On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Center for Afroamerican and African Studies (CAAS) and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Adam P. Ashforth as professor of Afroamerican and African studies, with tenure, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2010.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Adam Ashforth received his Bachelor of Arts from the University of Western Australia in 1979. He attended the University of Oxford where he completed his Master of Philosophy in 1981 and Doctorate in 1987.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Professor Ashforth began his teaching career as a full-time tutor (rank equivalent to an assistant professor) at Monash University (1984-1988). Following an appointment as a visiting professor at Bemidji State University (1988) he joined the faculty at the City University of New York as an assistant professor (1989-1998). He was a visiting associate professor at Princeton (1999-2006), a visiting professor at Northwestern University (2006-2008), and has been a visiting professor in CAAS since 2008.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Ashforth's interdisciplinary method, marked by his vivid ethnographic work on "spiritual insecurity" in post-apartheid South Africa, has achieved considerable acclaim in the field of African studies. He is the author of three acclaimed books, 25 articles, and winner of multiple prestigious awards, including a Melvin J. Herskovits Prize for the best book on Africa (2005), an H. F. Alfred Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Milton Curry as associate professor of architecture, with tenure, effective September 1, 2010, and associate dean for academic affairs and strategic initiatives, A. Alfred Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning, for a five year term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

Academic Degrees:

Milton Curry received a Bachelor of Architecture from Cornell University (1988), where he was the Alpha Rho Chi Medal Recipient, and a post-professional Master of Architecture, with distinction, from the Harvard University Graduate School of Design (1992).

Professional Record:

Professor Curry is an associate professor of architecture and theory at Cornell University where he has taught since 1995. From 2002-2008, Professor Curry served as director of the Cornell Council for the Arts. Since 2002, he has been an affiliate faculty member in the Cornell Program in Real Estate and Cornell Center for the Study of Inequality. He is the chairman and chief executive officer/editor-in-chief of CriticalProductive,Inc / CriticalProductive Journal (2008-present); co-chief executive officer of Orbit Development Group, LLC (2005-present); principal OrbitMCAdesignstudio (1995-present). Previously he held positions as co-founder/editor and publisher of AppendX Journal (1992-2007); and was a designer/project team leader at Kohn Pedersen Fox Associates Architects (1988-1991).

Summary of Evaluation:

<u>Teaching:</u> Professor Curry teaches architectural and urban design, global urbanization/city planning, and cultural theory. He promotes the synthetic relationship between architecture and the humanities and sciences. His course materials create connections among various perspectives on architectural theory and broader issues of urbanization, race and culture.

Students praise his teaching in both design studios and lectures/seminars. He has a demanding style and requires attention to detail, but students laud him for the respect he has for their opinions and diverse perspectives. His courses are carefully crafted and the issues that are brought to the table demonstrate a great synergy of creative work and teaching.

Research/Creative Work: Professor Curry's impressive standing as a scholar stems in large part from his extended project to make the reality of race in the United States an integral part of the theoretical discourse of contemporary architecture. Professor Curry emphasizes the 'urban subject' (the subjectivity of the citizen/consumer in an age of distraction). His critique of housing practices emphasizes the perpetuation of social codes as dislocations to black subjectivity.

Professor Curry's recent writings and pedagogy have increasingly focused on urbanism, both in the United States and globally. The starting-point for his analysis is conveyed through his book chapter "Racial Critique of Public Housing Development Strategies" (2003); his catalogue essay "Black Futurism: Architecture as Signifier;" an exhibition on Harlem projects that included his own invited "NegroCity Housing;" and his forthcoming book chapter, "Urban Space: Productions of Race."

Professor Curry is a founding editor of two academic architecture journals, *Appendx* (in operation from 1993 to 1999), and *CriticalProductive*, which he initiated in 2008. The first two issues of this latest journal are forthcoming.

<u>Service</u>: On a national level, Professor Curry has been a peer reviewer for the U.S. General Services Administration Design Excellence Program and has also served a a member of the New York State Council on the Arts Architecture and Design Grants Panel.

He is highly regarded nationally for the leadership and public engagement he inspired as director for six years of the Cornell Council for the Arts. For a similar period of time he served on the Cornell University Alumni Council, advocating for the arts and promoting this cause through public forums designed to engage the broader public. He formulated new programs, managed capital campaigns, promoted student work in the community, raised awareness of public art on campus, administered competitive arts grant programs and initiated new programs in industrial design and contemporary arts installations. Reviewers commented on his outstanding leadership skills and his proactive drive to communicate and organize, and his efforts to foreground the catalyst role that the arts can and should have within the academy and cities. He links a broadly considered arts agenda with cultural literacy and social consciousness.

On the recommendation of the Chair of the Department of Health Management and Policy, and with the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the School of Public Health, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Shoou-Yih Daniel Lee, Ph.D. as associate professor of health management and policy, with tenure, School of Public Health, effective September 1, 2010.

Academic Degrees

Professor Lee received a B.S. in biology from the National Taiwan University, Taipei, Taiwan (1984), an M.S. in public health from the National Yang-Ming University in Taipei, Taiwan (1988), and a Ph.D. in health services organization and policy from the University of Michigan (1997).

Professional Record

From 1997-2001, Professor Lee served as an assistant professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He joined the University of North Carolina (UNC) Gillings School of Global Public Health in 2001 where he served as an assistant professor in the Department of Health Policy and Administration. In 2006, he was promoted to the rank of associate professor, with tenure, at UNC.

Summary of Evaluation

Professor Lee enjoys a strong national reputation as a health services scholar. His research focuses on issues in health care management and health policy from a sociological perspective that emphasizes the influence of social structure and social norms on the behavior of organizations and individuals. He works at three levels of analysis: the community and industrial level (i.e., macrolevel), the organizational level (i.e., meso-level), and the individual level (i.e., micro-level). His studies explore the way these three levels shape health care delivery and the access to health care. Professor Lee has 61 peer-reviewed publications and he's the first-listed author on 20 of these papers. His research has been published in a number of leading journals in his field, including *Medical Care*, the *Journal of Health and Social Behavior*, and *Social Science and Medicine*.

Professor Lee has a solid external funding record. He recently received a prestigious "Investigator Award" from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to research the recent transformation of the Veterans Health Administration. He is also a co-investigator on three active projects from the National Institute on Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR), the National Cancer Institute, and a second award from NIDCR.

Professor Lee is deeply committed to teaching and mentoring. He has taught a variety of courses during his time at UNC, mostly at the doctoral level. His student evaluation scores demonstrate he is a highly effective teacher. In addition, Professor Lee has served on numerous dissertation committees, and is a strong and committed mentor of doctoral students, with whom he frequently publishes.

Professor Lee's service contributions both locally and nationally have been excellent. He is on the editorial boards of three journals, and has served on several review panels and study sections. He is very active in a number of professional associations, including the Academy of Management and Academy Health.

Dr. Moenter pursued postdoctoral training in obstetrics, gynecology, and reproductive sciences at the University of California, San Francisco. In 1994, she joined the faculty at the University of Virginia as an assistant professor of medicine and assistant professor of cell biology. She was promoted to associate professor in 2000 and was awarded tenure in 2003. Since 2007, Dr. Moenter has held the title of professor of medicine and professor of cell biology at the University of Virgina.

Summary of Evaluation:

Dr. Moenter has focused her research on neuroendocrine regulation of reproduction, including an understanding of the mechanism by which polycystic ovary syndrome decreases fertility. John Schotland attended the University of Pennsylvania where he received his Doctor of Medicine and Doctorate in 1996.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Following a two-year residency in neurosurgery, Professor Schotland began his teaching career as an associate professor in electrical engineering, in biomedical engineering, and in radiology at Washington University in 1998. He was also chief of Optical Radiology. He returned to the University of Pennsylvania in 2002 where he was appointed as an associate professor, with tenure, and promoted to professor in 2008.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Schotland's research focuses on fundamental physical problems with a novel mathematical structure. Nearly all aspects of his work involve the interplay of applied mathematics and theoretical physics; and much of his work has broad-ranging practical applications. His interests include optical tomography, nano-optics, coherence theory, and quantum optics. His research in three-dimensional optical imaging at the nano-scale has potential medical applications in optical tomography and manufacturing applications in micro-and nano-fabrication. The novelty and the translational potential of his research has won him substantial recognition and support for his projects. He has a dozen patents, has been invited to speak at institutions around the world, and has nearly 60 published articles.

Professor Schotland is an award winning teacher at the University of Pennsylvania and an active citizen in his department and in his discipline.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the College of Engineering, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of John E. Allison as professor of materials science and engineering, without tenure, Department of Materials Science and Engineering, College of Engineering, effective September 1, 2010.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Professor Allison received his B.S. in engineering mechanics from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1972. He received his M.S. in metallurgical engineering in 1977 from Ohio State University. He was then conferred his Ph.D. in metallurgical engineering and materials science from Carnegie-Mellon University in 1982.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Upon graduating, Professor Allison joined Ford Motor Company as a senior technical leader. Professor Allison has also served as adjunct professor at the University of Michigan since 1989. During his time at Ford Motor Company, Professor Allison held positions as a visiting scientist at Brown Boveri and Company, Baden, Switzerland, a visiting scholar at Monash University, Melbourne, Australia and an adjunct professor at Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Allison's major research focus is on understanding the inter-relationships between processing, microstructure and properties in advanced metallic materials and the utilization of this knowledge to engineer metallic materials for use in engineering applications. Central to this research are investigations on the mechanical behavior of materials, with an emphasis on developing both a mechanistic and phenomenological understanding of fatigue and creep processes. Current examples include development of micro-mechanical models of deformation in reinforced metals and investigations on creep and fatigue of aluminum and magnesium-matrix composites and titanium-aluminides. An additional area of interest is in the implementation of new metals technology. This includes development of methodologies for insuring structural durability and for assessing manufacturing costs.

Following residency training in ophthalmology in Istanbul, Dr. Demirci served on the faculty at the University of Istanbul, achieving the rank of associate professor at that institution. In 1999, he traveled to the United States where he received extensive medical training, first completing a fellowship in ocular oncology at Wills Eye Hospital at Thomas Jefferson University, followed by an internship in medicine at the Graduate Hospital in Philadelphia. Dr. Demirci came to the University of Michigan in 2004 to pursue a fellowship in eye plastic, orbital and facial cosmetic surgery, and he then completed a residency in ophthalmology at Henry Ford Hospital in Dearborn, Michigan. Dr. Demirci currently is chief resident in ophthalmology at that facility.

Summary of Evaluation:

Dr. Demirci has made important research contributions to the field of orbital and ocular oncology. His investigative interests are focused on spanning metastatic tumors of the eyelid, plaque radiotherapy for vaso-proliferative tumors of the retina, and systemic associations with sclerochoroidal calcification. Academic Degrees

Professor De Vogli received a state license in psychology from the University of Padua, Italy in 1997. In 1998 he received an MPH in international health, and in 1993 he earned a Ph.D. in public policy, both from UCLA.

Professional Record

Professor De Vogli is currently a lecturer in the International Institute for Society and Health in the Department of Epidemiology at the College of London. He has been a scientific advisor to the World Health Organization, and was a research director in health promotion for Population Services International in Moscow, Russia.

Summary of Evaluation

Professor De Vogli has international research experience in several countries including Vietnam, Tanzania, Guatemala, Russia, and several European countries. He has several grant proposals under review and has funding as a co-PI on projects with the European Union and Italian Ministry of Health. He has 37 peer reviewed publications and is first or second author on 18 of them. His research has focused on the application of social epidemiological methods to study psychosocial factors and socioeconomic inequalities in health as well as the health effects of globalization and economic inequality in developed and developing countries. He also studies behavioral and psychosocial determinants in global health contexts. He has most recently been particularly active in analysing data from the Whitehall II Study on the health effects of sense of fairness and the quality of social relationships as potential mechanisms connecting socioeconomic factors and health. Professor De Vogli's research also includes the analysis of

broader societal and social factors (e.g. globalization, income inequality) influencing health and health inequalities both in developed and developing societies.

Professor De Vogli has training in community psychology and social epidemiology. He will build upon our global health research and teaching agenda and plans to teach courses in global health disparities and intervention, and research design and methods. He has extensive teaching experience in programs across several countries. At the University College of London, he leads one of the core modules of the M.Sc. in global health and development (power and politics in global health), teaches health determinants to M.Sc. students in health & society: social epidemiology, and co-directs the Summer School on Social Determinants of Health. In addition, he designed two undergraduate courses on global health as a travelling faculty of the International Honours Program in Tanzania, Vietnam and the United States. He has also been invited to deliver seminars and teach courses at numerous academic institutions including the University of Bologna, the Mexican Institute of Public Health, the University of Athens, and the University of Goteborg.

Professor De Vogli has a good record of service. In addition to having served as a referee for leading journals in the field, he has served a variety of professional and scholarly activities including program review, research publication, and professional societies.

Gerald Davis earned his Bachelor of Science at the University of Michigan in 1984. He attended Stanford University where he received his Master of Arts in 1987 and Doctorate in 1990. Professor Davis began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Northwestern University in 1990. He was appointed as an associate professor at Columbia University in 1994 and a professor at the University of Michigan, Stephen M. Ross School of Business in 1998. He has held the title of Wilbur K. Pierpont Collegiate Professor of Management since January 2006.

Professor Davis' outstanding research in corporate governance and the transformation of large corporations is considered to be cutting edge in his field. He is highly regarded as a strong scholar and an excellent teacher. Professor Davis' research combines multiple theories – agency theory, interlock theory, network theory, and diffusion theory – in a constructive and insightful way, making a contribution to each of these areas. The hallmarks of Professor Davis' research are: a big and important question, integrative theory, sophisticated and multiple methods, striking findings, and a strong sense at the end that one has really learned something. He publishes in the top journals and is nationally recognized for his work.

Professor Davis has an excellent reputation in the profession as a dynamic scholar publishing in the best journals. He is considered by senior colleagues around the country to be at the top of the field of organizational research, noted for great accomplishments and promise for the future. He is looking at prevailing issues in organizational structure in new ways and garnering the attention and respect of colleagues. He is also an excellent teacher with a commanding classroom presence and a focus on and dedication to doctoral education for which he has twice been recognized with a Ph.D. teaching award.

I am pleased to recommend the reappointment of Stephen R. Vice President Forrest will oversee the Office of the Vice President for Research and will take the leadership role promoting the University's mission in research, scholarship, and creative activity.

I submit this recommendation following completion of a rigorous standard reappointment review process, which involved extensive, thoughtful input from peers, faculty and staff. I have discussed my findings at length with Vice President Forrest, and it is upon the basis of this review that I recommend his reappointment.

Vice President Forrest has been very effective as the vice president for research since his appointment in January 2006, and under his leadership, the Office of the Vice President for Research has played a key role in galvanizing growth in U-M's research portfolio and in extending the impact of work done by our scientists, engineers, scholars and artists. The University has greatly enhanced its activity in energy research and established the Michigan Memorial Phoenix Energy Institute, repurposing the longstanding Michigan Memorial Phoenix Project to meet twenty-first-century needs. Vice President Forrest has also guided expansion of the University's role in economic development and technology transfer, creating the Business Engagement Center and the Institute for Research on Labor, Employment and the Economy, and developing plans for a faculty start-up accelerator that will be located in the North Campus Research Center. In general, U-M's profile as a leader in state economic development has grown dramatically. He and OVPR have also played an important part in the development of the NCRC. Vice President Forrest has helped catalyze sustainability research at U-M, coordinating activities across several research units through the Directors' Council on Sustainability. During his tenure, the University has seen excellent growth in externally funded projects, topping the \$1 billion mark for the first time. The University was highly successful in obtaining grants through the federal government's recent stimulus program.

Internal to research administration, Vice President Forrest has undertaken important efforts to improve research management systems, enhance policies to achieve equity and common standards among and for those in the research faculty ranks, develop the research cyber-infrastructure, and consolidate critical functions to achieve efficiencies and performance gains. He has taken leadership in developing an approach, consistent with normal academic decision-making, to new requirements under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act, in order to achieve thoughtful and appropriate balancing of the concerns of Native American communities, the scholarly community, and the academic mission of the University.

In addition, during his tenure as vice president, Vice President Forrest has also maintained his own leading research program in photonic materials, devices and systems.

I am confident that, under Vice President Forrest's leadership, the University's research mission will continue to advance. Therefore, it is with great enthusiasm that I recommend the reappointment of Stephen R. Forrest as vice president for research, Office of the Vice President for Research, effective January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2016. I look forward to working with Vice President Forrest over the next five years.

Professor Kozyra also excels in her ability to convey the excitement and significance of scholarship to the educated public. For example, Professor Kozyra is the main author of the space and weather portion of the Windows to the Universe web site. In addition, she was asked by NASA to be a panelist for two press briefings concerning new space discoveries in 2002 and 2003.

Dr. Morrison's research is focused in the field of stem cell biology with the goal to elucidate the fundamental mechanisms that regulate stem cell function. His bibliography reflects 60 peer-reviewed scientific articles, published or in press, as well as numerous non-peer-reviewed publications and three chapters in books. His research efforts are supported by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute and several grants from the National Institutes of Health, including a Merit Award from the National Institute on Aging. He is well recognized for his expertise as noted by his position on the board of directors for the International Society for Stem Cell Research, his editorial board memberships, and his reviewer activities for national and international organizations, including the California Institute for Regenerative Medicine, the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and the Italian Association for Cancer Research.

2003 he was with the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he was the Robert C. MacClinchie Distinguished Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, research professor in the Coordinated Science Laboratory, and a faculty member in the Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology. In 2003 he joined the University of Michigan as a professor and chair of the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science.

Dean Munson's teaching and research interests are in the general area of signal and image processing. His current research is focused on radar imaging, passive millimeter-wave imaging, and computer tomography. He has held summer positions in digital communications and speech processing, and he has served as a consultant in synthetic aperture radar to the Lockheed Palo Alto Research Laboratory. He is co-founder of InstaRecon, Inc., a start-up to commercialize fast algorithms for image formation in computer tomography. He is affiliated with the Infinity Project, where he is coauthor of a textbook on the digital world, which is used in about 400 high schools nationwide to introduce students to engineering.

Dean Munson is a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), a past president of the IEEE Signal Processing Society, founding editor-in-chief of the IEEE Transactions on Image Processing, and co-founder of the IEEE International Conference on Image Processing. In addition to multiple teaching awards and other honors, he was presented the Society Award of the IEEE Signal Processing Society, he served as a Distinguished Lecturer of the IEEE Signal Processing Society, he received an IEEE Third Millennium Medal, and he was the Texas Instruments Distinguished Visiting Professor at Rice University.

Under Dean Munson's effective and collegial leadership, the College of Engineering has established a broadly shared vision regarding areas of strategic importance and growth. His thoughtful modernization of the UM engineering program maintains the strengths of the Michigan engineering education while evolving to produce engineers well prepared for the highly competitive global economy. Victor Haim Perera was a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan from 1959 to 1963. The Victor Haim Perera Collegiate Professorship in Anthropology was established in August 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Ruth Behar received her Bachelor of Arts from Wesleyan University in 1977. She attended Princeton University where she completed her Master of Arts in 1980 and Doctorate in 1983. She came to Ann Arbor as a Michigan Fellow in 1986, was awarded a MacArthur Foundation fellowship in 1988, and joined our faculty as an associate professor, with tenure, in 1989. This was followed by a series of high profile and distinguished awards and grants, both external and internal, from an array of foundations, including the Guggenheim, Rockefeller, American Council of Learned Societies, Fulbright, and Littauer foundations plus the Institute for the Humanities fellowship and more.

Professor Behar's position within her home discipline of anthropology is fully within the humanistic tradition. Her scholarly vision is unique and has led to streams of inquiry within the discipline at large that have renewed and bolstered their importance and impact within anthropology. She is one of those rare scholars who is able to transcend disciplinary boundaries by achieving recognition in the worlds of documentary film, poetry, and essay. Her scholarly productivity is enormous and wide ranging. At present she is the author of five books from publishing houses that mark her dual role as scholar and public intellectual, three edited volumes, more than 35 essays and articles, short stories, poetry, and documentary film. The publication venues of her essays and other writing span the academic and popular, a tribute to her role as a translator of anthropological and scholarly insights to a wider public.

Professor Behar's contributions to teaching and service have also been exemplary. She single-handedly developed the groundwork for a new international program for undergraduate study in Cuba. Winter term 2010 marked the first such offering, a program devoted to the ethnography of Cuba, ethnographic field methods, and experiential learning in the form of a semester of study in Havana. She is also a generous contributor to the service needs of the Departments of Anthropology and Women's Studies, where she has an affiliation. She is a valued mentor to junior faculty, serves on review committees, and is a member of the departmental executive committee. She is always active in the graduate admissions process and works in such enterprises as developing the undergraduate semester abroad program in Cuba.

John Bound received his Bachelor of Arts from Harvard College in 1977. He attended Harvard University where he completed his Masters of Education in 1979 and his Doctorate in 1987. He joined our faculty as an instructor in 1986 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1998. He also holds appointments as a research professor in the Population Studies Center (PSC) and as a faculty associate in the Survey Research Center – both in the Institute for Social Research.

Professor Bound is one of the world's leading experts on labor economics, but he also has made significant contributions to econometrics, public economics, the economics of education, health economics, and disability policy. His interdisciplinary focus is truly remarkable. While many leading scholars have long publication records in the top journals in their area of expertise, Professor Bound's record is notable in that he has published significant papers in the flagship journals of six distinct fields of economics research. He is also a master collaborator – nearly all of his papers are written with others, fifty coauthors in all. Two thirds are (or were) colleagues or graduate students at Michigan. He has also made major contributions to PSC's "Center" and "Training" grants that provide fellowships and mentoring to graduate students.

In the Department of Economics, Professor Bound has served as the director of graduate studies, head of graduate admissions, and the chair of countless search and tenure review committees. He has also served on more than 35 dissertation committees

On the recommendation of the Executive Committees of the Department of Sociology and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, and with the endorsement of the Medical School, we are pleased to recommend the joint appointment of Raymond G. De Vries as professor of sociology, without tenure, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

Professor De Vries is the author of two major scholarly books, author or co-author of two additional monographs and four edited collections, and author or co-author of more than sixty peer-reviewed articles, twenty book chapters, and countless editorials and comments. While most of his articles are the product of extensive collaboration, which is common in the medical field, Professor De Vries is by any measure a highly productive scholar.

Trained as a sociologist, Professor De Vries aims in much of his research to translate insights from his home discipline to scholars working in the fields of health and health policy. This effort is exemplified in his influential 2004 article on bioethics where he draws a now-famous distinction between "sociology in bioethics" and "sociology of bioethics." Positioning himself solidly in the latter camp, the article makes a compelling case for using sociological concepts to illuminate and advance research on core bioethical questions rather than contributing exclusively to either field: sociology or bioethics. In addition to his research on bioethics, which has appeared in such leading journals as *Nature* and the *Hastings Center Report*, Professor De Vries is perhaps best known in Europe for his pioneering work on midwifery, which resulted in a string of well-placed articles and two influential books, *Regulating Birth: Midwives, Medicine and Law* (1985), which launched his career, and his more recent, *A Pleasing Birth: Midwifery and Maternity Care in the Netherlands* (2005).

Since 2006, Professor De Vries has held an appointment as an adjunct professor in Sociology. He has taught two popular undergraduate courses: a small seminar on bioethics and a larger lecture class on medical sociology. Both courses have been very well received, as has his mentorship of several sociology honors students and graduate students. The combination of his

interests in medical sociology and teaching contributions make him an excellent candidate for a courtesy appointment and the Department of Sociology welcomes this opportunity to forge an association with Professor De Vries.

With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Kevin K. Gaines as the Robert Hayden Collegiate Professor of History and Afroamerican and African Studies, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

Robert Hayden was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1969 to 1980. The Robert Hayden Collegiate Professorship in English Language and Literature was approved in August 1999 and that title was held by Professor Simon Gikandi until he left Michigan in 2004. The renaming of this collegiate was approved in August 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Kevin Gaines received his Bachelor of Arts from Harvard University in 1982. He attended Brown University where he earned his Master of Arts in 1987 and Doctorate in 1991. Professor Gaines began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Princeton University in 1991. He accepted a position as an associate professor at the University of Texas at Austin in 1996 and then joined our faculty as an associate professor in 1999. He was promoted to professor in 2005. He was also director of the Center for Afroamerican and African Studies from 2005 to 2010.

Professor Gaines is a wide-ranging scholar demonstrating great original insight into his subjects. His first book, *Uplifting the Race: Black Leadership, Politics, and Culture During the Twentieth Century* (University of North Carolina Press, 1996), was awarded the John Hope Franklin Book Prize by the American Studies Association (ASA) in 1997. This book placed him at the forefront of a generational shift among scholars in African-American studies who sought to bring new theoretical perspectives and methodological approaches to bear on their field. By bringing together politics, literature, and a broad-gauged understanding of the interrelationship of polite and popular culture, he produced a model of pioneering critical analysis capable of being used in many other contexts. His second book was entitled *African Americans in Ghana: Black*

Expatriates and the Civil Rights Era (also published by the University of North Carolina Press, 2006) and is a provocative and extraordinarily accomplished work that opens many new and interesting questions for the future. His peer reviewed articles have appeared in some of the leading journals in the field, such as the American Quarterly, American Historical Review, Journal of American History, and American Literary History, among others. While some of the essays anticipate aspects of the thematic of American Africans in Ghana, others look ahead to his next project on Duke Ellington and the cultural production of African American music. Still others are accomplished historiographic and review essays. In 2008 he co-edited the field-defining anthology, American Studies: A Reader, for Wiley-Blackwell.

Professor Gaines is a conscientious teacher and an active participant in CAAS and History. Besides his five-year term as director of CAAS, he has served on the Executive Committees in both units. He also participated in the Gelman committee that proposed revised procedures for promotion to professor. He has been active in his professional associations, serving in particular on the editorial board of the *Journal of American History*. Most recently he was elected to the presidency of the American Studies Association.

Professor Hunter is an evolutionary ecologist whose research focuses on the consequences of insect consumption of plants for insect population dynamics and the food webs and ecosystems in which they are embedded. He has also been very successful in obtaining grant funding to support his research.

Professor Little is a prolific scholar, who has authored six books, two edited collections, more than three dozen articles and book chapters, and another fifty book reviews and scholarly replies – all of it except one co-edited volume has been sole authored and much of it had appeared since he assumed his duties as chancellor at UM-Dearborn. It is a stunning record of productivity.

Although not a sociologist by training, Professor Little's work speaks with authority and creativity to central analytical challenges facing the discipline and other social sciences, primarily through his influential writings on methods and the philosophy of science. Appropriately critical of traditional positivism, he is at the same time respectful of its ambitions to test and expand our theoretical knowledge of "the social." While recognizing the difficulty of generalizing across cases, he is unwilling to eschew generalization altogether, just as he is unwilling to follow those critics of the scientific method who are prepared to abandon causal explanation in the social sciences as philosophically untenable. Instead, he stakes out an intermediate position, embracing an analytical strategy of "causal realism" that is guided by the search for causal mechanisms to explain social regularities that appear across a wide range of social phenomena.

Since January 2007, Professor Little has held an appointment as an adjunct professor in Sociology. He has taught a graduate course each winter on the philosophy of the social sciences that is now cross-listed with the Department of Philosophy. His courses are well received by students and have become an integral part of graduate training in some program areas. The combination of his research agenda and teaching contributions make him an excellent candidate for a courtesy appointment and the Department of Sociology welcomes this opportunity to forge an association with Professor Little.

Urie Bronfenbrenner was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1946 to 1948. The Urie Bronfenbrenner Collegiate Professorship in Psychology was established by the Regents in June 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Catherine Lord received her Bachelor of Arts from the University of California, Los Angeles in 1971 and her Doctorate from Harvard University in 1976. Professor Lord began her teaching career as an assistant professor in the Institute of Child Development at the University of Minnesota in 1977. She joined the faculty at the University of Alberta School of Medicine as an assistant professor in 1982 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1989. She was a clinical professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of North Carolina (1990-1993) and professor of psychiatry at the University of Chicago (1993-2001) before being appointed at Michigan as professor of psychology (2001) and professor of psychiatry (2002). She also holds an appointment as a research professor in the Center for Human Growth and Development.

Professor Lord is among the most productive and influential clinical/developmental psychologists currently active. Her work has provided the framework for an entirely new way to understand and recognize autism spectrum behaviors. Her body of work has tremendous importance for a wide range of clinical fields that are only beginning to be fully explored. Throughout her career her research has generated enormous changes in our understanding of autism and autism spectrum disorders. She has played a leading role in standardizing the diagnosis of individuals and is now working with several groups in the development of treatments for individuals at many ages. She has been following a cohort of children for over

fifteen years, and has the most complete dataset on the development of children with a range of disorders. Beyond the academic importance, she has developed courses to train clinicians on all sorts in how to use assessment tools in a standard and rigorous manner. Her publication record includes co-author or co-editor of nine books and 61 book chapters, and 131 peer-reviewed articles, with approximately 6,000 citations for her 28 most cited papers.

Professor Lord has been funded continuously for 21 years by a wide range of sources, including the National Institutes of Health. She is highly respected by the government and has served as reviewer for a wide range of panels. She is sought by public health organizations in the U.S. and abroad for her insights on autism spectrum disorder diagnosis and treatment. She is on the editorial boards of all the leading journals in her field.

Finally, Professor Lord has worked tirelessly with the clinical area of psychology to develop better training practica and other educational experiences for graduate students. She has served on many departmental committees, particularly related to hiring new faculty and assessing faculty for promotions. She has also served as an exceptional emissary for the Department of Psychology in interactions with the Medical School, where more and more faculty have research collaborations. She has helped many junior faculty make connections with appropriate collaborators for their own research when they were having great difficulty "breaking into" a different environment.

The major focus of his work has been the epidemiology, prevention and treatment of acute infections. His work is now the gold standard for dealing with influenza outbreaks. Dr. Monto's primary current concerns include occurrence, etiology and prevention of infectious diseases in industrialized and developing countries; frequency and cause of respiratory

Dr. Monto has served the School of Public Health and the University of Michigan with great distinction. He has had a distinguished career and is widely recognized as one of the world's foremost experts in respiratory illnesses. With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Michael D. Morris as the Richard D. Sacks Collegiate Professor of Chemistry, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

Richard D. Sacks was a faculty member at Michigan from 1969 until his death in 2006. The Richard D. Sacks Collegiate Professorship in Chemistry was established in August 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Professor Morris received his Bachelor of Arts from Reed College in 1960 and his Doctorate from Harvard University in 1964. Professor Morris began his teaching career as an assistant professor at the Pennsylvania State University in 1964 and joined our faculty as an associate professor, with tenure, in 1969. He was promoted to professor in 1982.

Professor Morris is a brilliant scholar who is world renowned for his seminal research contributions in the field of analytical chemistry. He was one of the first scientists to recognize the potential for using Raman spectroscopy as an analytical tool in the 1970s and has carried out pioneering work in that area since that time. At present, worldwide interest in using Raman spectroscopy for analytical and biomedical imaging purposes is at an all time high, and this renewed level of activity (including an ever increasing number of new commercial instruments based on this technique) may be traced to Professor Morris' innovative work in this area over the past 30 years. He has also made vast contributions in other areas of spectroscopy as well as in separation science. Since 1969 he has published over 100 original papers, most appearing in the highest quality journals in his field, and nearly 300 papers over his entire career. In recognition of his work, he has received numerous awards including the Gold Medal from the Society for Applied Spectroscopy (1993), the Anachem Award (1993), the Lester Strock Award (1994), and the prestigious Award for Spectrochemical Analysis (1995), among others.

Professor Morris has also been a distinguished teacher committed to providing the most up-to-date education for his students. He brings innovation and excitement to every class that he teaches. He made vast improvements in an analytical chemistry laboratory class that has become one of the best introductory courses in chemical analysis anywhere in the country. He is also committed to graduate education and his success may be measured by looking at the 56 students receiving Ph.D.'s in his laboratory since 1969. All of these students have gone on to successful careers in industry, government labs, or academia. His mentoring style encourages students to have fun in the laboratory and to participate in interdisciplinary collaborative projects. In honor of his work with students he was selected to receive the Rackham Graduate Mentoring Award in 2007 for his excellence in training graduate students.

Professor Morris has also been a role model for other faculty with respect to his long-term service to the department and university community. He served as associate chair for the graduate program in Chemistry (1992-1997) and was instrumental in initiating an innovative graduate student recruitment effort. He played a pivotal role in chairing the technical support services committee and his leadership ensured that the department continues to excel in providing outstanding electronic, computer, and shop/glass blowing services. In recent years, he has spearheaded an effort to form a college-wide machine shop by combining the shops in individual units. With respect to university-wide contributions, he served on a number of important committees over the years, including the Intellectual Properties Advisory Committee (1987-1992), the Rackham Merit Fellowship Review Committee (1993-1995), and the OVPR Conflict of Interest Committee (2004-2007), among others.

He was the associate dean for the humanities in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts from 2004 to 2007 and has been chair of the Department of English Language and Literature since July 2010.

Professor Schoenfeldt is a leading scholar of Renaissance English literature and he has focused his work on problems of poetic subjectivity. The Early Modern period is often identified with the emergence of distinctly modern forms of personal identity and his scholarship explores the constitution of these new conceptions of self in the poetry of major 17th-century writers. He has authored a volume for the prestigious Cambridge Introduction series, edited or co-edited four books, published twenty scholarly articles on a wide range of subjects, and penned a half dozen reviews for leading journals. He has been widely recognized for his contributions both within his field and at the University. Within the past six years he has received the Faculty Recognition Award and the John H. for Distinguished Graduate Mentoring in the Humanities, and has been named a senior faculty fellow with the Michigan Society of Fellows.

C. Wilbur Peters was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1949 until his retirement in 1988. The C. Wilbur Peters Collegiate Professorship in Physics was established in August 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Ctirad Uher attended the University of New South Wales where he completed his Bachelor of Science in 1972 and his Doctorate in 1975. Professor Uher began his career as a research associate at Michigan State University in 1976. Following a two-year appointment as the Queen Elizabeth II Research Fellow at Australia's Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (1978-1980), he joined our faculty as an assistant professor. He was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1989. He was chair of the Department of Physics from 1994 to 2004.

Professor Uher is an outstanding physicist whose integrity and commitment to excellence match his world class contributions to the field of transport effects in solids. His research contributions to transport properties of solids, especially in the field of thermoelectricity, has had a continuing and sustaining impact on the community. In some areas, particularly in the emerging field of energy conversion, it has also changed the direction of research impacting both basic science and technology. Besides leading an internationally recognized research group, his impact as a leader within the University of Michigan and the scientific community has been felt in many ways. Professor Uher has served as associate dean for research, facilities, and computing (1994-1994), chair of the Department of Physics (1994-2004), and president of the prestigious International Thermoelectric Society (2006-2008). With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Youxue Zhang as the James R. O'Neil Collegiate Professor of Geological Sciences, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

James R. O'Neil was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1988 until his retirement in 1998. The James R. O'Neil Collegiate Professorship in Geological Sciences was established in August 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Youxue Zhang received his Bachelor of Science from Peking University in 1982. He attended Columbia University where he completed his Master of Arts in 1985, Master of Philosophy in 1987, and Doctorate in 1989. Following a three-year appointment as a postdoctoral fellow at the California Institute of Technology, Professor Zhang was appointed as an assistant professor at Michigan in 1991 and promoted through the ranks to professor in 2004.

Professor Zhang is widely recognized as having made some of the most significant advances in geosciences research in the last two decades. His specific field of study is geochemistry and mineral physics, although much of his work and interests range far beyond these fields. His exceptional reputation is based on the ability to combine difficult experiments with penetrating theoretical interpretations rooted in first principles. Few of his peers have produces research of fundamental importance on so many different and seemingly unrelated subjects. His work has been generously supported by the National Science Foundation, the American Chemical Society, the Canadian government, and most recently, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. He has published 81 peer-reviewed articles, book chapters, and conference reports, including four in *Nature*, one of the highest ranked publications in the sciences. He has also edited a book in Chinese and has authored another in English entitled *Geochemical Kinetics*, published by Princeton University Press in 2008, which has filled a long-neglected and very important niche in geochemistry.

Professor Zhang has been an important contributor to the teaching and mentoring program at Michigan. He has chaired eight dissertation committees, co-chaired another four, and served on another twenty at Michigan and three at European universities. His graduate students have gone on to research and teaching posts at major universities in the U.S. and in France. He has also worked closely with undergraduate students, including seven students through the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program (UROP).

Professor Zhang has a strong record of service to the University and his profession. He was founder and first president for the Association of U of M Chinese Professors and participated in the 1999 Michigan Road Scholar program. He served two terms on the departmental Executive Committee as well as on searches and promotion committees. He is also a member or fellow of the most important societies in his general realm of research. He has served as treasurer of the Geochemical Society and as a member of the executive committee for the Volcanology, Geochemistry, and Petrology section of the American Geophysical Union. He has been especially productive in organizing special sessions and editing volumes. He has served on the editorial board of *Chemical Geology*, one of the two most important international research journals in his field. Recently he was invited to be lead author for a new volume on "Diffusion in Minerals and Melts" which will be part of the *Reviews in Mineralogy and Geochemistry*, the premier series of reviews in this discipline. Professor Zhang is also extremely active in China. He has become one of the most visible and influential members of the Chinese Diaspora through membership on numerous advisory panels and committees, and he has served on the editorial board of the *Bulletin of Science* and other geological journals in China.

We are very pleased to recommend the appointment of Youxue Zhang as the James R. O'Neil Collegiate Professor of Geological Sciences, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2010 through August 31, 2015.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for Urie Bronfenbrenner who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1946 to 1948. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Urie Bronfenbrenner was born in Moscow in 1917 and immigrated to the United States at the age of six. He completed his Bachelor of Arts at Cornell University in 1938, his Master of Arts at Harvard University, and his Doctorate at Michigan in 1942. He entered service in the United States Army as psychologist and served at the Veterans' Administration following World War II. Professor Bronfenbrenner began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Michigan in 1946 before joining the faculty at Cornell in 1948 where he spent the rest of his professional career.

Professor Bronfenbrenner is regarded as one of the world's leading scholars in the field of developmental psychology, child rearing, and human ecology. His ideas and his ability to translate them into operational research models and effective social policies spurred the creation of the Head Start Program in 1965. He also developed the groundbreaking theory on the ecology of human development, which transformed the way many social and behavioral scientists approached the study of human beings and their environments. This led to new directions in basic research and to applications in the design of programs and policies affecting the well-being of children and families in the United States and abroad.

At his death in 2005 he was the Jacob Gould Schurman Professor Emeritus of Human Development and of Psychology at Cornell University. Over the course of his career, he authored, co-authored, or edited more than 300 articles and chapters as well as fourteen books. The American Psychological Association renamed its "Lifetime Contribution to Developmental Psychology in the Service of Science and Society" as "The Bronfenbrenner Award." He also received the James McKeen Catell Award from the American Psychological Society and chaired the White House Conference on Children.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for Henry A. Gleason who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1910 to 1919. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Henry Allan Gleason was born in Dalton City, Illinois in 1882. He began his studies in botany at the age of 13 and published in The American Naturalist while still in high school. He attended the University of Illinois where he completed his Bachelor of Science (1901) and Master of Arts (1904). Following a one-year fellowship at the University of Ohio and a summer on a survey of Isle Royale, sponsored by the University of Michigan, he returned to his studies at Columbia where he completed his Doctorate in 1906.

Professor Gleason taught at the University of Illinois before serving as an assistant and associate professor at the University of Michigan (1910 – 1919). While at Michigan, he served as director of the Biological Station and director of Matthaei Botanical Gardens. In 1919, Gleason accepted a position at the New York Botanical Garden, where he remained for 30 years. He held a variety of positions there, including curator, head curator, and assistant director. He was responsible for over 235 contributions to the field of vascular botany. One of the first ecologists, he is identified with the individualistic concept of plant association, which has had a strong influence on both ecological and geographical studies of vegetation.

Professor Gleason retired from the New York Botanical Garden in 1950. Suring his retirement he wrote two unpublished works: an autobiography, The Short and Simple Annals of Henry A. Gleason and Thumbnail Sketches of Botanists. He died in 1975.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts recommends that the title of the Robert Hayden Collegiate Professorship in English Language be changed to the Robert Hayden Collegiate Professorship in History and Afroamerican and African Studies, effective August 1, 2010. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Robert Hayden was born in Detroit in 1913 and educated in local schools before enrolling at Detroit City College where he completed his Bachelor of Arts in 1936. Between 1936 and 1938 he participated in the WPA Federal Writers Project. He also attended the University of Michigan where he twice received the Julius and Avery Hopwood Award for poetry (1938 and 1942) and completed his Master of Arts in 1944. Hayden studied under W. H. Auden, who directed his attention to issues of poetic form, technique, and artistic discipline. After completing his degree, he was appointed as an assistant professor at Michigan before joining the faculty at Fisk University in 1946 where he remained for 23 years. He returned to Michigan as a professor in 1969 and stayed until his death in 1980.

Professor Hayden was elected to the American Academy of Poets (1975) and was a consultant in poetry at the Library of Congress (1976-1978). He published his first volume of poetry, *Heart-Shape in the Dust*, in 1940 and published nine more volumes from 1948 to 1996. His prose is collected in *Collected Prose* (University of Michigan Press, 1984). Professor Hayden won the Grand Prize for Poetry at the World Festival of Negro Arts for *A Ballad of Remembrance* (P. Breman, 1962) and earned the Russell Loines Award from the National Institutes of Arts and Letters.

Professor Hayden distinguished himself as one of the major poets of the postwar generation. His work mirrors the experiences of African Americans as they sought to come to terms with the challenges and opportunities of the period after World War II. In 1980 Professor Hayden participated in a poetry reading at the White House. He died in Ann Arbor not long after.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for George E. Johnson who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1966 to 2008. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

George Johnson received his Bachelor of Science from Babson College in 1960. He attended the University of California, Berkeley where he completed his Master of Arts and Doctorate in 1966. Professor Johnson began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Michigan in 1966 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1976. He was also appointed as a research scientist in the Institute of Public Policy Studies (1976-1991). He twice served as director of the Master of Arts in Applied Economics program (1988-1999, 2001-2003). During his time at Michigan he played a pivotal role in building the economics faculty in the area of labor economics and human resources and was instrumental in distinguishing the University of Michigan as having one of the premiere faculties in the country in this field. Professor Johnson loved teaching and was a beloved teacher. His teaching spanned the range from thesis supervision to successful undergraduate courses in economics principles and macroeconomics.

Professor Johnson has written on a wide range of topics in labor economics. Early, extremely influential work focused on labor unions, including strikes and the effects of unions on the wages of both union members and other workers. He next studied returns to schooling, emphasizing school quality as well as number of years completed. Another series of studies looked at lifetime earnings among academics and promotion patterns of female faculty. Most recently, in work that now represents conventional wisdom, he turned his attention to the theoretical and empirical aspects of the growing wage inequality from both technical change and increased international trade. In recognition of the many contributions he made to the field of labor economics, Professor Johnson was elected as a fellow of the Society of Labor Economists (2006).

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for John R. Knott, Jr. who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1967 until his retirement in 2006. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

John Knott received a Bachelor of Arts from Yale University in 1959 and his Doctorate from Harvard University in 1965. Professor Knott began his teaching career as an assistant professor at the University of Michigan in 1967 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1976.

Much of Professor Knott's work has centered on nonconformist literature in 16th and 17th-century England, with particular focus on such literary and religious figures as Milton, Bunyan, and Browne, and the discourses of Protestant martyrdom. He published three scholarly monographs and co-edited two books. In the 1990s, spurred on by time spent in the Canadian shield landscape of Ontario and the Noatak watershed area of Alaska, Professor Knott began to concentrate on the history of American nature writing and American natural places, and he established a popular undergraduate course in wilderness literature. He co-edited *The Huron River: Voices from the Watershed* (2000) and a special issue of the *Michigan Quarterly Review*, "Reimagining Place" (2001). He also published a major scholarly monograph in 2002 which makes a claim for the special status of wilderness as not merely a construct of human culture but an essential entity.

Professor Knott has an extensive record of administrative service, including appointments as associate dean (1977-1980) and acting dean (1980-1981) of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. He was chair of the Department of English Language and Literature (1982-1987), during which he established the Master of Fine Arts program in creative writing. He was a member of the organizing committee for the Institute for the Humanities and was interim director in its initial year (1987-1988). More recently, he chaired the organizing and implementing committees for the Program in the Environment and served as its interim director (2001-2002). Professor Knott's honors include the Bredvold Prize, two Excellence in Education Awards, and an award from the Office of the Vice President for Research.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for James R. O'Neil who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1988 until he retired in 1998. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

James O'Neil received a Bachelor of Science from Loyola University in 1956, Master of Science from Carnegie-Mellon University in 1959, and his Doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. Following a two-year postdoctoral appointment at the California Institute of Technology, he joined the staff of the United States Geological Survey in Menlo Park, California, where he spent the next 23 years. He was appointed professor, with tenure, at the University of Michigan in 1988.

Professor O'Neil's early work served to quantify the relationships between the stable isotopes of lighter elements such as hydrogen and oxygen and the earth's physical environment. In a series of classic papers in the late 1960s and early 1970s, he defined and quantified the systematic isotope geochemistry of deep crustal rocks, surficial rocks, the atmosphere and oceans, and moon rocks. These papers have formed the standard starting points for much of the research in isotope geochemistry worldwide for the past 25 years.

Professor O'Neil served as co-director of the Light Stable Isotope Laboratory in the Department of Geological Sciences, where he continued developing new techniques and applying his analyses to new kinds of materials, such as phosphates and mammalian teeth. He and his students studied a broad range of topics, including alteration of marine sediments; interactions between natural waters and hostrocks; the effects of high pressures and temperatures on deeply-buried rocks; mechanisms of formation of gold, silver, and uranium deposits; volcanic processes in Hawaii and the Aleutian Islands; and climate change. He taught at all levels and particularly enjoyed his classes on the interactions between the earth's climate regimes and humankind. A caring and thoughtful advisor to graduate students, he maintained an open-door policy welcoming all to come for help with any geochemical problem.

Professor O'Neil published over 160 papers in professional journals and served on the advisory boards of the National Science Foundation and the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. He is a fellow of the American Geophysical Union and of the Geological Society of America, and is the recipient of the 2004 V.M. Goldschmidt Medal, the highest honor bestowed by the Geochemical Society.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for Victor Haim Perera who was a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan from 1959 to 1963. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

After graduating from Brooklyn College with a Bachelor of Arts, Victor Perera attended the University of Michigan where he received a Master of Arts in English literature. He was a teaching fellow at Michigan in the early 1960s and then a fact checker at *The New Yorker*. A Hopwood winner in 1961, he later served as a national judge for the prestigious writing award. He moved to California and accepted a position as a lecturer in literature, writing, and journalism at the University of California, Santa Cruz (1972-1979). He was also a lecturer at the University of California, Berkeley (1993-1998). Besides *The New Yorker*, Mr. Perera worked at various times for *The New Republic* and *The New York Times Magazine*.

Victor Perera was a memoirist, journalist, and novelist fascinated by the enduring cultures of Sephardic Jews and the Maya Indians. His parents were Sephardim from Jerusalem who immigrated to Guatemala City in the 1920s. He was born in Guatemala City in 1934 and moved to Brooklyn with his family when he was 12. The 1995 memoir, *The Cross and the Pear Tree: A Sephardic Journey*, told the story of his ancestors' global wanderings. Tracing the Perera name back to the home of the Sephardim in medieval Spain, the book follows the family's migrations through Portugal, France, Italy, and Greece to 19th-century Jerusalem.

The Cross and the Pear Tree is one of three books Perera wrote with Jewish themes. The Conversion, published in 1970, is a historic novel about the Jews of Spain, and Rites: A Guatemalan Boyhood, published in 1986, is a fictionalized account of his childhood.

Mr. Perera remained closely connected to Guatemala, especially to the plight of the country's indigenous Mayas. In *Unfinished Conquest: The Guatemalan Tragedy* (University of California Press, 1993), he documented a campaign by that country's army that resulted in the deaths of close to one-third of the nation's 85,000 Mayas. In *The Last Lords of Palenque: The Lacandon Mayas of the Mexican Rain Forest* (Little, Brown, 1982), written with the anthropologist Robert D. Bruce, he documented the lives and culture of a small, remote tribe he believed to be directly linked to ancient Maya theocrats.

In the last stage of his career, Mr. Perera, who had been consistently concerned about human rights, became deeply interested in ecological issues, and found his voice as an activist for the salvaging of the world's remaining whales. He stated that, "Whales can help us understand that

human intelligence is only one part of a cosmic Logos that seeks harmony and balance in all its component elements." His book, *Of Whales and Men*, was unfinished at the time of his death.

All who knew him described Victor Perera as a man of extraordinary empathy. A border-crosser and an "other-sider," he felt himself to be the child of many diasporas. In frequent travels around the United States, Central and South America, Europe, and the Middle East, he spoke alongside the oppressed, the forgotten, and the misunderstood. He was a cultural anthropologist, not through formal training, but from a sense of passionate vocation, from the heart. In his writing, he sought, in his own words, "to know better the soul within me, to see, to be illuminated. I write to find my peers, other seekers who strive to become part of a regenerative process in a time of destruction and decay."

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for C. Wilbur Peters who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1949 until he retired in 1988. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

C. Wilbur Peters was born in Baltimore, Maryland in 1918. He attended The Johns Hopkins University where he received his Bachelor of Arts in 1938 and his Doctorate in 1949. Professor Peters came to the Michigan physics faculty as an instructor in 1949, joining the group that had established Michigan as a world center for infra-red spectroscopy. He soon established his own laboratory and attracted a group of able graduate students, eventually chairing a dozen doctoral committees. He also established his reputation as a friendly, engaged teacher with a deep understanding of physics that he was willing to share with all.

Beyond his studies in molecular spectroscopy, Professor Peters made two research contributions that are landmarks in 20th-century physics. In early 1956, he and his undergraduate student Larry Curtis developed the method of making spatially-ordered, flexible bundles of step-index optical fibers and provided Basil Hirschowitz of the Michigan Medical School with the first flexible fiber-optic gastroscope, thus paving the way for the endoscopy and arthroscopic surgery that is so important in modern medicine. In 1963, his skill in optical instrumentation made possible the first experiments that generated optical harmonics. This work, done in collaboration with faculty colleagues Peter Franken and Gabriel Weinreich and with undergraduate Alan Hill, opened up the entire field of non-linear optics that is now central to pure and applied laser science.

C. Wilbur Peters retired from the active faculty in 1988; he died in 1989. The Michigan chapter of the Society of Physics Students is named in his honor.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for Richard D. Sacks who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1969 until his death in 2006. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Richard Sacks received a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in 1965 and his Doctorate from the University of Wisconsin in 1969. Professor Sacks began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Michigan in 1969 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1979. He served as associate chair in the Department of Chemistry from 1987 to 1992.

Professor Sacks was internationally recognized for his pioneering work on analytical instrumentation. His research first focused on novel atomic emission spectroscopic methods. In the 1970s he developed exploding thin film platforms for solids analysis that combined simplicity of sample introduction with unprecedented low detection limits. In the mid-1980s he turned his attention to innovative approaches to high-speed gas chromatographic separations of complex mixtures of volatile organic compounds. His methodologies reduced measurement times almost 100-fold and attracted great academic and industrial interest. This work led Professor Sacks and several of his students to form a spin-off company, Chromatofast, Inc., that commercialized instrumentation invented in his laboratory. During the last years of his life he and his students used semiconductor techniques to produce microchip high speed gas chromatography systems in which the entire instrument was condensed to about the size of a coin. During his career, Professor Sacks and his co-workers published more than 150 research papers on these topics and presented their findings at scientific conferences all over the world. In 2006 he received the Anachem Award for his outstanding research and teaching in the field of analytical chemistry.

Professor Sacks was an outstanding educator. He taught undergraduate and graduate students the principles of modern analytical chemistry and instrumentation, and was the driving force in modernizing the analytical chemistry curriculum. He served as mentor to more than 35 Ph.D. students who went on to distinguished careers in academia, industry, and government laboratories. He passed away in 2006 at the age of 63.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be five years with the possibility of renewal.

The College of Literature, Science, and the Arts seeks to name an existing collegiate professorship for Stanley E. Seashore who was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1955 until he retired in 1983. A stipend funded from College resources will accompany this professorship.

Stanley Seashore received a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Iowa in 1937 and Master of Arts from the University of Minnesota in 1939. For eleven years he was employed in the private sector, first with a major steel corporation and then with a prominent management consulting firm where he became increasingly concerned with organizational politics, structures, and change. In 1950 he returned to his studies at the University of Michigan and took a part time assignment as a research assistant in the Survey Research Center at the Institute for Social Research (ISR). He completed his Doctorate in 1954 and began his postdoctoral career in the Department of Psychology where a small cluster of graduate students wanted to specialize in the social psychology of formal organizations and where a resident cluster of qualified faculty were doing research in that area. Thus the doctoral program in organizational psychology naturally evolved from this group.

Professor Seashore joined the faculty at Michigan as an assistant professor in 1955 and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1963. He served as chair of the doctoral program in organizational psychology and as assistant to the director at ISR followed by assistant director and coordinator of the organizational behavior program.

Professor Seashore was prominent among those whose broadening view contributed to the transition of an individually oriented industrial psychology, with its emphasis on personnel selection and placement and on problems of individual worker attitudes, into a more system-oriented and interdisciplinary psychology. This development was reflected in the name change of the American Psychological Association's (APA) Division 14 from Industrial Psychology to the Division of Industrial and Organizational Psychology. The expansion of the field is also visible in universities, where organizational psychology has become an important subject in schools of business, education, social work, and public health. Professor Seashore encouraged this evolution. His own work exemplified its contributions and it remained a great source of satisfaction to him in his later years.

Professor Seashore was active in professional associations, including president of APA Division 14, service on the committee that wrote the first code of research ethics for the APA, and participation on the editorial boards of numerous journals in his field. He had a continuing

interest in comparative research on organizations and collaborated with colleagues in Norway, Sweden, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom. After his retirement in 1987, he worked intensively with the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues, of which he was a long-time member. Professor Seashore died in 1999. He was a modest, generous, and openminded man who is remembered with respect and affection.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of appointment will be five years with the possibility of renewal.

On the recommendation of the director of the Department of Nursing and with the endorsement of the Management Team of the School of Health Professions and Studies at the University of Michigan-Flint, we are pleased to recommend the transfer of appointment for Huey-Ming Tzeng, from associate professor of nursing, without tenure, University of Michigan-Ann Arbor, to professor of nursing, with tenure, Department of Nursing, School of Health Professions and Studies, University of Michigan-Flint, effective August 1, 2010. Professor Tzeng will also serve as associate director, Department of Nursing, School of Health Professions and Studies.

Professor Tzeng received her Bachelor of Science degree from National Yang-Ming Medical College, Taipei, Taiwan, in 1990, and her Master of Science degree and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in 1994 and 1997, respectively. She also holds registered nurse licenses in both Taiwan and Michigan. Professor Tzeng joined the faculty at the University of Michigan in 2006 as associate professor of nursing, without tenure, in the School of Nursing, University of Michigan-Ann Arbor.

Professor Tzeng has developed an international reputation, especially in Taiwan, for her work in hospital safety and clinical activities in hospital units, specifically in understanding the determinants of falls and to develop and test interventions at the facility system-level to prevent falls of adults in inpatient care. Her research is extensive and has led to continuous funding of many grants, one of which was an R03 from the National Institutes of Health. She has published many data-based papers in her area of expertise and in total over 70 peer-reviewed journals with seven more under review, one book, and five book chapters as well as presenting papers at over 45 conferences all over the world. Professor Tzeng serves as a consulting editor for *Nursing Ethics* since 2007 and serves on the *Nurse Educator* Manuscript Review Panel since 2007. In 2010 she was the recipient of the Sigma Theta Tau, Rho Chapter's Award for Excellence in Nursing Research.

Professor Tzeng is equally successful in teaching and maintains a substantial teaching load with her classes being heavily subscribed. Graduate students report that she is excellent and she has served as the thesis advisor for seven students in the School of Nursing, University of Michigan-Ann Arbor.
