Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir


Rachel Lipson Glick, M.D., clinical professor of psychiatry in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on June 30, 2019.

Dr. Glick received her B.A. (1981) and M.D. (1984) degrees from the University of Michigan's Integrated Premedical-Medical Program. She completed her residency training in internal medicine at the New York Hospital, Cornell Medical Center (1987) and in psychiatry at the Massachusetts General Hospital (1990). She was a clinical instructor at Harvard Medical School from 1990-91. Dr. Glick joined the University of Michigan faculty as a clinical instructor in 1991, and was promoted to clinical assistant professor in 1994, clinical associate professor in 2001, and clinical professor in 2007. She served as the associate dean for student programs (1998-2004) and was the first woman to hold an associate dean level position in the Medical School. She also served as the associate chair for clinical and administrative affairs in the Department of Psychiatry (2006-16) and the director of the Alice Hamilton House in the M-Home Learning Community at the Medical School (2015-19).

Dr. Glick was known as an exceptional educator and clinician. Her skills as a teacher were recognized with a Nancy C.A. Roeske, M.D., Certificate of Excellence for Medical Student Education from the American Psychiatric Association (1996), a Kaiser-Permanente Award for Excellence in Pre-Clinical Teaching (2013), and election to the League of Educational Excellence at the Medical School (2013). Her clinical and academic focus was emergency psychiatry, a field in which she was considered a national and international leader. Dr. Glick was the director of UM's Psychiatric Emergency Services (1993-98, 2007-17), president of the American Association for Emergency Psychiatry (2000-02), and remained active on their board as well as in other professional organizations as an emergency psychiatry expert. She was the lead editor on the textbook *Emergency Psychiatry: Principles and Practice* (2008), a second edition of which is currently in press. She was honored for her clinical work with an Outstanding Clinician Dean's Award from the Medical School in 2017.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **Rachel Lipson Glick, clinical professor emerita of psychiatry**.
