Central Student Government (CSG) Report

June 2026

President Grasso, members of the Board of Regents, and Executive Officers of the University, it is my pleasure to submit the following report – the first of my term as President of the Central Student Government.

My name is Summit Louth, and I was elected this past March as the Student Body President of the University of Michigan Ann Arbor. I am an incoming junior studying Political Science and Middle East Studies. I am extremely proud to be serving alongside my Vice President, Naimah Perez, who is also an incoming junior studying in Political Science. Naimah and I are extremely grateful for the opportunity to be submitting this report, and we are excited to work with you over the coming year to support the students at our beloved university.

The largest priority of my administration throughout the duration of my term will be to do all we can to address students' cost of living. While our university has a great deal of initiatives that save students money -- up to hundreds of thousands of dollars in the case of the Go Blue Guarantee – students are nonetheless finding it difficult to afford basic necessities. It is for this exact reason that my administration seeks to work with housing to incorporate laundry into students' tuition – that way it gets covered by the Go Blue Guarantee, scholarships, and the like. We also plan to fund student organizations more than we ever have before, mainly as a way to fund events and initiatives that cost students money that ought to be spent on their own necessities.

Accessibility is an additional cornerstone of my administration's agenda. The construction during the summer and early fall of 2025 revealed just how difficult it is for students to traverse campus when roads are blocked, bus routes are constantly changing, and disability-friendly routes are obstructed. It is for that reason that my administration has already begun working closely with the Department of Facilities and Operations to convene a yearly meeting where student leaders can give input as to how to make our campus accessible in spite of (valuable) construction projects. In a similar vein, students have expressed frustration or difficulty with accessing major resource centers, such as the Maize and Blue Cupboard, and University Health Services from North Campus and off-campus locations, which is why our administration is working toward achieving some iteration of these vital centers on North Campus as well.

The final action item of my administration that I would like to mention in this report is that we seek to ensure that the voice of the student body is truly being conveyed to the leadership of this great university. We are going to have hard conversations, and we are going to disagree, and we may even dislike each other because of those disagreements – and that is okay. I am, above all else, here to challenge you ("you" being our great university) when the student body feels ignored, and when policies that are important to students go undiscussed. I am here to tell you that students are fearful of ICE presence on campus. I am here to tell you that students are concerned about whether they will be



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able to access gender affirming care. Finally, I am here to tell you that the student body is adamantly in favor of divesting our endowment from the Israeli government's genocide in Gaza.

As I previously stated, though it is worth repeating, I cannot wait to work with all of you (and I mean all of you) over the coming year, and I am truly grateful for each of you and your service to this university. None of us would be here if we didn't want to improve students' lives, and I want to work with you to do just that.
