Mona L. Goldman, Ph.D., research assistant professor of psychiatry in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on June 30, 2013.

Professor Goldman received her A.B. (1966), A.M. (1968), M.H.S.A. (1981), and Ph.D. (1992) degrees from the University of Michigan. She joined the University of Michigan as a research fellow in 1993, and was appointed to research investigator in 1995, and research assistant professor in 2005.

Professor Goldman's research applied the principles and methods of epidemiology to develop and evaluate innovative pharmacologic, psychosocial, and programmatic treatments for schizophrenia and related disorders. Her collaborative research projects explored a range of topics including the functional targeting of transcranial magnetic stimulation for the treatment of refractory auditory hallucinations in schizophrenia, deep brain stimulation for treatment-resistant depression, improving treatments for major depression by identifying predictors of response and relapse in electroconvulsive therapy, and sensitivity to thermal stimuli in schizophrenia. She was actively involved in a number of notable clinical trials to advance new treatment options for schizophrenic and schizoaffective patients. Professor Goldman also worked on the development, implementation, and evaluation of innovative programs to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of services for homeless individuals with mental illness. She taught courses on evidence-based medicine, study design, and statistical methods to several cohorts of medical fellows and house officers. Professor Goldman generously shared her time and research expertise with colleagues, community organizations, and professional associations.

The Regents now salute this distinguished scholar by naming Mona L. Goldman, research assistant professor emerita of psychiatry.
