Summary of Evaluation:

Teaching – Professor Halderman has taught computer and network security courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. He created the undergraduate Introduction to Computer Security course (EECS 388) and did a major redesign of the graduate level Computer and Network Security course (EECS 588). At both levels, his teaching evaluations are very high, with average scores over 4.7 for both Q1 and Q2. Professor Halderman is active in mentoring graduate students, and he has also served as a faculty advisor to the Michigan Hackers student group. He has graduated two Ph.D. students and has another nine in progress. In addition, Professor Halderman created and offered a Coursera MOOC titled "Securing Digital Democracy." Since 2009, Professor

Halderman has been actively involved with undergraduate major projects. Professor Halderman's teaching efforts have been recognized with the 2015 College of Engineering 1938E Award.

Scholarship – Professor Halderman's research is in the area of computer security, and it is often influenced by societal concerns; e.g. security of electronic voting systems and mechanisms to prevent government censorship. The societal impact of his work has brought him attention from various media including CNN, NY Times, and NPR, among others. His publication record is very strong. He publishes in the most prestigious venues in his research area. His papers have received three best paper awards and one best student paper award. Professor Halderman's research funding includes three grants from NSF and a major grant from the US Department of State, as well as research grants from Google, Microelectronics Advanced Research Corporation (MARCO), and the New America Foundation. He is also attracting funding in the form of competitive fellowships for his students (NSF, Google). External reviewers are all supportive of his promotion. Professor Halderman is also the recipient of a 2015 Alfred P. Sloan Research Fellowship.

Dr. Telem received her M.D. degree in 2005 from Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia and a master's in public health in 2016 from Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health.

Dr. Telem pursued her general surgery residency from 2005 to 2011 at the Mount Sinai Hospital in New York and subsequently completed a fellowship in advanced laparoscopic and bariatric surgery at Massachusetts General Hospital from 2001 to 2012. In 2012, she was appointed as a clinical assistant professor of surgery at Stony Brook University Medical Center.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of Political Science and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, and with the endorsement of the Gerald R. Ford School of Public Policy, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Robert Axelrod as the Mary Ann and Charles R. Walgreen, Jr. Professor for the Study of Human Understanding, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

As a result of a generous gift from Charles R. Walgreen, Jr., the Mary Ann and Charles R. Walgreen, Jr. Professorship for the Study of Human Understanding was established by the Regents in 1968. The occupant of the professorship is allowed wide discretion in the development of an instructional program at either graduate or undergraduate level, and is to be permitted adequate opportunity for research, writing, public lectures, and service with public or private agencies concerned with the development of understanding between people. The professorship has been awarded to distinguished members of the faculty from a number of different departments.

Over the last five years, Professor Axelrod has been active in four areas: cyber conflict, theories of sense-making, international politics of the Middle East, and interdisciplinarity. His long-term interest in international conflict has turned to understanding the strategic implications of new kinds of military weapons, and, especially, cyber conflict. Before nuclear weapons, military strategists valued flexibility, whereas afterwards they valued the very opposite, namely credible commitment. It has now been nine years since the first cyber attack (on Estonia in 2007), and everyone is still trying to figure out the major strategic implications of cyber technology. In line with the aspirations of the Walgreen Professorship, Professor Axelrod has written about the challenges and opportunities of interdisciplinary research. Among the major examples he uses is his own experience working with evolutionary biologists on the evolution of cooperation, and working with a geneticist and an oncologist on game theoretic models of cooperation among tumor cells. Publications in this area include "How political science can enrich other discipline-based academy," (with J. Aldrich, et al., Oxford University Press, 2015).

Professor Axelrod's teaching has been closely linked to his research. He has taught a variety of graduate research seminars in the Department of Political Science that draw students from across numerous departments and programs in the college. In the Ford School he has taught "International Security

Affairs" and a new course in "Cyber Conflict" that brings together computer science Ph.D. students and public policy masters students working on joint projects.

During 2014-2015, Professor Axelrod worked at the U.S. State Department as a Jefferson Science Fellow. In this capacity, he was part of a team promoting the department's "Shared Prosperity Agenda" and worked directly with Ambassador David Thorne, senior advisor to the secretary. Other service duties include member of the Brookings Project on the Future of Cybersecurity and US-China Relations, consulting for the Air Force Office of Scientific Research on Case-Based Influence, consulting for the U.S. Cyber Command on historical analogies to cyber conflict, as well as presentations to the Defense Advanced Project Research Agency (DARPA) and to the Council on Foreign Relations of his work on cyber conflict.

Professor Axelrod has received recognition from a variety of sources for his research, including a Regents' Award for Distinguished Public Service, Charles E. Merriam Award of the American Political Science Association for "a person whose published work and career represent a significant contribution to the art of government through the application of social science research," a Lifetime Achievement Award from American Political Science Association's Conflict Processes Section for "a body of work unmatched within conflict processes in terms of its breadth, influence, and creativity," the Johan Skytte Prize in Political Science for "profoundly having changed our presumptions about the preconditions for human cooperation," and the National Medal of Science, which is the "nation's highest honor for scientific achievement and leadership."

On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of History and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Pamela Ballinger as the Fred Cuny Professor of the History of Human Rights, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

As a result of a generous gift from Robert J. Donia and Jane Ritter, the Fred Cuny Professorship in the History of Human Rights was established by the Regents in January 2009. Incumbents focus on the origins, institutions, and practices of international humanitarianism and human rights which have emerged in the twentieth century, and may deal with global, regional, and/or country-specific issues. Appointments may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Ballinger received her Doctorate (anthropology and history) from Johns Hopkins University in 1999. She has held the Cuny Professorship since 2011 when she was recruited to Michigan to fill this newly-endowed chair. Scholarly excellence and productivity are hallmarks of Professor Ballinger's career: her first book, History in Exile: Memory and Identity at the Borders of the Balkans (Princeton University Press, 2003), has been widely reviewed and praised as a brilliant and path-breaking study of the everyday experiences of exiles and emigrants from the borderland region of Istria, a peninsula encompassing the Italian city of Trieste and regions of northern Croatia during and in the aftermath of World War II. She has also produced a steady stream of peer-reviewed articles since her monograph was published, including several articles that form chapters of her current book manuscript (Forgotten Refugees: Decolonization, Displaced Persons, and the Reconstruction of Italy, 1945-1961) and were published in prestigious peer-reviewed journals.

At present, Professor Ballinger has two major monographs underway, Forgotten Refugees, which undertakes a timely and field-defining exploration of the post-World War II refugee crisis in both its national (Italian) and global dimensions. Framed within the growing field of human rights history, Professor Ballinger critiques teleological presumptions of a rise or expansion of human rights after World War II, emphasizing instead the differential categories of refugees that fostered new terms of exclusion. Professor Ballinger's second monograph is Other Seas:

Charting New Courses in History in which she returns to the thematic of violent mass migration.

Other Seas will mark a major contribution to the history of ethnicity, postwar migrations and expulsions, and European/Slavic borderlands, as well as to newer fields of oceanic historiography and Mediterranean studies.

Professor Ballinger has offered a wide range of new and highly successful courses, including developing a new curriculum in the history of human rights, the history of the Mediterranean, and courses on Italian fascism. During fall 2013, she co-taught an inventive "Global Engagements" graduate course on human rights in the Cold War era that involved joint course sessions with graduate students in Croatia, Japan, and Turkey via Skype. She also took on the teaching of the Department of History's undergraduate core methods course, which is widely recognized as one of the most challenging for instructors. Professor Ballinger's courses have significantly expanded the curriculum and she has taught with great success. She currently serves as the chair of three dissertations and is a member of at least eight additional dissertations.

Professor Ballinger is an internationally recognized interdisciplinary scholar of high repute and imagination. Her scholarly accomplishments, teaching, and service contributions continue to bring luster to the Department of History, the College of Literature, Science, and Arts, and the University of Michigan. He is an outstanding clinician and teacher who received the Status Pedagogicus Award by the Department of Neurology residents for his teaching excellence. His research helped define the current state of clinical practice for patients with neuropathy, and suggested ways to improve current diagnostic evaluation. It has led to a Choosing Wisely recommendation to limit MRIs in patients with this common condition, and another recommendation pertinent to neuropathy patients that is currently under consideration.

Dr. Callaghan has published 63 peer-reviewed articles, and is well-funded through the NIH and foundation grants. He serves on three American Academy of Neurology committees, one of which he chairs. He is the associate research director of the Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) Clinic at the University of Michigan, and has presented his research regionally and nationally.

In both 1993 and 1996, he was a visiting professor in the Department of Geography of the University of Paris-X (Nanterre), and in 1999, he was a public policy scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. In 2007, he was a distinguished visiting scholar at the Cornell University College of Architecture and Planning.

Professor Fishman is a nationally recognized expert in the areas of urban history and urban policy and planning. He is the author of two books regarded as seminal texts on the history of cities and urbanism: Bourgeois Utopias: The Rise and Fall of Suburbia (1987) and Urban Utopias in the Twentieth Century: Ebenezer Howard, Frank Lloyd Wright, and Le Corbusier (1977). In addition to these volumes, Professor Fishman is the author of more than 50 book chapters, journal articles and book reviews. His most recent research focus is a book-in-progress on the history of sustainability. He has presented numerous papers and keynote addresses at conferences worldwide over the course of his career. Professor Fishman's honors include the Laurence Gerckens Prize for Lifetime Achievement of the Society for American City and

Regional Planning History and named lectureships such as the Bruce Goff Lectureship at the University of Oklahoma, the Urban Studies Lectureship at the University of Pennsylvania and the Lansdowne Lectureship at the University of British Columbia in 2002. Since 2005, he has served as an associate editor and member of the editorial board of the *Journal of the American Planning Association*. In 2003, he was the president of the Urban History Association. From 1999 to 2003, he served on the board of the Society for City and Regional Planning History.

I am pleased that Professor Fishman has agreed to continue serving the Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning as interim dean. Robert Fishman has given exemplary service as interim dean of Taubman College. With deep understanding of both the college and the university, he has secured the advances the college has made in recent years and positioned it well for the future. With approval of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Jonathan E. Freedman as the Marvin Felheim Collegiate Professor of English, American Studies, and Judaic Studies, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

This professorship was established in the Provost Office and was named as the Marvin Felheim Collegiate Professorship in English, American Studies, and Judaic Studies in August 2011. A stipend funded from college resources accompanies this professorship.

Over the last five years, Professor Freedman has kept up a steady pace on the research front. He has written five of the projected seven chapters for his current book project, The Jewish Decadence, which is slated to be read, when finished next year, at the University of Chicago Press. He has published several essays from the book and several additional pieces—most notably on Henry James and optical illusions in Raritan, and on Salome and the Jewish woman's body in the Philological Quarterly. Professor Freedman is also beginning another book on Hitchcock and race, which grew out of a talk given last year at the University of Arizona on that subject. He also started writing for the LA Review of Books (LARB) and the New Rambler on a fairly regular basis, on subjects that bridge his academic interests and those of a more general audience: think pieces, for example, on Paul de Man and the fate of reading post-deconstruction, on the era of Big-Data inspired quantitative work on literature, on Eric Lott's book Love and Theft and racial appropriation in popular song, and on the made-for Amazon series Transparent. Professor Freedman has an extensive piece coming out in a German journal, Merkur, on the Broadway phenomenon "Hamilton" and the great Broadway songs of the 1920s to 1950s. His editor at LARB is encouraging him to extend these and add some more and publish them as a

book. In addition, Professor Freedman has been the editor-in-chief for the much heralded *Michigan Quarterly Review* for the past seven years.

Professor Freedman has been putting considerable effort into his teaching, as well. Although he has been repeating some courses at the undergraduate level—"Jews and Other Others," "Hollywood Film and American National Identities," and "Hitchcock and Modernity in English"—he also regularly develops new ones, including "Fictions of Finance" and a new junior seminar in "Longform Narrative." It is important to note that in the repeated undergraduate courses, he adds new material every semester to keep the course fresh. In graduate teaching and mentoring, Professor Freedman has had the pleasure to teach two graduate level courses in this period in English, and currently serves on six dissertation committees. His efforts in the classroom have led him to be nominated twice for the Golden Apple award.

Professor Freedman has served on the Graduate Admissions committees and on tenure and promotion committees in both the English and American Culture departments. He was a Head Fellow at the Frankel Institute for Jewish Studies for one year, and he served on hiring committees in the English and American Culture departments and on Reading Committee for Target of Opportunity hiring in English.

His papers continue to be cited at a steady rate despite the avalanche of new data in the past few years, which is a clear sign of the international astronomical community's recognition of the staying power of his work.

Professor Richstone continues to actively engage in undergraduate teaching. In the last five years, he has taught or co-taught a range of introductory undergraduate courses as well as Extragalactic Astronomy for advanced undergraduate students. He clearly values his contact

with undergraduate students and continues to find ways to broaden this contact. He is planning to continue teaching introductory astronomy courses as he starts his second year as associate dean. Remarkably, Professor Richstone has also developed and will soon submit to the college Curriculum Committee his plans for a new course—Inventing the Universe—which outlines the development of human awareness of our Cosmos.

In the area of service, Professor Richstone's most notable contribution to the university was his recent appointment as associate dean for the natural science departments in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. He has also served on numerous oversight and advisory committees for the college and the university. These include his current membership in the Senate Assembly Research Policies Committee (advisory to the research vice president of the vniversity), the Business Engagement Center Advisory Council, and the Tech Transfer National Advisory Board. With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Vincent L. Hutchings as the Hanes Walton Jr. Collegiate Professor of Political Science and Afroamerican and African Studies, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

This professorship was established in the Provost Office and was named as the Hanes Walton, Jr. Collegiate Professorship in Political Science and Afroamerican and African in June 2016. Hanes Walton Jr. was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1992 until his death in 2013. A stipend from college resources will accompany this professorship. The appointment period may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Hutchings joined the faculty at Michigan in 1997 and has become one of the very top scholars of race and ethnic politics in the United States. His research and writing span several subjects - public opinion, campaigns, legislative behavior - but his primary and most persistent interest is in representation. This is apparent in his book, Public Opinion and Democratic Accountability (Princeton University Press, 2003), which is full of ingenious empirical tests and makes a notable contribution to the scholarship on democratic representation. A second and equally productive line of research takes up what Professor Hutchings calls the "continuing political significance of groups and group attitudes." The core of this work is collaborative with Professor Nicholas Valentino. With support from the National Science Foundation, the Hutchings-Valentino collaboration has produced a series of remarkable (and well-placed) papers on the study of communications and politics. They carry out beautifully designed experiments, coordinated with complementary analysis of sample surveys, and their results are influential and important for a scientific account of present-day political campaigns. More recently, Professor Hutchings has turned his attention (back) to racial politics and to the shape of prejudice - writing on the political consequences of prejudice, on threat in multiracial contexts, on racism and immigration, on racial policy preferences, on punishment and public opinion. Other scholars take up his ideas. They have cited his work (according to Google Scholar) some 3000 times.

Professor Hutchings was elected as a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences the moment he was promoted to professor in 2009. He is the president elect of the Midwest Political Science Association, the discipline's second national association, joining professors Arlene Saxonhouse (1997), Nancy Burns (2013), and Arthur Lupia (2014), who have held this honor in the recent past. Professor Hutchings has been the principal investigator of the American National Election Studies since 2010, which focuses on building and sustaining an inter-disciplinary conversation around the longest running time series survey data collection in the social sciences and working with a demanding constituency that downloads these data some 10,000 times a year. His entrepreneurial activity and infrastructure building are long-standing. He has worked with a variety of people to fund the Metadata Portal for the Social Sciences, to build the National Study of Ethnic Pluralism and Politics, and to carry out the Detroit Area Study.

Oswald as the Louis and Myrtle Moskowitz Research Professor of Business and Law, Stephen M. Ross School of Business, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

The Louis and Myrtle Moskowitz Research Professorship was established in March 1990 with a gift from Republic National Bank of New York (now HSBC Bank USA) in honor of former Chairman Louis Moskowitz and in memory of his wife Myrtle Moskowitz. The endowment was created to provide a cornerstone for joint endeavors in the areas of law, economics and finance, with an emphasis on banking and commercial finance. Originally, the appointment rotated annually between the Schools of Business and Law. The endowment also supported a joint symposium or conference every third year. Starting in 2010, HSBC Bank USA, broadened the use of these funds — no longer rotating annually — to support faculty members in both Law and Business whose scholarship or instruction has both a law and business dimension, and the symposium or conference year no longer takes place.

Professor Oswald earned her A.B., and M.B.A. and J.D. degrees at the University of Michigan in 1982 and 1986, respectively. She joined the Ross School in 1988 as assistant professor of business law, was promoted to associate professor in 1995, then to professor in 2000. Professor Oswald was formerly the Louis and Myrtle Moskowitz Research Professor of Business and Law from 2001-2002, a Michael R. and Mary Kay Hallman Fellow from 2008-2011, and has served as the area chair of the business law in the Ross school since 2013. Professor Oswald also recently earned a Ph.D. from the University of London (in 2016).

Professor Oswald's research focuses on intellectual and real property law issues, especially liability issues in contexts such as secondary infringement liability in patent law and the personal liability of corporate officers, and property rights issues arising in the context of eminent domain and regulatory takings.

Pagnattaro.

Professor Oswald is the editor of the *Michigan Real Property Review*. She has also served as a contributing editor to the *Real Estate Law Journal*, as well as serving as a special editor for the *American Business Law Journal* and the *Journal of Legal Studies Education*. Professor Oswald is also a past president of the Academy of Legal Studies in Business, and served on its Executive Committee from 2003-2008.

Professor Oswald has taught at the University of Florida Law School, the University of Michigan Law School, China University of Political Science and Law in Beijing, L'viv State University in Ukraine, the Hopkins-Nanjing Center in Nanjing, China, and the School of Transnational Law at Peking University, and has been a visiting professor at the University of Sydney.

With the approval of the 2016 Research Faculty Award Advisory Committee, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Dr. Matthew P. Reed as the Don B. Chaffin Collegiate Research Professor, UM Office of Research, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2021.

The Don B. Chaffin Collegiate Research Professorship was established in June 2016. The Collegiate Research Professor award is given to recognize exceptional scholarly achievement and impact on advancing knowledge in science, engineering, health, education, the arts, the humanities, or other academic fields of study. A stipend from the UM Office of Research accompanies this professorship.

Don B. Chaffin served the College of Engineering with distinction for more than 35 years, retiring in 2007. As a member of the Industrial and Operations Engineering faculty, he led a major expansion of the Center of Ergonomics and served as department chair from 1979 to 1981. Professor Chaffin was well known for his application of biomechanical modeling to understanding and preventing lower-back injuries, particularly those due to work in industry. He was among the first to use computational models of the human body to improve work design and founded the Human Motion Simulation Laboratory in 1998 to harness the rapid expansion of 3D graphics capabilities in desktop computers. Professor Chaffin's legacy includes far safer workplaces, particularly in the auto industry, and a suite of computational tools for ergonomics that are used around the world.

Professor Reed received his B.S.E. in mechanical engineering in 1989, his M.S.E. in industrial and operations engineering in 1993, and his Ph.D. in industrial and operations engineering in 1998 from the University of Michigan. During his long career at the University of Michigan, he has established himself as a world leader in the study of vehicle occupant body shape and posture

and is responsible for major innovations in his field that have improved the safety and comfort of millions of people. Early on, he established the statistical and biomechanical models that are the basis of all software packages used for vehicle occupant compartment design and have become the global standard for occupant compartment layout. More recently, he has led cutting edge work on the effective and efficient statistical modeling of a wide variety body shapes and characteristics. In the course of his research, he has published more than 130 articles in top journals with collaborators from around the world, and he has received multiple prestigious awards in recognition of his contributions to his field.

Professor Reed's exceptional scholarly achievements and the impact of his research make him an outstanding candidate for this award. I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Matthew P. She served as an associate chair in the Department of Clinical, Social, and Administrative Sciences from 2013 through 2015. In 2015, she was appointed as the director for the Michigan Institute for Clinical Health Research (MICHR) Education and Mentoring Group, a position she continues to hold.

Professor Ringold is considered a pioneering leader in the field of psychiatric pharmacogenetics. She is one of only a few clinical pharmacy faculty in the country to conduct research in this area and is one of a very small number of pharmacy translational scientists who have received federal funding for their work. The trajectory of her research program has been remarkable. She has published numerous papers in leading scientific journals, and she has had a significant impact on the knowledge in her field.

She utilizes active learning strategies and a teambased learning approach, which are well-received by students and are helping to shape the way pharmacy education will be provided in the future. Professor Ringold is also an outstanding mentor, highly sought after by students, research fellows, graduate students, and other clinical scientists, not only in pharmacy, but in other disciplines such as psychology and psychiatry. Professor Ringold has been an outstanding contributor in terms of service to science, pharmacy, and the university. She is a founding member of the College of Psychiatric and Neurologic Pharmacists and is a member of numerous national professional organizations, including election to various research councils and leadership roles within and beyond the field of pharmacy. Professor Ringold also provides significant service to the University of Michigan through her work with the Depression Center and the Michigan Institute for Clinical and Translational Research. She has been the leading force behind the college's recent faculty development activities, as well as a leader in adopting the college's new team-based learning pedagogy. Professor Ellingrod is a highly valued and respected member of our faculty, who has distinguished herself as a visionary leader. Her achievements as a researcher, scholar, educator, mentor, and leader position her well for success in this role.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing unendowed collegiate professorship for John R. Anderson, who was a fellow and lecturer at Michigan from 1973 to 1976.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship.

John Anderson received his Bachelor of Arts from the University of British Columbia in 1968 and his Doctorate from Stanford University in 1972. He has been at Carnegie Mellon University since 1978 where he is the Richard King Mellon Professor of Psychology and Computer Science. Professor Anderson's research investigates the structure of higher-level cognition with a particular focus on mathematical problem solving. He has served as the president of the Cognitive Science Society, and has been elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society. He is a former editor of *Psychological Review*. He has received numerous scientific awards including the American Psychological Association's Distinguished Scientific Career Award, the David E. Rumelhart Prize for Contributions to the Formal Analysis of Human Cognition, the inaugural Dr. A. H. Heineken Prize for Cognitive Science, and the Benjamin Franklin Medal in Computer and Cognitive Science.

Professor Anderson is one of the most influential living cognitive psychologists and scientists. He began his ground-breaking work on cognitive architecture while he was a fellow and lecturer at the University of Michigan working in the Human Performance Center (1973-1976). His work combines cognitive psychology and computer science to understand how the brain works, how people learn, and how computer-based instructional systems can be used as educational aids. He is known for developing Adaptive Control of Thought (ACT-R), which is the most widely used cognitive architecture in cognitive science. Professor Anderson was also an early leader in research on intelligent tutoring systems. Computer systems based on his cognitive tutors currently teach mathematics to over 500,000 children in American schools. He has published numerous books, including Human Associative Memory (with G. Bower, 1973), Language, Memory, and Thought (1976), The Architecture of Cognition (1983), The Adaptive

Character of Thought (1990), Rules of the Mind (1993), The Atomic Components of Thought (with C. Lebiere, 1998), and How Can the Human Mind Occur in the Physical Universe? (2007). The National Academy of Sciences awarded Professor Anderson the 2016 Atkinson Prize in Psychological and Cognitive Sciences for his "foundational contributions to systematic theory and optimality analysis in cognitive and psychological science and for developing effective, theory-based cognitive tutors for education." In 2011, he was named the Franklin Institute Laureate — an honor given to distinguished trailblazers in science, business, and technology. Professor Anderson received the Benjamin Franklin Medal in Computer and Cognitive Science "for the development of the first large-scale computational theory of the process by which humans perceive, learn and reason, and its application to computer tutoring systems."

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.

He was appointed as a professor at the ETH Zurich in 1998 and held that position until 2004 when he was appointed as the chair of Geochemistry in the Department of Earth Sciences and fellow at St. Hugh's College at the University of Oxford. Professor Halliday was the head of the Mathematical, Physical, and Life Sciences Division at Oxford (2007-2012) before being appointed as a research professor and fellow of Wadham College (2012-present).

Professor Halliday's research involves the use of isotopic methods to study the Earth and planetary processes. His research focuses on understanding the origins of planets and the present day natural behavior of the Earth by utilizing mass spectrometry to measure small natural variations in atomic abundance. The main causes of such variations are radioactive decay, mass dependent fractionation, cosmic ray interactions, and nucleosynthetic effects inherited from other stars. Such measurements provide powerful constraints on: (1) the ages and rates of past processes, such as the age of the Moon or the rate of cooling of the Earth; (2) the conditions under which certain objects form, such as past temperatures of the world's oceans; and (3) the origins of various reservoirs, a kind of forensic fingerprinting of, for example, the nature of the source of the basalt magma being erupted in Hawaii. He has served on funding panels for the National Science Foundation, the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Royal Society Research Committee, among others. Professor Halliday was the editor of the Earth and Planetary Science Letters-Frontiers, Science, and an associate editor of Geochimica et Cosmochimica Acta.

Professor Halliday has been the president of the Geochemical Society, the European Association of Geochemistry, and the Volcanology, Geochemistry and Petrology Section of the American Geophysical Union. He has experience with a range of science boards and advisory panels, including those of the Natural Environment Research Council, the Max Planck Society, and the American Geophysical Union, among others. His honors include fellowship of the Royal Society and foreign associate of the National Academy of Sciences. He was elected vice president (physical sciences secretary) of the Royal Society in 2014 and received the Oxburgh Medal from the Institute of Measurement and Control.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.

Dr. Orringer's biography includes more than 275 peer-reviewed articles, and 134 book chapters. He served on the editorial boards of several journals, and was invited as a speaker or visiting professor nationally and internationally.

Dr. Orringer was committed to residency education which was evidenced through his involvement with the Thoracic Surgery Directors Association, the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, and as a member of the Residency Review Committee for Thoracic Surgery. He played a major role in developing a structured curriculum and implementing innovative educational tools for thoracic surgery residents. Dr. Orringer has received numerous honors and awards, including the Distinguished Service Award, and the Bakken Scientific Achievement Award from the Society of Thoracic Surgeons. He was awarded the Outstanding Clinician's Award, and

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing unendowed collegiate professorship for Michael I. Posner, who was a teaching fellow at Michigan from 1960 to 1961 and a research associate (1964).

This professorship was established through the Provost Office. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship.

Michael Posner received his Bachelor of Science in 1957 and Master of Science in 1959 from the University of Washington. He attended the University of Michigan where he completed his Doctorate in 1962. Professor Posner began his instructional career as an assistant professor at the University of Wisconsin in 1962. He was appointed as an associate professor at the University of Oregon in 1965, promoted to professor in 1968, and has been professor emeritus since 2000.

Professor Posner is one of the founders of the field of cognitive neuroscience. His research focuses on investigating the human mind and its relation to functions of the brain. He set in motion cognitive approaches to neuroscience that resulted in a series of fundamental discoveries about mind and brain making him one of the world leaders in this field. His work has relied upon groundbreaking neuroimaging technologies, including Positron Emission Tomography (PET) and functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging (fMRI), but this research would not have been possible without the corresponding sophistication of a theory of mind and the methods of analysis that were developed by Professor Posner.

Professor Posner has been instrumental in launching countless people and programs into a fruitful pursuit of the relationship between mind and brain. His impact on the field is evident not only through his own work but also through the work of the large number of students whom he has mentored and who have gone on themselves to make major contributions to the field of psychology. His most recent work deals with genetic and experiential factors in the development of brain networks underlying attention and self-regulation.

Professor Posner's most enduring focus has been the nature of attention, and his outstanding research contributions to this and related areas have been widely recognized. He received several

distinguished awards early in his career, including appointment to the National Academy of Sciences (1981) and to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (1986). He was also the recipient of psychology's highest award, the American Psychological Association's Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award (1980). The president awarded him the National Medal of Science in 2008.

Professor Posner served as editor of the Journal of Experimental Psychology: Human Perception and Performance (1974-1979) and was a member of the Board of Reviewing Editors for Science (1988-1989) as well as many national and field-specific committees. He has consistently published scholarly articles in the top journals in his field and he has written or edited a dozen books. He received the 1996 William James Book Award from the American Psychological Association for his co-authored Images of Mind (with M. E. Raichle), published in 1994 by the Scientific American Library. Professor Posner has also been an invited lecturer nationally at Brown University, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, among others; and internationally at Cambridge University, Max Planck Institute for Psycholinguistics, the European Cognitive Psychology Society, and Ben Gurion University, among others.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing unendowed collegiate professorship for Helen Hombeck Tanner, who was a teaching fellow (following her Master's degree) and a lecturer in the 1960s.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship.

Helen Hornbeck Tanner (1916-2011) was born in Minnesota and grew up in Kalamazoo, Michigan. She was educated at Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania (1937), at the University of Florida, Gainesville (1948) and at the University of Michigan, where she received a doctoral degree in 1961. She taught courses in Latin American history, and later in American Indian history, for the University of Michigan Extension Service and occasionally at the UM Ann Arbor campus. While at Michigan, Helen helped found what was then called the Center for the Continuing Education of Women (now the CEW). She was its first assistant director (1964-1968) and she served as acting director when then director Jean Campbell went on leave.

Although her degree was in Latin American history, Helen Tanner became a distinguished scholar of American Indian history and literature, publishing books on the Caddo and the Ojibwa as well as on early eighteenth-century Spanish Florida. Her productive research helped to launch the now thriving field of American Indian history.

Beginning in 1963, Helen Tanner began a career as an expert witness in cases heard by the now defunct Indian Claims Commission in Washington D.C as well as other cases which were heard before the federal courts. She gained fame as an unflappable and informed expert witness. She also wrote detailed expert reports in these cases. At least two of her reports were published in the early 1970s and are resources for scholars today. Helen left the university in the late 1960s to work full time in legal cases involving American Indians. Probably her most significant single case was United States v. Michigan, which resulted in the 1979 federal decision to restore Native American fishing rights in the Great Lakes based on an 1836 treaty. From 1966 to 1970, she served as a member of the Michigan Commission on Indian Affairs.

Helen Tanner's <u>Bibliography of the Ojibwa</u> (1974) was one of the early publications of the Center for American Indian History at The Newberry Library in Chicago. She consulted for the Smith Center for their <u>History of Cartography</u> (1974) and she prepared maps of Indian locations for the <u>Atlas of Early American History</u> (1976). In 1976, she joined the Newberry staff as director of the project that produced the <u>Atlas of Great Lakes Indian History</u> (1987). Covering over three centuries, Helen located hundreds of villages by name and traced their often forced migrations. This tome remains a highly important resource for scholars. She remained at the Newberry Library as a research associate, and in 1996 she became a senior research fellow. Helen continued to publish and produced around ten scholarly articles, dozens of book reviews in top journals (including the *Journal of American History*), and she published her dissertation as a book.

Helen Tanner remained an active staff member at the Newberry Library, which is still an important center for American Indian history. She established fellowships for Indian women scholars there and she coached a good many scholars passing through the Newberry on the library's holdings, the methods and bibliography of ethnohistory, and the activities of the American Society for Ethnohistory, in which she was a major presence. Helen Hornbeck Tanner died June 15, 2011.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing unendowed collegiate professorship in the name of Amos N. Tversky, who was a lecturer at the University of Michigan during winter term 1965 and a visiting faculty member during fall terms 1968 and 1974.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship.

Amos Tversky was born in Haifa, Israel in 1937. He received his Bachelor of Arts from Hebrew University in 1961 and his Doctorate from the University of Michigan in 1965. After holding several teaching positions at Michigan, Harvard University, and Hebrew University, he came to Stanford University as a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in 1970. He joined the Stanford faculty in 1978. He won the American Psychological Association's award for distinguished scientific contribution in 1982, and held MacArthur Foundation and J. S. Guggenheim Foundation fellowships in 1984.

Professor Tversky's contributions to the social sciences were monumental and have continued to make their influences felt. He was one of the world's leading experts in judgment and human decision-making. He seriously challenged economic theory by showing that people frequently do not behave rationally to maximize their welfare. His work on the limits of human rationality also had a major impact on philosophy, statistics, political science, law, and medicine. His most important papers, many of which were written with long-time collaborator, Daniel Kahneman, were unique in their depth and in the breadth of their impact. Their 1979 paper in *Econometrica* is one of the most widely cited papers in economics. Shortly after Tversky's untimely death in 1996, the Nobel Prize in Economics was awarded to Kahneman for their joint work on the psychology of decision-making.

Professor Tversky served on Stanford's Faculty Senate from 1990 until his death in 1996 and was a member of the Academic Council's advisory board to the president and the provost. He was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1980 and as a foreign associate of the National Academy of Sciences in 1985. He was awarded honorary doctorates by the University of Chicago, Yale University, the University of Goteborg (Sweden), and the State University of New York (Buffalo).

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.

The incumbent for the professorship will be a senior faculty member with a scholarly focus in the area of emerging democracies. The dean of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts is responsible for ensuring that the professorship is used for its intended purpose. Incumbents shall be selected in accordance with university policy and practices governing faculty appointments and in accordance with academic freedom. The University of Michigan will notify the donors of the incumbent chosen for the professorship.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing unendowed collegiate professorship for Patricia S. Yaeger, who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1990 until her death in 2014.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship.

Patricia Yaeger received her Doctorate from Yale University in 1980 and began her academic career as an assistant professor at Williams College (1979-1983). Following a one-year Mellon Fellowship, she was appointed at Harvard University as a lecturer (1984-1986), head tutor (1986-1989), and associate professor (1989-1990). Professor Yaeger joined our faculty as an associate professor, with tenure, in 1990 and was promoted to professor in 1999. She served as the interim chair of the Department of English Language and Literature (2002-2003) and was appointed to the Frieze Collegiate Professorship in 2005.

Spanning the arc of Professor Yaeger's scholarship, from her training as a Yale Romanticist in the age of high theory, to <u>Luminous Trash</u>, the book manuscript underway when she died, is the spirit of what she termed "a female sublime," a sublime not of mastery but of undoing. She valued the restlessness and excess of her curiosity, which characteristically would open new intellectual territories only to return to question the bases of their authority, an approach she viewed as a productive form of violence. She loved the line from Yeats's "Crazy Jane Talks with the Bishop:" "For nothing can be sole or whole/That has not been rent."

As the editor of *PMLA* from 2006 to 2011, Professor Yaeger reimagined what the flagship journal of literary study in the United States could be, most notably in the innovative Theories and Methodologies section and in her Editor's Columns. Her editorship was only one highlight of an illustrious career. Professor Yaeger pioneered feminist scholarship of literature and culture, particularly of the American South, in <u>Honey-Mad Women: Emancipatory Strategies in Women's Writing</u> (1988) and the award-winning <u>Dirt and Desire: Reconstructing Southern Women's Writing 1930-1990</u> (2000). Her edited volume, <u>The Geography of Identity</u> (1996), and the co-edited collection, <u>Nationalisms and Sexualities</u> (1991), extended her purview beyond the U. S. She turned to issues of trauma in the landmark <u>Consuming Trauma</u>; or, the <u>Pleasures of Merely Circulating</u> (1997).

Professor Yaeger was a luminous scholar, vibrant teacher, gracious colleague, supportive mentor, fiercely loving wife and mother, passionate gardener, inimitable dancer, wondrous

Her students described her as generous with her insights about literature and life, a facility that was recognized by an award for Distinguished Graduate Mentoring in 2013.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal.

Administratively, from 1991 to 2000, he served as the undergraduate chair in the Department of Psychology. From 1999 to 2000, he served as the special assistant to the provost for media rights, and from 2001 to 2006 he served as associate provost for academic, information, and instructional technology affairs. During the 2005-2006 academic year, he was the interim university librarian. From 2006 to 2013, he was the vice president and chief information officer and professor of psychology at the University of Virginia.

While at Michigan, Professor Hilton won numerous awards and fellowships such as the Master Lecturer Award from the Michigan Psychological Association in 1989, the Class of 1923 Memorial Teaching Award in 1991, and the LSA Excellence in Education Award in 1992, 1994 and 1995. From 1997 to 1998, Professor Hilton was a Sweetland Writing Center Fellow, as well as a participant in the CIC Academic Leadership Program as a fellow. At the University of

Virginia, Professor Hilton was responsible for planning and coordinating academic and administrative information technology, voice communications, and network operations on a university-wide basis.

He is an advocate for strong collaboration between academic and technology cultures in university environments, and has published widely in the areas of information technology policy, person perception, stereotypes, and the psychology of suspicion. He remains engaged with the library community at the national level, currently leading the creation of the Digital Preservation Network (DPN), an archival backbone designed to catch and preserve discoveries for future generations. Together with 56 AAU-caliber institutions, the DPN is building a preservation structure owned by and for the academy to connect and leverage a variety of large-scale preservation/access initiatives such as Hathi Trust, Texas Digital Library, and the Academic Preservation Trust. Professor Hilton has a history of helping large organizations successfully confront and embrace rapidly changing environments, a deep and abiding commitment to collaboration, and a broad range of experiences at all levels of the university.

In his role as vice provost, Professor Hilton ensures that the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, takes a leadership position in the rapidly changing field of education technology, deploying it in ways that preserve and enhance its traditional strengths in teaching and learning. He is responsible for developing strategies and policies for the use of educational technology across the university; for coordinating cross-campus efforts; and for providing academic, administrative and financial recommendations relevant to all aspects of campus-wide digital educational initiatives. The scope of work includes educational technology that enhances the effectiveness and efficiency of on-campus teaching, as well as educational technology that expands the university's outreach to new audiences. Although many of the vice provost's activities are in the digital realm, the proposed title is more inclusive and better captures the breadth and diversity of our focus on teaching and learning innovation. I recommend James Hilton's appointment with enthusiasm, effective July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2018.

On the recommendations of the director of the Jean and Samuel Frankel Center for Judaic Studies and the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Jack L. Jacobs as the Louis and Helen Padnos Visiting Professor of Judaic Studies, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

As a result of a generous gift from Stuart and Barbara Padnos and the Louis and Helen Padnos Foundation, the Louis and Helen Padnos Visiting Professorship in Judaic Studies was established in September 1988. This professorship enables the Center for Judaic Studies to invite distinguished scholars to the Ann Arbor campus each year.

Jack Jacobs is currently a professor of political science at John Jay College and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. He is an internationally acclaimed scholar of modern Jewish political thought and movements, Marxism, and critical theory. His early research focused on the history of the Jewish labor bund in Lithuania and the role it played in stimulating modern political party formation and identity among Eastern European Jews. This work resulted in a book and two edited volumes on the Jewish Labor Bund. More recently, Professor Jacobs published The Frankfurt School, Jewish Lives, and Antisemitism (Cambridge University Press) and he is working on a volume on Jews and the political left, also scheduled to be published by Cambridge. Professor Jacobs' work has been translated into French, German, Hebrew, Italian, Japanese, Polish, Russian, and Yiddish. His scholarship on Jews and the political left has been recognized widely through a variety of grants and awards, including two Fulbright awards for work in Tel Aviv (1997-1997) and Vilnius (2009).

As a Padnos Visiting Professor, Professor Jacobs offer courses of interest to students in political science, history, and American studies. He will teach a course on Jews and the Left, introducing students to Jewish political thought and movements on the Left. This course may be cross-listed with the Departments of Political Science and History. His second course will be for advanced undergraduate and graduate students, and will focus on the Frankfurt School and the works of Frank Horkheimer, Herbert Marcuse, Erich Fromm, Hannah Arendt, and Leo Strauss. Professor Jacobs will explore the very different relationships these thinkers had to Judaism and Jewish matters, and the connections between these matters and their overarching theories. Most

importantly, Professor Jacobs will help fill a gap in the Frankel Center for Judaic Studies' offerings on Jewish politics.

We are very pleased to recommend the appointment of Jack L. Jacobs as the Louis and Helen Padnos Visiting Professor of Judaic Studies, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of Communication Studies and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Will Potter as the Howard R. Marsh Visiting Professor of Journalism, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2016 through April 30, 2017.

The Howard R. Marsh Visiting Professorship in Journalism was established in 1974 by a gift of securities from the Howard R. Marsh Trust. Marsh Visiting Professors are eminent professional journalists or distinguished academic scholars who lecture in undergraduate and graduate courses, teach mini-courses, and often present public lectures.

Mr. Potter is currently completing a year as the Knight-Wallace Fellow in Law Reporting at the University of Michigan. His prior teaching experience includes being an adjunct faculty member at the University of Southern Maine, where he taught investigative journalism. He has been invited to guest lecture in a dozen university courses, including Johns Hopkins University MFA courses, George Washington University writing seminars, and Georgetown University sociology courses. Additionally, he has delivered keynote lectures at more than 200 forums, including Harvard Law School and Yale University. He holds a MA in writing (2008) from the John Hopkins University and a BA in journalism (2002) from University of Texas at Austin. In 2011 his book, Green is the New Red: An Insider's Account of a Social Movement under Siege, was published.

Mr. Potter will teach two courses for the Department of Communication Studies. The first, "Investigative Journalism and Social Change," will explore the role and responsibility of journalists in shaping the national dialogue on social issues. Students will examine how this role has evolved in the US, from Upton Sinclair and Nellie Bly to BuzzFeed and VICE. Throughout, students will discuss the qualities and techniques of investigative reporting as well as assessing its social impact. The second course, "Terrorist or Freedom Fighter? Defining Whistleblowers Post 9/11," will investigate the role and treatment of whistleblowers in a democracy. Students will evaluate how public perception of whistleblowers has changed over time, and whether the whistleblowers' identity shapes their public treatment.

This appointment, funded by the Marsh endowment, fulfills the endowment's mission to bring eminent journalist to the department to teach classes on the long-range factors that affect the ability of news media to perform their functions in a democratic society.
