**Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir**


**Carol Jean Hoiby, M.D.**, clinical assistant professor of emergency medicine in the Medical School, will retire from active faculty status on June 30, 2015.

Dr. Hoiby received her B.S. and M.D. degrees from the University of Michigan in 1982 and 1986, respectively. She completed a general surgery internship at the University of Michigan (1986-87), an internal medicine residency at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital (1987-88), and an emergency medicine residency at the Henry Ford Hospital (1988-91). Dr. Hoiby served as a staff physician at the Foote Hospital in Jackson, MI (1991-95) and attending physician at the Hurley Medical Center in Flint, MI (1995-97). She joined the University of Michigan faculty as a lecturer in 1995, and was promoted to clinical assistant professor in 2001.

An exceptional physician and researcher, Dr. Hoiby was a co-investigator for the Atlantis Trial which studied thrombolytics for acute ischemic stroke 3-5 hours after onset and was the principal investigator for the Genentech Stroke Presentation Survey. She collaborated with Dr. Brian Zink to develop a traumatic brain injury swine model to study the effects of hemorrhagic shock, ethanol intoxication, and sodium dichloroacetate on the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis function. Dr. Hoiby was an original member of the Brain Injury Group for acute ischemic stroke patients. She served on the Emergency Medicine Residency PGY-IV Planning Committee and was the education coordinator for off-service residents rotating through the emergency department. Dr. Hoiby created an innovative lecture on stroke recognition and new therapies for the Huron Valley Ambulance EMTs and paramedics that has become a regular part of their training program. She also served on the Drugs and Medical Devices Committee, the Neurologic Clinical Studies Group, and the Workload and Compensation Task Force.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member for her dedicated service by naming **Carol Jean Hoiby, clinical assistant professor emerita of emergency medicine.**
