *The Biology of the Broadcast Flag*, which criticizes an FCC rulemaking concerning whether digital media manufacturers must build technologies in digital media players that respond to a signal ("flag") that broadcasters could embed in their transmissions to limit the re-use of the transmitted content. These works range from the grounded to the theoretical,

with the trend in the latter direction, and they are consistently interesting and insightful. Taken as a whole, they reflect on three related and fundamental questions: (1) how should the internet best be understood -- as a mere communications infrastructure that delivers information, or as a system promoting communication and the formation of genuine communities, or as something else?; (2) given the best understanding of its fundamental nature, how should the internet be regulated, especially in light of past regulatory approaches to other communications systems, but also given its unique features?; and (3) how do different interests (including regulators themselves), bringing with them different models of what the internet is and does, advocate different regulatory approaches? As it addresses these three foundational questions, Professor Crawford's scholarship reveals an unusual mastery of a very complex body of law and a very complex set of fast-changing technologies. Indeed, one of her reviewers observed that one of the "most impressive aspects of her scholarship is her ability to translate the highly arcane technical and legal minutia of the internet of telephony regulation into a language that others can comprehend."

Reviewer A: "Crawford's work has shown remarkable development over the last several years, and she is remarkably prolific, for that reason I would lean in favor of an appointment. ... Crawford's field is telecommunications and internet law; ... Her knowledge and experience in this area is deep and in some ways close to being unmatched, both from her practice and her involvement in things like the board of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), the authority for domain names and numbers. ... Her writing is prolific and supplemented by a well-read blog. ... Susan Crawford is a great colleague and has a fabulously contagious spirit. She has great energy, and a real dedication to the field. She is not someone who would be hired and then fade off into some office, never to be seen again."

Reviewer B: "Prof. Crawford has produced a body of highly original and policy-relevant scholarship. Especially if she joins the Michigan faculty (where she will constantly be asked tough questions and grow intellectually because of them), I believe she will produce even more and better scholarship on the very challenging Internet law and policy issues which she addresses in the future. One of the most impressive aspects of her scholarship is her ability to translate the highly arcane technical and legal minutia of the Internet and of telephony regulation into a language that others can comprehend. Her work offers also well-reasoned recommendations to solve difficult problems."

Reviewer C: "I think Susan is without question one of the most promising communications-law scholars in the country. She has done important and influential work on the questions of FCC regulation of Internet-mediated communication (in particular Internet telephony), and she is one of the few who can approach that touchy subject with a firm base in the relevant law and technology. Her work on spectrum allocation and network neutrality is equally important. She continues to play a central role in international Internet governance. In short, she brings an immense amount to the table."

Reviewer D: "In a more nuanced and detailed way than others have done, Professor Crawford demonstrates the unusual power of the Internet for the purpose of communicating ideas. Other forms of communication permit the holders of particular property rights to reach a wide audience; and other networks allow individual speakers easy access to other *individuals*. The Internet allows easy access for individual speakers to reach wide audiences in a way that has never been possible before. Internet policy is thus more than telecommunications policy; it is at the same time media policy because the line between individual communications and mass media becomes blurred. From this comes Professor Crawford's conclusion that over-emphasizing the economic objective of efficient investment incentives for network owners could compromise even more valuable aspects of Internet communications. Importantly, Professor Crawford sees those latter values not just in terms of democracy and diversity, as does much related scholarship, but in economic terms as well."

Reviewer E: "So many legal scholars are either 'lumpers' (putting the incongruous together) or, more commonly, 'splitters' (distinguishing, defining). Susan Crawford is the rare example of someone who can do both very well. Her best gift as a legal scholar is to make unanticipated connection between things, as she does for example in *Network Rules*, 70 Law & Contemp. Probs. 51 (Winter 2007), analogizing the network neutrality conflict to the debate between intellectual property maximalists and 'free culture' advocates. But she is also capable of making fine distinctions, as good lawyers must do, for example in *The Ambulance, the Squad Car and the Internet*, 21 Berkeley Tech. L.J. 873 (2006), which is a careful look at the CALEA and E911 statues and rules. It's worth mentioning that in addition to being careful scholarship and yet lively reading, these papers engage important public policy issues that are currently up for grabs."

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATION:

Professor Crawford's work is imaginatively, extraordinarily well-informed, and recognizes and reconciles subtleties and nuances. At the same time both she and the work are very grounded in the real world. She is frequently quoted in the New York Times and other significant media because she is articulate, on top of current events and issues, and focused on sound and sensible policy considerations. She is a member of the board of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), the international body that establishes rules and processes for assigning internet domain names and numbers (of 15 board members there are only three Americans, and Professor Crawford is the sole American lawyer). With the addition of Professor Crawford to an already strong cohort of intellectual property scholars, Michigan Law will now contest Stanford and Berkeley as the top law schools in the country in this burgeoning field.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Departments of Political Science and Women's Studies, and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Lisa J. Disch as professor of political science, with tenure, and professor of women's studies, with tenure, effective September 1, 2008.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Lisa Disch received her Bachelor of Arts with high honors from Kenyon College in 1983 and her Doctorate from Rutgers University in 1988.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Professor Disch began her teaching career as a postdoctoral Mellon Instructor at the University of Chicago in 1988. She was appointed as an assistant professor at the University of Minnesota in 1990 and promoted through the ranks to professor in 2004.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Disch is a political theorists who specialized in contemporary social and political thought. She has published two books, ten journal articles, and three book chapters. Her articles have appeared in *Political Theory* (the flagship journal in political theory, *Signs* and *Hypatia* (important venues for feminist theory and philosophy), and *Journal of Health Politics*, *Policy and Law*, and *Environment and Planning*, among others. Her central ongoing interest lies in representation and her current projects demonstrate her ability as a careful reader of work in a wide range of fields. All aim to contribute to interdisciplinary conversations not only between political theory and feminist theory, but across the social sciences and with the humanities.

Like her research, Professor Disch's teaching is wide-ranging. Since 2001, she has taught eight different courses. She is an accomplished instructor who has received numerous teaching awards at the University of Minnesota—for Outstanding Contributions to Undergraduate Education (2006) and for Excellence in the Teaching of Writing (2000) as well as the Red Motley Exemplary Teaching Award from the College of Liberal Arts (2002). Students are in agreement and give her very high ratings.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Andreas Gailus received his Master of Arts from Freie Universität Berlin in 1988 and his Doctorate from Columbia University in 1996.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Professor Gailus began his teaching career as an assistant professor at the University of Chicago in 1996. He joined the faculty at the University of Minnesota in 2003 and was promoted to associate professor, with tenure, in 2005.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Gailus is a leading figure in German literary and cultural studies who has made important contributions to a variety of fields. He has published one major book, *Passions of the Signs: Revolution and Language in Kant, Goethe, Kleist* (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), and over a dozen journal articles and book chapters. Most notably, his essay on the German novella, "*La forma I el caso/Form and Chance: The German Novella*," is nothing short of masterful, challenging us to rethink well-trodden territory in literary history. He is coeditor of a forthcoming volume and is working on a second book manuscript tentatively entitled, *The Monstrous Angel: A Poetics of Ambiguity in the Age of Incest*.

Professor Gailus is a very gifted and successful teacher. He has created innovative settings in classes that cut across time periods, genres, and disciplines. Students describe him as truly an excellent teacher and give him the highest ratings.

On the recommendation of the faculty of the Law School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of William J. Novak as professor of law, with tenure, effective September 1, 2009.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Professor Novak received a B.A. and an M.A. in 1983 from Case Western Reserve University; and a Ph.D. in 1991 from Brandeis University.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

In 1989 Professor Novak became the assistant director of the Institute for Legal Studies at the University of Wisconsin Law School. In 1991 he joined The University of Chicago as an assistant professor of history; in 1997 he became an associate professor of history.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Novak is a highly regarded historian who will bring continued distinction to our faculty already known for its highly regarded interdisciplinary scholarship. He is best known as the author of *The People's Welfare: Law and Regulation in Nineteenth-Century America*, a book that is widely considered a major achievement within American legal history. In this book and series of articles, Professor Novak sets out to debunk a traditional and dogmatic story about the relative absence of regulation in America in the 19th and early 20th centuries. That is a large ambition indeed, and yet he succeeds with aplomb. The work forces legal historians to imagine entirely different takes on familiar notions about the history of regulation, recasting the police power and repositioning the very idea of regulation as part of an ideal to be maintained rather than a necessary evil to be minimized. The book criticizes notions favored by both the intellectual left (that 19th century law was a tool of advancing capitalism) and the intellectual right (that 19th century regulation was sparing and lean). An external evaluator writes: "Perhaps the book's most impressive feature is its capacity to demonstrate its case, to show the reader the phenomenon in question by piling up the empirical evidence It is no exaggeration to say that he changed the empirical-legal terrain upon which theoretical

interpretations of 19th century American law, state, and society must rest." Professor Novak's second major book remains a work in progress, and given the brilliance of the first one he has set a high bar for himself. But our external reviewers see significant potential in the second project, with one reviewer opining that Novak "is on the brink of what could be a quite important reconceptualization of 20th century American law and state-building." In all of his work, Professor Novak is lauded for the boldness of his vision, the importance of his argument, and the scope and depth of his research. In the words of our own legal historian Professor Tom Green, Novak is "a leading scholar who combines major revisionist argument with exacting and insightful research."

EXCERPTS FROM EXTERNAL REVIEW

Reviewer A: "William Novak's scholarship is substantial, serious, and always ambitious. His is a talent, and a vision, that sparks debate and scholarship. He has already produced an impressive array of young legal historians who trained with him at Chicago. There is every reason to think that he would also be a magnet for talented students at Michigan. His grasp of technically difficult and often arcane legal material is without question among the most sophisticated and learned of any practicing legal historian in the country. He engages directly and effectively with issues that are the bread-and-butter of a law school: debates over regulation, design of government policies to mobilize power and resources while adhering to ideals of individual rights and limited government; reconstruction and negotiation of the public-private divide in public policy; allocation of power and responsibility between actors named as public and actors named as private. I know I will be reading him for some time to come. Many of the talented young historians now in law schools are restricting themselves to more specialized topics; few are engaged with large interpretive history connecting law, politics, and economics, and yet there is a grand tradition (Willard Hurst, Mort Horwitz, Lawrence Friedman) and important function of this kind of work within law schools. Novak is well position to become the next in this line."

Reviewer C: "The People's Welfare is a remarkable book and a truly remarkable first book. It makes important points with the impressive archival support and in great detail. In my view, The People's Welfare has already become a classic in the field of American legal history and one of the fifty books that any graduate student preparing for a comprehensive examination in the field must read. When students and others have asked me to say something critical of The People's Welfare, I have been hard pressed to do so: it is that good a book."

Reviewer D: "Of all the scholars currently on history department faculties in the United States, Novak seems to me to be the one best positioned to transition to a law school. Hiring Novak would be a major and exhilarating step towards maintaining a world-class presence in the area. It's a fabulous opportunity for us."

With the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of M. Bishr Omary, Ph.D., M.D., as Professor of Molecular and Integrative Physiology, with tenure; Chair of the Department of Molecular and Integrative Physiology; and Professor of Internal Medicine, without tenure, effective August 1, 2008.

Dr. Omary received the Ph.D. degree in cell biology from the University of California, San Diego, in 1980, and was awarded the M.D. degree from the University of Miami in 1984. During 1980-1981, he was an NIH postdoctoral fellow at The Salk Institute in San Diego. Dr. Omary completed an internal medicine residency at the University of California, Irvine, and a one-year fellowship in gastroenterology at the University of California, San Diego. In 1989, Dr. Omary was appointed as Assistant Professor of Medicine at Stanford University. He was promoted to Associate Professor of Internal Medicine, with tenure, in 1995 and to his current rank of Professor in 2001.

Dr. Omary is a world leader in the field of keratin biology and pathobiology of organ systems. His work extends beyond the clinical areas of gastroenterology and hepatology to include basic epithelial biology. He has been a prolific author, producing over 100 scientific articles in the top-tier of scientific journals, including the *Journal of Biological Chemistry*, *Journal of Cell Biology*, *Journal of Clinical Investigation*, and *Gastroenterology*. He has contributed to three chapters in books and has served as a guest editor/co-editor for additional books and review articles. Dr. Omary's research program is well funded, and he currently is principal investigator of two NIH R01 awards, as well as a VA Merit Award. He was co-principal investigator on previous R01 and P30 awards from the National Institutes of Health.

In addition to his exceptional scholarship, significant grant funding, and national and international prominence as a scientist, Dr. Omary is further recognized through his leadership of the Gordon Conference on Intermediate Filaments, serving as vice chair in 2004 and chair of the 2006 session. He also served as co-chair of the 2005 American Society for Cell Biology Mini-Symposium on Intermediate Filaments. His expertise is acknowledged through his membership on study sections, site visit teams, and special emphasis panels for the National Institutes of Health and committee service for the American Gastroenterological Association.

<u>Teaching</u> – Professor Robson is a gifted teacher at all levels. He is also highly successful with two courses enrolling over 100 students each. His classroom teaching has been wide ranging and has contributed significantly to the department's curriculum. He has developed a number of new courses and recast several older courses. He has served on seven doctoral mentoring and dissertation committees within and outside the department, and supervised one dissertation.

Research – Professor Robson's research specialization is Chinese religions (Buddhism, Daoism, and popular religions), where he has already established himself as one of the leading scholars in his field. His forthcoming monograph, *Power of Place: The Religious Landscape of the Southern Sacred Peak (Nanyue) in Medieval China* (Harvard University Press), is a path breaking work that will provide a new paradigm for the study of Chinese religions. Since coming to Michigan, he has also published six articles and book chapters in peer reviewed venues, and completed a co-edited volume that is now under manuscript review. Professor Robson's latest project explores meanings

within a large set of Qing (1644-1911) statues of deities that are widely scattered across Southern China. Laura Ruetsche received her Bachelor of Arts, *summa cum laude*, from Carleton College in 1987, her Bachelor of Philosophy, with distinction, from Oxford University in 1989, and her Doctorate from the University of Pittsburgh in 1995.

Professor Ruetsche began her teaching career as an assistant professor at Middlebury College in 1995 and was appointed as an assistant professor at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996. She was promoted to associate professor in 2003.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Ruetsche's research focuses on the interpretive and methodological issues that arise within quantum mechanics and quantum field theory. She is probably the most sophisticated philosophically of her peers. She has published fourteen articles in peer-reviewed journals, including three single-authored pieces in *Philosophy of Science*, the best journal in this subject area. She also has ten book chapters in high profile venues and her book manuscript, forthcoming from Oxford University Press, will make a major contribution to the field.

Thomas M. Cooley is among the most distinguished names in the history of the Law School. He was appointed to the faculty when the School opened in 1859 and served with distinction until 1887. Thomas M. Cooley was the second dean of the Law School. He also served as a member of the Supreme Court of Michigan and contributed significantly to its recognition as one of the nation's outstanding courts.

Professor Cooper has been a member of the Law School faculty since 1972. He received his A.B. degree from Dartmouth in 1961 and a LL.B. degree from the Harvard Law School in 1964. After serving as law clerk to Judge Clifford O'Sullivan of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, Professor Cooper engaged in private law practice in Detroit, Michigan, until 1967. While in practice, Professor Cooper served as an adjunct professor at Wayne State University Law School. He then left practice for the academy and joined the faculty of the University of Minnesota Law School in 1967. In 1972, he joined the faculty of the University of Michigan Law School. From 1981 to 1994, he served the Law School as associate dean for academic affairs.

Professor Cooper has served the Law School as scholar, teacher, and administrator. In each capacity he has earned a reputation for being brilliant, productive, and indefatigable. As a scholar, Professor Cooper is best known as co-author of the leading treatise on federal civil procedure, but he has written with insight and grace on other fields of law as well. In recognition of Professor Cooper's vast knowledge of civil procedure and jurisdiction, he has been elected to the Council of the American Law Institute. He was reporter for the Uniform Transfer of

Litigation Act, and reporter for the Federal-State Jurisdiction Committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States, as well as both a member of and reporter for its Advisory Committee on Civil Rules. As associate dean of the Law School he was regarded with affection and admiration for his efficiency and his wisdom.

The last five years of Professor Cooper's appointment as the Thomas M. Cooley Professor of Law have been marked by the continued superb work. On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of Psychology and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, and with the endorsement of the School of Education, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Jacquelynne S. Eccles as the Wilbert J. McKeachie Collegiate Professor of Psychology for a five-year renewable term, effective July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2013.

Wilbert McKeachie, professor emeritus of psychology, was on the faculty at the University of Michigan from 1948 until his retirement in 1992. The Wilbert J. McKeachie Collegiate Professorship in Psychology was established by the Regents in June 1998. A stipend funded from College resources accompanies this professorship.

Jacquelynne Eccles received her B.A. from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1966 and her Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles, in 1974. Professor Eccles began her teaching career as an assistant professor at Smith College the same year. She joined our faculty in 1977 as an assistant professor and was promoted to associate professor in 1981. She left the University of Michigan to accept an appointment as a professor at the University of Colorado in 1988 and returned as professor of psychology and professor of education in 1992. She also holds appointments as a research professor in the Institute for Social Research and the Institute for Research on Women and Gender. She served as assistant vice president for research from 1987 to 1988, and was awarded the Wilbert J. McKeachie Collegiate Professorship in 1998.

Professor Eccles is one of the leading researchers and scholars in the area of identity and social development, adolescent social cognition and achievement beliefs, gender and ethnic group differences in educational achievement, and contextual influences on development,

identity and social development. Professor Eccles is an active researcher who continues to have a stellar scholarly career. She has had nearly 1500 citations on just the papers published in the last ten years. She has published 120 peer-reviewed manuscripts and 14 edited books and special journal issues. Of the peer-reviewed papers, 17 have over 100 citations in other peer-reviewed papers, and one has over 300 citations in peer-reviewed papers – bringing her total citations in peer-reviewed papers to well over 4,000 across her career. Most recently, she has received the prestigious Hill Award for Lifetime Contribution to Research on Adolescence and the Kurt Lewin Award. She is involved in two MacArthur networks. National regard for her research is seen through its continuous funding for over twenty years from the most prestigious agencies funding social science research – the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes for Child Health and Development, the MacArthur Foundation, the Spencer Foundation, and the W.T. Grand Foundation. This level of support, particularly continuous support, is nearly unheard of today.

Professor Eccles is also a superb teacher and a steadfast leader in promoting opportunities for women faculty, staff, and students. She is a dedicated mentor to junior faculty in the Department of Psychology. Not surprisingly, she recently received the Outstanding Mentor Award from Division 7 (Developmental Psychology) of the American Psychological Association, for contributions "to developmental psychology through the education and training of the next generation of research leaders in developmental psychology."

He was also associate chair of the Department of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology (2001-2004). He has served as director of the Museum of Zoology since 2005.

I am delighted to recommend the reappointment of Professor Alec Gallimore as associate dean for academic programs and initiatives in the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies, for a three-year term effective September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2011.

Alec Gallimore graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1986, and received his Master's degree in 1988 and Ph.D. in 1992 from Princeton University. He joined the faculty at the University of Michigan in 1992 as an assistant professor in the Department of Aerospace Engineering of the College of Engineering; in 1994 he was also appointed as an assistant professor in the Program of Applied Physics. He was promoted to associate professor, with tenure, in 1998 and to professor in 2004. An experimental plasma physicist who specializes in advanced spacecraft propulsion, Professor Gallimore is founder and director of the Plasmadynamics and Electric Propulsion Laboratory. He also directs the NASA-funded Michigan Space Grant Consortium, which awards some 90 grants and scholarships throughout the state of Michigan annually. He has extensive experimental experience with a number of electric propulsion devices including ion thrusters, Hall thrusters, arcjets, and multi-megawatt pulsed coaxial plasma accelerators. He has also implemented a variety of plasma probe and optical diagnostics.

In recognition of his academic achievements, Professor Gallimore has been the recipient of the Outstanding Achievement in Academia Award from the National GEM consortium, the Aerospace Engineering Award for Outstanding Accomplishment, and a Faculty Career Development Award from the University of Michigan. For service to the academic community he has been awarded the Harold R. Johnson Diversity Service Award in addition to the Trudy Huebner Service Excellence Award. He has also been elected to the Horace H. Rackham Graduate School's Executive Board. In 2006, the University of Michigan named Professor Gallimore the recipient of the Arthur F. Thurnau Professorship in honor of teaching excellence.

He was awarded the *Decoration for Meritorious Civilian Service* in 2005 by the United States Air Force for his work on the USAF Science Advisory Board. He has served as associate dean for academic programs and initiatives in the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies since 2005.

Professor Gallimore's academic background and leadership experience equip him well to carry out the duties of this position. He will continue to provide strong and effective leadership in the physical sciences initiatives for the Graduate School. I am therefore pleased to recommend his reappointment as associate dean for academic programs and initiatives for the Horace H. Professor Gladwin has carved a unique niche in academic circles in his field. He is one of the top scholars in this area, with a reputation built upon solid academic work and upon a burning passion for the message. That is exactly the kind of passion, dedication, scholarship and leadership we require in the holder of our McGraw professorship.

Professor Gombosi received his M.S. (1970) and Ph.D. (1974) degrees in physics from Lóránd Eötvös University in Budapest, Hungary. After receiving his Ph.D., he served in progressively responsible positions at the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. Professor Gombosi joined the Department of Atmospheric, Oceanic and Space Sciences (AOSS) as a postdoctoral scholar in 1979 and was appointed as an assistant research scientist (1982) and then associate research scientist (1985). Professor Gombosi assumed the position of associate professor in AOSS in 1987, was promoted to professor, with tenure, in 1990, and named chair in 2003.

Professor Gombosi's research interests span across many areas of space and planetary physics. He has achieved international prominence for his work in the fields of cometary plasma physics, predictive global space weather simulations, and fundamental kinetic theory of gases and plasmas. With his colleagues at the University of Michigan, he developed the first time-dependent model of the terrestrial polar wind. Professor Gombosi served as senior editor of the *Journal of Geophysical Research-Space Physics* from 1992 to 1997. Presently he is principal or co-principal investigator on research grants totaling approximately \$2M per year and serves as director of the Center for Space Environment Modeling, a multi-departmental, interdisciplinary group of faculty, staff,

and students. Professor Gombosi received the Stephen S. Attwood Award for Faculty Excellence in 2002.

Professor Gombosi's distinguished career exemplifies the highest standards in all aspects of academic performance. His research and teaching will continue to contribute significantly to the excellent reputation of the College and the University.

Professor Gombosi is a talented academic administrator who has been successful in leading the Department of Atmospheric, Oceanic, and Space Sciences. We are pleased to recommend his reappointment as chair for a three-year term from September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2011.

Professor Gross graduated from Columbia College with a B.A. degree in 1968 and earned a J.D. in 1973 from the University of California at Berkeley. He joined the faculty of the Law School in 1987 and was promoted to professor in 1990.

Before he joined the Law School faculty Professor Gross taught at Yale Law School and Stanford Law School. His legal career before becoming an academic reflects his enduring interest in public service. Professor Gross worked as an attorney with the United Farm Workers Union in California and the Wounded Knee Legal Defense/Offense Committee in Nebraska and South Dakota. He was a criminal defense attorney in San Francisco for several years. As a cooperating attorney for the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. in New York and the National Jury Project in Oakland, California, he litigated a series of test cases on jury selection in capital trials and worked on the issue of racial discrimination in the use of the death penalty.

Professor Gross teaches evidence, criminal procedure, and courses on the use of the social sciences in law. His published work focuses on the death penalty, eyewitness identification, the use of expert witnesses, and the relationship between pre-trial bargaining and trial verdicts.

The reappointing of Professor Gross as the Thomas G. and Mabel Long Professor of Law is a fitting recognition of his professional accomplishments. His reappointment, effective September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2013, is recommended with enthusiasm.

On the recommendation of the Dean and the Executive Committee of the Stephen M. Ross School of Business, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Raffi J. Indjejikian as the Robert L. Dixon Collegiate Professor of Accounting, effective September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2013.

The professorship was established in 2002 to help increase knowledge and understanding of business and economic theory and practice through instruction and research in accounting and related fields. Professor Indjejikian was the first to be appointed to the Robert L. Dixon Collegiate Professorship, making this his first renewal.

Raffi Indjejikian joined the Ross School of Business as an associate professor, with tenure, in 1996 and was promoted to professor in 2000. Professor Indjejikian's research record is excellent. He consistently has published articles in the top tier journals in the profession, including the *Journal of Accounting Research*, the *Journal of Accounting and Economics*, and the *Accounting Review*. His research in managerial accounting topics such as managerial reporting behavior, performance measurement and incentive compensation contracting adds important expertise to our faculty. He has a strong reputation in both theory building and in empirical research, and is highly regarded by accounting academicians, as evidenced by his appointment as associate editor of *Contemporary Accounting Research* and his appointments to the editorial boards of the *Journal of Accounting Research* and the *Review of Accounting Studies*, his active referee work for other leading accounting journals, and frequent requests for workshop presentations at major research universities. His research is of the highest quality, both his analytical and empirical publications are very highly regarded by accounting scholars, and he is someone whom peer schools consistently try to hire away from the University of Michigan.

Moreover, Professor Indjejikian is an excellent teacher who brings vital and dynamic teaching to our programs. He has a strong service record, serving for the past two years as the chair of the doctoral studies committee. He has made major contributions to the Business School's doctoral program and to the development of junior faculty here and at other schools. He continues to

make important contributions to the profession including the American Accounting Association and the academic accounting journals.

Karl W. Deutsch was a visiting professor at the University of Michigan in 1977. The Karl W. Deutsch Collegiate Professorship in Comparative Politics and German Studies was established by the Regents in June 2003. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Andrei Markovits attended Columbia University where he received his Bachelor of Arts in 1969, Master of Business Administration in 1971, Master of Arts in 1973, Master of Philosophy in 1974, and Doctorate in 1976. Professor Markovits began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Wesleyan University in 1977. He was an associate professor at Boston University from 1983 to 1992 and a professor at the University of California, Santa Cruz, from 1992 to 1999 before joining our faculty as a professor in 1999.

A specialist on the politics of Western Europe generally and Germany more specifically, Professor Markovits is a scholar of imposing stature. His vita alone testifies to his prodigious productivity. Professor Markovits has published nineteen books and edited volumes; well over

100 scholarly articles, more than 50 review essays; and many articles and interviews in the American and European press. He has been invited to deliver more than 400 lectures at academic conferences, universities and other scholarly venues in the United States, Canada, Europe and Israel. His publications have appeared in English, German, Italian, French, Spanish, Dutch, Swedish, Hungarian, Chinese, Farsi and Hebrew.

Professor Markovits commands a wide range of disciplines, including political science, sociology, intellectual and social history, comparative political economy, international relations, and cultural studies generally. His scholarship displays extreme cultural sensitivity, a deep sense of history, and an understanding of both "high" and "low" culture. He is also the rare kind of scholar who can actually bridge the humanities and social sciences.

Professor Markovits' work appeals not only to academics, but to the wider public as well. He is one of the most highly respected public intellectuals in the German-speaking world, and he has played a major role in recent debates such as those surrounding public memory, Holocaust memorials, Daniel Goldhagen's claims for universal German culpability, and the Gulf War. He is perhaps unique in his ability to mediate between German and American perspectives on contemporary European politics. In his role as a major intellectual advisor to the new German government, Professor Markovits is himself an important player in contemporary German politics. German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer has quoted him in public statements, and often consults with him on matters of public policy.

Professor Markovits has won a number of teaching awards, most recently the Golden Apple Award in 2006-2007 and the Tronstein Award in 2007. In July 2007 he was awarded a Dr. phil.honoris causa — an honorary doctorate — by the Faculty of Social Sciences of the Leuphana University Lueneburg, Lueneburg, Germany. Professor Markovits has advised doctoral dissertations at many major American universities, as well as universities in Great Britain, France, Germany, Austria, and Israel and taught at the University of Dortmund in Germany, The Hebrew University in Jerusalem and St. Gallen University in Switzerland.

The Dean and Executive Committee of the School of Dentistry are very pleased to recommend the reappointment of Professor Charlotte M. Mistretta as the William R. Mann Professor of Dentistry, for a five year term, effective April 1, 2008 through March 31, 2013.

This professorship provides a memorial to Professor William R. Mann, Dean of the School of Dentistry from 1962 through 1982, and an outstanding member of the faculty for 41 years. This professorship recognizes outstanding intellectual leadership and nationally recognized achievement in research, teaching and service.

Professor Mistretta received her MS and PhD in biological sciences from Florida State University in 1968 and 1970, respectively. She joined the University of Michigan School of Dentistry as a senior research associate in 1972, was appointed as an assistant research scientist in 1974, an associate research scientist in 1976, and a research scientist in 1982. In 1991, she was appointed professor in the School of Dentistry. She has served as the Program Director of the PhD program in Oral Health Sciences since 1993. Additionally, Professor Mistretta held appointments in the Center for Human Growth and Development on the primary research track from 1975-1996, associate professor (1975-1983), interim director of the Center for Nursing Research (1985-1988), and professor (1983-1996) in the School of Nursing. In 2005, she was appointed as associate dean for research and PhD training in the School of Dentistry.

Professor Mistretta is an outstanding researcher in the area of taste development and related areas of neurosensory and chemoreception phenomena. She was the recipient of a five-year (1978-1983) Research Career Development Award from the National Institute for Dental Research (NIH), and in 1988, was awarded the prestigious Claude Pepper Award, a seven-year grant from the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIH). In 1996, she received the Frito-Lay Award for Distinguished Research in Taste from the Association for Chemoreception and Sciences.

Professor Mistretta was named the William R. Mann Professor of Dentistry in 2003. She has had continuous funding as principal investigator on her NIH grant, Development of the Sense of Taste, since 1988, with prior funding for this project from the NSF, and has had other grants from NIDCR. She has authored, or co-authored, over 80 peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters.

Her service and leadership activities have been extensive. She has been a long-term member of the Association of Chemoreception Sciences (AChemS) holding numerous positions on the Executive Board, being the first chairperson of the Program Committee when AChemS was founded in 1979. In 1987, she was the elected executive chairperson of AChemS and, as a representative of the Organization, served two four-year terms on the International Commission on Olfaction and Taste of the International Union of Physiological Sciences. Professor Mistretta has also served on the Editorial Board of the Journal of Developmental Physiology. She was a member of the Task Force to draft a National Strategic Plan for the newly created National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders in 1989, has served on the Board of Counselors (1991-1995), and was a member of the Integrated Planning and Policy Committee (1995). In 2007 she was appointed to the National Research Advisory Council of the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders. At the University of Michigan, she served on the Provost's Faculty Advisory Group and served on the ad hoc Faculty Budget Advisory Group to the Provost. Professor Mistretta served on the search committee for the Dean of the School of Dentistry, and twice served on search committees for the University's Vice President for Research. As a Rackham Faculty member, she served on the Executive Board of the Rackham School of Graduate Studies (1994-1997), and the Rackham Graduate Student Appeals Board (1997-1999). She served on the 1986-1989 Transition Committee for administration of the School of Dentistry. Professor Mistretta currently participates on the Research Associate Deans Advisory Committee to the Vice President for Research; the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies Program Chairs and Directors; the Executive Committee of the Hearing, Balance and Chemical Senses Training Program; and the Operating Committee of the Tissue Engineering and Regeneration Training Grant. Her participation on committees within the School of Dentistry has also been extensive that has included many search committees and two terms on the Executive Committee.

One of her most valuable service contributions to the School of Dentistry is related to the PhD Program in Oral Health Sciences (OHS). Since its establishment in 1993, Professor Mistretta has served as director of the program. The OHS\PhD Program represents an important component of the School of Dentistry and is helping to train individuals needed for the future of academic dentistry. Since 1997, she has been instrumental in the establishment of a dual degree program for the DDS\OHS\PhD Program and the Specialty MS\OHS\PhD Program for those students wanting to combine a clinical program with their PhD studies.

From 2004-2006 he also served as president of the Association of Ecosystem Research Centers.

Professor Nadelhoffer is one of the leading biogeochemists in the world. He specializes in ecological impacts of anthropogenic nitrogen deposition and the interaction of the nitrogen and carbon cycles. This is an area of fundamental societal concern and of fundamental importance in understanding the functioning of local ecosystems and the global biosphere. He has been increasingly involved in formulating syntheses among the large groups of scholars engaged in this general area—a trend we expect to continue. His ability to organize the efforts of others through international conferences and to synthesize the results into papers that receive high praise is a clear indication of the leadership qualities he brings to the Biological Station.

Moses Gomberg was a professor of chemistry at the University of Michigan from 1893 until 1936. The Moses Gomberg Collegiate Professorship in Chemistry was established by the Regents in March 1999. A stipend funded from College resources accompanies this professorship.

Edwin Vedejs earned his Bachelor of Science at the University of Michigan in 1962 and his Doctorate from the University of Wisconsin in 1966. After a one-year postdoctoral appointment at Harvard University, Professor Vedejs began his teaching career at the University of Wisconsin in 1967 where he remained until joining our faculty in 1999.

Professor Vedejs is one of the true international leaders in the field of synthetic and mechanistic organic chemistry, widely recognized as a leader in the development of synthetic approaches to cytotoxic nitrogen-containing natural products, with the challenging frameworks of the aziridinomitosene and diazonamide families of hetereocyclic compounds being a current focus. A superb practitioner of the total synthesis of natural products, he is recognized as a pioneer in the mechanistic elucidation of the Wittig reaction. His research is consistently well funded, and he currently has support from two NIH grants. He directs a research group of six graduate students and three postdoctoral fellows and continues to be a major presence nationally and internationally in his field through an impressive list of invited talks and as an ad hoc member of several NIH study sections. He is also a dedicated teacher and mentor.

Professor Vedejs continues to bring distinction to the Department of Chemistry, the College and the University. His energy level and commitment to chemistry are phenomenal. We are very

The Law School respectfully requests that the Regents reappoint Professor Mark D. West as the Nippon Life Professor of Law effective September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2013.

The Nippon Life Professorship was established in 1989 by a gift from the Nippon Life Insurance Company. The gift was intended to recognize the long tradition of the Law School in studying Japanese legal institutions, teaching Japanese students, and appointing Japanese scholars to visiting research and teaching positions.

Professor West received a B.A. degree (*magna cum laude*) in international studies in 1989 from Rhodes College, and a J.D. degree in 1993 from Columbia University School of Law. After clerking for a federal judge, he entered private corporate practice for four years in New York and Tokyo. In 1998 he joined the University of Michigan Law School faculty. He spent the 2001-2002 academic year as a research scholar at Kyoto University.

Professor West has already become one of the nation's leading scholars of Japanese law and legal institutions. His current research focuses primarily on two issues: the role of law and legal norms in everyday life in Japan, and the effects of institutions and institutional change on Japanese corporate life and related areas. Professor West engages in sophisticated and research-intensive empirical investigations of these issues, and his findings (about such disparate topics as karaoke disputes, sumo wrestling, historical futures exchanges, contemporary corporate laws, and organized crime) have illuminated Japanese law, life and culture in important ways.

Professor West's reappointment as the Nippon Life Professor of Law is especially fitting because of his involvement with Japanese law. His reappointment, effective September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2013, is recommended with enthusiasm.

He has published seminal research articles in the top sociology journals. In fact Professor Baker is one of the first scholars to empirically demonstrate the social basis of markets, and since then he has established his reputation as someone who does empirically rigorous and theoretically creative research on the social network mechanisms underlying organization.

Recently Professor Baker has opened up a whole new domain of inquiry in network theory that focuses on energy networks and their impact, and on the role of generalized reciprocity. He has moved from a focus on social networks to a focus on values. In this domain he has obtained high impact grants and written both articles and a highly regarded book (*The Crisis of American Values*, published by Princeton University Press).

On the recommendation of John J. Voorhees, M.D., the Duncan & Ella Poth Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Department of Dermatology, and with the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Andrzej A. Dlugosz, M.D., as the Poth Professor of Cutaneous Oncology, effective June 1, 2008.

This professorship was established in May 2008 through funding generated from the endowed Duncan O. & Ella Poth Professorship which was established in 1994. Dr. Duncan Poth completed his residency training in dermatology at the University of Michigan.

Dr. Dlugosz received the M.D. degree in 1984 from Pennsylvania State University in Hershey, Pennsylvania, and pursued a residency in dermatology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. He completed a biotechnology fellowship at the National Cancer Institute, followed by a position as senior staff fellow also at that institution. Dr. Dlugosz joined the faculty at the University of Michigan in 1997 as Associate Professor of Dermatology, and was promoted to his current rank of Professor of Dermatology in 2004.

Since 1997, Dr. Dlugosz has been Scientific Director of the Cutaneous Oncology Program at the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center. His basic research program is centered on two interrelated areas. He is investigating how the abnormal regulation of an embryonic signaling pathway—the Hedgehog pathway—causes tumor development in skin and several other organs. In other studies, he is investigating the role of the Hedgehog pathway in development, growth, and regeneration of hair follicles and related structures. His bibliography reflects 56 peer-reviewed publications, six chapters in books, and numerous review articles and abstracts. His

research program is well funded, and currently he is principal investigator on grants from the National Cancer Institute and National Institute of Arthritis, Musculoskeletal, and Skin Diseases (NIAMS) of the National Institutes of Health. He was elected to the American Society for Clinical Investigation in 2002, has been included in the "Best Doctors in America" listing since 2003, and was elected to the American Dermatological Association in 2005.

Institutionally, Dr. Dlugosz has an extensive record for his contributions to education. Susan Juster received her B.A. in 1982 from Brown University and both her M.A.(1986) and Ph.D. (1990) from the University of Michigan. She was appointed as an assistant professor at the University of California, Santa Barbara in 1990 and held that position until 1992 when she returned to Michigan as an assistant professor. She was promoted to associate professor in 1996 and to professor in 2006.

Professor Juster's principle fields are early American history, religion in America's past and colonial America. The first field is most prominently reflected in her highly successful instruction in History 160, the Department's survey of U.S. history to 1865. Professor Juster has become one of the most admired of the Department of History's faculty. Her success is not simply measured in course enrollments, which have been impressive, but also in her ability to draw students to further and more advanced studies in the Department. Professor Juster stands before classes of 200 students and sustains a well-organized and closely-focused approach all the while lecturing without notes.

Professor Juster has also emerged as one of the most innovative and intellectual scholars of religion and gender working in the United States today. Published in 1994, *Disorderly Women* (Cornell University Press), which traces the emergence and collapse of gender equality among New England's Baptists, won the prestigious Louis Gottschalk Prize in 1995 from the American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies. This monograph demonstrates Professor Juster's ability to fashion strong, focused, and original argumentation around vexed questions. *Doomsayers* (2003 University of Pennsylvania Press) is a superb piece of cultural history that alters our understanding not merely of one aspect of religious history, but also of the transatlantic culture of eighteenth-century Briton and America. Professor Juster's articles, published in important collections and significant peer-reviewed journals are appearing at the rate of one or two per year. A 2000 article in the field-defining *William and Mary Quarterly* won two prizes, one as the best article published in the 1996-2002 period.

Professor Juster has received numerous awards including the Career Development Award in 1996, the LSA Dean's Faculty Award in 1997, and the Excellence in Research Award in 1999. She was awarded a faculty fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities in 1998-1999 and was the Howard F. Stern Professor in the Institute for the Humanities from 2004-2005. She is now completing a four-year term as a senior fellow in the Society of Fellows.

This research professorship was established in May 2008 through a generous gift agreement from the TUKTAWA family foundation, and is intended to support a faculty member whose work contributes to advancements in research and/or patient care within the Division of Gastroenterology in the Department of Internal Medicine.

Dr. Lok received the M.D. degree from the University of Hong Kong School of Medicine in 1990. She then undertook an internship, residency in internal medicine, and a fellowship in gastroenterology, all at Queen Mary Hospital in Hong Kong. From 1981-1983, she completed a fellowship in hepatology at the Royal Free Hospital in London, United Kingdom. In 1992, Dr. Lok was appointed as an Associate Professor of Medicine at Tulane University and was promoted to Professor at that institution in 1994. In 1995, she joined the faculty at the University of Michigan as Professor of Internal Medicine, with tenure.

Dr. Lok is a world renowned hepatologist and one of the premier leaders in hepatitis B research. She has made seminal contributions to our understanding of the natural history of hepatitis B and the role of hepatitis B virus genotypes and variants in the outcome of chronic hepatitis B infection. Her bibliography reflects more than 250 papers on viral hepatitis and liver diseases. She is a co-author of the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases "Practice Guidelines on Management of Hepatitis B," and served on the consensus panels for the European Association for the Study of the Liver on Management of Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C.

During her distinguished career, Dr. Lok has received numerous awards for research and teaching. In 2002, she was awarded the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Foundation's Distinguished Visiting Professorship that honors women in science and medicine. In 2005, Dr. Lok received a Freedom to Discover Award from the Bristol-Myers Squibb Foundation for her contributions to infectious diseases research. Dr. Lok is the recipient of the 2008 Distinguished Scientist Award from the Hepatitis B Foundation, and she will be recognized as one of the American Gastroenterological Association Foundation's 2008 Outstanding AGA Women in Science.

Dr. Lok has made valuable contributions as a clinician and educator in the research and treatment of hepatitis B, not only through the mentoring and training of numerous students, fellows, and junior faculty, but also in educating the medical community and the lay public on hepatitis B. I am very pleased to recommend the appointment of Anna Suk-Fong Lok, M.D., as the Alice Lohrman Andrews Research Professor of Gastroenterology.

That same year, she became an Associate Research Scientist in Biochemistry and Molecular Biophysics at Columbia University and, in 1986, was promoted to Research Scientist at that institution, as well as being named a Senior Associate in the Molecular Biophysics Laboratory at the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. Dr. Smith joined the faculty at Purdue University as Assistant Professor of Biological Sciences in 1987 and advanced through the academic ranks to achieve the title of Professor of Biological Sciences in 1995. Dr. Smith came to the University of Michigan in 2004 and was appointed Professor of Biological Chemistry in the Medical School and Research Professor in the Life Sciences Institute. In 2005, she was designated as the Margaret J. Hunter Collegiate Professor in the Life Sciences.

Dr. Smith's expertise also is focused on x-ray crystallography, and she is recognized for developing the multiwavelength anomalous diffraction (MAD) method applicable to determining structures of proteins. The MAD method exploits the tenability of synchrotron sources to determine protein crystal structures rapidly and directly. MAD is now used routinely and is the method of choice for structure determinations. Dr. Smith's group also has been involved in determining the structures of key enzymes that catalyze two-step chemical reactions in nitrogen metabolism and in the photosynthetic cycle. More recently, she has contributed to our knowledge of the structures of proteins involved in the synthesis of polyketide antibiotics and of vitamin B6.

Dr. Smith is a member of several scientific societies and has served on numerous grant review panels. During 1996-1998, she chaired the Biophysical Chemistry Study Section A of the National Institutes of Health. She is a founder and the current chairperson of the Structural Biology Synchrotron Users Organization. Dr. Smith also serves on the Department of Energy's Biological and Environmental Research Advisory Committee and is a frequent advisor to synchrotron radiation facilities and synchrotron structural biology laboratories both in the United States and abroad.

With her expertise in x-ray crystallography, Dr. Smith's appointment to this professorship will be a fitting way to honor the legacy of Dr. Ludwig. I am very pleased, therefore, to recommend the appointment of Janet L. Smith, Ph.D., as the Martha L. Ludwig Professor of Protein Structure and Function.

Wood, Jr., M.D., as the George F. and Sandy G. Valassis Professor of Urology, effective June 1, 2008.

This professorship was established in May 2008 through funding derived from the initial Valassis endowment, which created the Valassis Professorship in Urologic Oncology in 1996. This second Valassis professorship will support the activities of a senior faculty member in the Department of Urology.

Dr. Wood's clinical and research interests are focused in pelvic laparoscopy for prostate and bladder cancer, and the quality of life after oncologic surgery. He is co-investigator of the Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center Prostate Cancer SPORE (NIH Specialized Program of Research Excellence), as well as of a clinical trial for the Southwestern Oncology Group (SWOG). His bibliography reflects over 140 peer-reviewed publications, 24 book chapters, and numerous abstracts. Dr. Wood's expertise is further recognized through his activities as an editorial board member for the *Journal of Urology* and as a manuscript reviewer for several specialty journals. He is editor of the Board Qualifying Exam for the American Board of Urology. Dr. Wood serves on committees for SWOG and the American Urological Association, and is an external advisor for the Mayo Clinic SPORE grant.

Dr. Wood is an extremely well regarded academic urologist, who is an established leader in the field of urologic oncology. He has made important and innovative contributions in both laboratory and clinical investigations of urologic cancers. I am pleased, therefore, to recommend the appointment of David P. On behalf of the College of Pharmacy, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Ronald W. Woodard as the F.F. Blicke Collegiate Professor of Pharmacy for a five-year renewable term, effective July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2013.

F.F. Blicke was a distinguished alumnus and an accomplished faculty member of the College of Pharmacy from the 1920's through 1961, having successfully established the first doctoral study program in medicinal chemistry in the United States. His research and educational contributions had a considerable impact on the field of medicinal chemistry, bringing him national recognition as a leader in synthetic organic pharmaceutical chemistry. The F.F. Blicke Collegiate Professorship in Pharmacy was established by the Regents in 2008. The professorship is funded from College of Pharmacy resources.

Professor Woodard received his B.S. in chemistry and math in 1968 from Jacksonville State University, Jacksonville, Alabama; his M.S. in organic chemistry in 1971 from Georgia State University; and his Ph.D. in pharmaceutical chemistry in 1978 from the University of California, San Francisco. He completed a National Institutes of Health Postdoctoral Research Fellowship in 1980 at Purdue University and joined the University of Michigan College of Pharmacy immediately thereafter as an assistant professor. He was promoted to associate professor, with tenure, in 1986 and to professor in 1998. He was named associate chair of the Department of Medicinal Chemistry in 2000, appointed as professor of chemistry, without tenure, in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts in 2002, and appointed as chair of the Department of Medicinal Chemistry in 2004.

Professor Woodard is an internationally recognized leader in the area of enzyme chemistry, focusing on the biosynthesis of natural products and carbohydrates for the purpose of identifying potential new targets for the development of antimicrobial agents. His group was the first in the world to identify and characterize the gene and protein products of two of the enzymes in the kds pathway, kdsC and kdsD. They also made a major discovery that disproved 100-year-old conventional wisdom when they genetically modified E. coli in a way that significantly weakened its defense mechanism by removing the outer sugar coating. Their findings could lead to the creation of new and improved antibiotics for the possible treatment of bacterial illnesses such as Salmonella poisoning, typhoid fever, cholera, gonorrhea, meningitis, and others. The modified E. coli is also envisioned as an excellent host for the production of

less-expensive, lower-toxicity vaccines and protein products, such as insulin and human growth factor. Professor Woodard has published over 100 research papers in leading journals and was recently named a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science for his outstanding work.

Professor Woodard is an exemplary teacher, who has mentored numerous graduate students and postdoctoral research fellows, many of whom are presently serving as faculty and deans at prestigious universities across the nation and around the world. His teaching evaluations are consistently excellent, and the innovative teaching methods that he employs in our Doctor of Pharmacy program have been recognized with a Teaching Excellence Award in the College of Pharmacy. Students continually express their appreciation for his remarkable ability to bring excitement and humor to his lectures, as well as his ability to immerse them in the subject matter.

Professor Woodard serves the College and his profession with extreme dedication. As chair of the Department of Medicinal Chemistry and director of the Interdepartmental Program in Medicinal Chemistry, he has rejuvenated the program by tripling Ph.D. student enrollment, decreasing time to degree, and successfully recruiting new faculty. He was instrumental in creating the UM Center for Drug Discovery (UMCDD), whose objective is to facilitate campus-wide efforts in drug discovery, as well as one of its key components, the Medicinal Chemistry Core Synthesis Laboratory (MCCSL), an on-campus core facility for the design and synthesis of drug-like molecules and diagnostic probes for use in biomedical investigations. As part of that important initiative, Professor Woodard orchestrated the recruitment of a number of outstanding senior scientists during the recent Pfizer downsizing to staff the UMCDD and the MCCSL.

We are pleased to recommend the appointment of Ronald W. Woodard as the F.F. Blicke Collegiate Professor of Pharmacy for a five-year renewable term, effective July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2013.

With the approval of the Executive Committee of the Stephen M. Ross School of Business, we are pleased to recommend that the Dwight F. Benton Professorship in Marketing be split into two separate endowments establishing a new professorship of the same name and purpose, effective July 1, 2008.

The Benton Professorship was established in 1986 through a bequest from Dwight F. Benton (BSE '23). The endowed funds for this professorship have increased significantly and the market value of the endowment exceeds the current minimum for establishing new professorships. There are no living family members and no attorney to represent the donor. Appointments to this new professorship will be made by the Dean of the Stephen M. Ross School of Business upon the recommendation and approval of the Executive Committee for a five-year, renewable term. As with the existing Benton Professorship, the incumbent will be dedicated to increase and enhance knowledge and understanding of marketing theory and practice through teaching and research.

Dwight F. Benton was born in Wisconsin in 1899. He enrolled at the University of Michigan in 1919 and worked his way through his college years. Mr. Benton operated a taxi company and sold automobiles to pay for his education. In 1923 he received the BSE degree in chemical engineering. Following his graduation, Mr. Benton spent six months at Standard Oil Company's sales engineering school in Whiting, Indiana. After completing the company's training program, Mr. Benton was employed by Standard Oil and began his forty-two year career in sales. He traveled throughout the country, taking on a variety of challenging assignments in sales and marketing. He was appointed vice president of sales from 1951 to 1960, vice president from 1961 to 1963, and executive vice president from 1963 to 1965. Mr. Benton retired from Standard Oil in 1965. He continued his affiliation with the industry by serving as a consultant to several oil companies. He was a lifelong, generous supporter of the University of Michigan, especially through his gifts to the College of Engineering and the Ross School of Business.

In continued recognition of this significant gift from Dwight F. Benton, we recommend that the Regents formally approve splitting the Dwight F. Benton Professorship in Marketing, effective July 1, 2008.

In honor of Dean Dumas, who was a widely revered leader within the School of Nursing, and who recently passed away, we would like to retire this title and forever more link the Lucille Cole Collegiate Professorship with Dean Dumas as the first and only holder of this professorship. As we look to find a new faculty member to fill this collegiate professorship, we respectfully request that the title be changed to the Deborah J. Oakley Collegiate Professorship. A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal. A stipend funded from School resources will accompany this professorship.

Deborah Oakley received her Bachelor of Arts from Swarthmore College in 1958, her Master of Arts from Brown University in 1960, and her Master of Public Health and Doctorate degrees in 1969 and 1977 from the University of Michigan. She served as a research assistant from 1964 – 1977 before joining the faculty in 1977 as an assistant professor of community health in the School of Public Health and faculty associate in the East Asian Studies Center. She moved to the School of Nursing as an assistant professor of nursing in 1979 and was promoted to associate professor in 1981 and to professor in 1989. Professor Oakley retired from active faculty status in May 2002.

Professor Oakley introduced research-relevant information technology into course activities; developed and taught doctoral seminars on nursing and health policy, globalization, culture, and women's health; and was a major contributor to improving the quality of undergraduate research at the University of Michigan. She worked with colleagues to introduce more accurate measurement methods into the study of oral contraceptive use and the study of maternity care, and she made a persuasive case for more sophisticated analytic techniques in the field.

Within the University, Professor Oakley served as a member of the Institutional Review Board, the research committee for the UMHS Center of Excellence in Women's Health, the University Health Service Periodic Health Appraisal Unit, and the School of Nursing Executive Committee. More broadly, she has chaired the population and family planning section of the American

Public Health Association and served as interim director for the Center of Nursing Research. She has also held visiting faculty positions at The Johns Hopkins University, University of California-San Francisco and Peking University in Beijing, China.

After practicing in Finland for 25 years and establishing an international reputation based on his National Romantic and Jugendstill-inspired architecture, Saarinen emigrated to the United States in 1923, having placed second in the 1922 Chicago Tribune Tower Competition. His appointment as a visiting professor in architecture matched President Burton's interest in a formal program for visiting faculty in the creative arts, which had brought Robert Frost to campus two years earlier. While at Michigan, Saarien promoted the simultaneous development of drawing and clay models for three dimensional studies of architecture design. Modeling and casting work as part of the design process were novelties claimed by Michigan thanks to Saarinen and a fellow faculty visitor Knud Lönberg-Holm.

Eliel Saarinen moved a few miles eastward after two years at the University when the Booth Family, newspaper publishers and patrons of the arts, offered him design responsibilities for the new Cranbrook Academy. A few years later, in 1932, the university paid a much more public tribute to Saarinen for his international accomplishments and his brilliant planning and architecture of Cranbrook by awarding him an honorary degree in 1932.

Eliel Saarinen was known for his excellence in planning and architecture, his commitment to students, his international perspective and his passion for the creative arts. A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.
