Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir


Akinlolu O. Ojo, M.B., B.S., M.P.H., Ph.D., M.B.A., Florence E. Bingham Research Professor of Nephrology and professor of internal medicine in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on June 9, 2016.

Dr. Ojo received his M.B., B.S. (1985) degree from the College of Medicine of the University of Lagos, his M.P.H. (1988) degree from the University of Alabama, and his Ph.D. (1995) and M.B.A. (2011) degrees from the University of Michigan. He completed an internship (1985-86) at the San Fernando General Hospital, a postdoctoral fellowship (1986-88) at the University of Alabama, and an internship (1988-89), residency (1989-91), and chief residency (1991-92) at the University of Kentucky. He also completed a fellowship (1992-93) and research fellowship (1993-95) at the University of Michigan. He joined the University of Michigan faculty as an assistant professor in 1995, and was promoted to associate professor in 2001, and professor in 2005. He was named the Florence E. Bingham Research Professor in Nephrology in 2007. He held an additional appointment in the School of Public Health from 2012-14.

Dr. Ojo is an internationally renowned physician scientist with expertise in clinical and translational research in chronic kidney disease and kidney transplantation. He has published 163 peer-reviewed articles. He has served on the editorial boards of the *American Journal of Kidney Disease*, the *Clinical Journal of the American Society of Nephrology*, *Clinical Nephrology*, and *Reviews on Clinical Transplantation* and was an ad hoc journal reviewer for *The Journal of the American Medical Association*, *Lancet*, and *The New England Journal of Medicine*. Dr. Ojo was a member of the Institutional Review Board, a committee member of the General Clinical Research Center Advisory Committee, and a faculty member for the Medical Scientist Training Program. Regionally, he was a board member, treasurer, and president of the Gift of Life of Michigan. Nationally, he was a board member and co-chair of the Publication Committee of the Chronic Renal Insufficiency Cohort Study. Internationally, Dr. Ojo served as the chair of the Human Heredity and Health in Africa Consortium Steering Committee and as a committee member for the International Society for Organ Donation and Procurement.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **Akinlolu O. Ojo, professor emeritus of internal medicine.**
