Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir

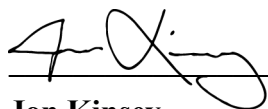
Stephanie D. Teasley, Ph.D., research professor, information in the School of Information, retired from active faculty status on April 24, 2024.

Professor Teasley received her Ph.D. degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1992. She joined the University of Michigan as a postdoctoral research fellow in 1992. She was appointed as a senior assistant research scientist in 1996 and promoted to senior associate research scientist in 2001. In 2003, she was appointed a research associate professor and promoted to research professor in 2011.

Professor Teasley is an expert on student learning and using data to enhance student outcomes. Her research focuses on the development of innovative tools and techniques, offering students, instructors, and academic advisers the opportunity to gain insights into individual learning trajectories. From 2002-2021, she served as director of the Learning, Education and Design (LED) Lab and from 2006-2012 she directed the doctoral program at the School of Information. She was a member of the U-M Coursera Advisory Group and the Learning Analytics Task Force. In 2019, Professor Teasley launched a [student-facing dashboard tool](#), “My Learning Analytics”, designed to support student success in the classroom. The dashboard earned an [IMS Global Learning Impact](#) Gold Medal Award. From 2017-2019, she was the president of the Society for Learning Analytics Research and from 2018-2020 she was the chair of the International Alliance for the Advancement of Learning in the Digital Era. In 2019, she became an Association for Computing Machinery Distinguished Member for her outstanding scientific contributions to computing. She is a member of the Board of Directors for Michigan Virtual and the executive officer for the International Society of the Learning Sciences (ISLS). From 2021-2024, Professor Teasley served as a program officer for the Division of Research on Formal and Informal Learning at the National Science Foundation.
