On the recommendation of the executive committees of the Department of American Culture and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Su'ad Abdul Khabeer as associate professor of American culture, with tenure, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2017.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Su'ad Abdul Khabeer received her Bachelor of Science from Georgetown University in 2000, Islamic Studies Diploma from Abu Nour University in 2002, and her Doctorate from Princeton University in 2011.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

Professor Khabeer began her instructional career as an assistant professor in the Department of Anthropology at Purdue University in 2011 and was being promoted to associate professor, with tenure, in fall 2017.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Abdul Khabeer is a cultural anthropologist whose research and teaching focus on race, Blackness, and Muslims in the United States. Her book, Muslim Cool: Race, Religion, and Hip Hop in the United States (New York University Press, 2016), is based on extensive fieldwork in Chicago, examining the complex engagement of African American and South Asian American Muslim youth with hip hop. The book's power derives from multiple sources. Its methods are solid and innovative blending rigorous anthropological research with adventurous performance ethnography. The range of knowledge Professor Abdul Khabeer demonstrates is remarkable—a deep knowledge of hip hop music and culture combines with mastery of interdisciplinary literatures on racialization in the United States, and with an assured understanding of debates within Islamic thought and communities. Her impressive skill as a story-teller and prose stylist are important, but we want to emphasize the book's originality and importance as an argument

for the close interconnection of Blackness and Muslim identities in the United States. Professor Adbul Khabeer has also published substantial articles in peer-reviewed journals and important essay collections, has an impressive performance and public engagement portfolio, and has begun work on a second major research project with a transnational siting in Brooklyn, New York, and the United Arab Emirates. Her scholarship and teaching are highly interdisciplinary, drawing from and contributing to the fields of African American studies, critical race and ethnic studies, religious studies, performance, anthropology, and American studies. The Arab and Muslim American Studies (AMAS) Program at Michigan is a vibrant area of scholarship and student demand for it continues to increase.

Student evaluations of Professor Abdul Khabeer's courses show that she is a highly effective teacher for many students. She consistently receives high marks for being knowledgeable and well-prepared. Her research and teaching will broaden the current scope of the Arab and Muslim American Studies (AMAS) Program in a very important way—it has long been a goal to have someone who focuses on African American Muslims. American Culture has close connections with the Department of Afroamerican and African Studies, with three joint appointments and other faculty also frequently serving together on graduate student committees. Professor Abdul Khabeer will immediately become an important collaborator in this network. She has an interest in the Latino/a Studies Program partly through her own heritage and she is connected through the Muslim diaspora with Asian/Pacific Islander American Studies Program, sharing an interest in musical cultures and performance with other American Culture faculty.

Searle Professor and Chair of the Department of Internal Medicine, and with the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Ulus Atasoy, M.D. as associate professor of internal medicine, with tenure, Medical School, effective October 1, 2017.

Academic Degrees:

Dr. Atasoy received a bachelor of arts degree from Rutgers College in 1975, followed by a master's in the philosophy of science in 1979 from the University of Minnesota. In 1984, he received his medical degree from the University of Minnesota.

Professional Record:

Dr. Atasoy completed a residency in peadiatrics from 1984 to 1987 at the University of California, Los Angeles, followed by a fellowship in immunology at the National Institues of Health from 1987 to 1990, and a fellowship in allergy-immunology at Duke University from 1990 to 1994. He was appointed as a research associate in pediatric immunology and senior research associate in molecular genetics and microbiology at Duke University in 1994. In 2004, Dr. Atasoy was appointed as an assistant professor in the Departments of Surgery, Molecular Microbiology & Immunology, and Child Health at the University of Missouri, and was promoted to associate professor in 2004.

Summary of Evaluation:

Dr. Atasoy is well regarded as a physician scientist whose research focuses on the role of posttranscriptional regulation in controlling the expression of genes important for inflammation and cancer. He has made a number of discoveries which have important implications for allergic diseases and asthma, and may also have relevance in autoimmune diseases and in breast cancer. Dr. Atasoy has had solid grant funding throughout his career, and currently serves as the principal investigator on an NIH R01 competitive renewal grant, and as co-investigator on another NIH R01 project. Academic Degrees:

Dr. Ohi received her Ph.D. in cell biology from Vanderbilt University in 2002.

Professional Record:

Dr. Ohi completed a post-doctoral fellowship in cell biology at Harvard Medical School from 2002 to 2007. She was subsequently appointed as an assistant professor of cell and developmental biology at Vanderbilt University in 2007. In 2014, she was promoted to associate professor of cell and developmental biology and was appointed as associate professor of biochemistry in 2016.

Summary of Evaluation:

Dr. Ohi's group is interested in understanding how large molecular machines are structurally organized and how this organization translates into function within the cell. Towards this goal, her laboratory employs a wide range of approaches that include single particle cryo-electron microscopy, NMR analysis, biochemistry, X-ray crystallography, and yeast genetics. One major focus is to dissect the molecular organization and function of the spliceosome complexes involved in mRNA splicing. The goal of her work is to generate a series of detailed snapshots of the spliceosome as it assembles, catalyzes the splicing reaction, and disassembles using a combination of biochemical, genetic, and structural strategies. Dr. Ohi's research is highly regarded. In 2008, she received the competitive NIH Directors New Innovator Award, and, in 2017, she was chosen as a Vanderbilt Chancellor Faculty Fellow (awarded to a select group of outstanding tenured associate professors across the University). Her research is currently supported by four multi-PI R01 awards from the National Institutes of Health. Dr. Ohi routinely publishes in high impact journals and is requested to write review articles as a thought leader in the field of single particle cryo-EM. She is also widely sought as a speaker at international and national conferences as well as at top-tier academic

institutions. For example, she has been invited to be a co-instructor and organizer for the inaugural 2017 Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory two-week-intensive "Cryo-Electron Microscopy" course.

She has presented lectures and moderated classroom discussion in the graduate level courses Introduction to Structural Biology, Introduction to Modern Biological Microscopy, and Graduate Seminar in Molecular Biophysics. Dr. Ohi has consistently been ranked as one of the best lecturers in the Introduction to Structural Biology course. For the past three years, she has been the course director for Special Topics in Cell Biology, Nobel Prize Winners. She has also taught in the undergraduate course Nucleic Acid Transactions. In addition to Dr. Ohi's extensive experience in classroom instruction, she has been very involved in teaching in her laboratory, providing hands-on training to post-doctoral fellows, graduate students, and undergraduate students. Kent Christensen Collegiate Professor and Interim Chair of the Department of Cell and Developmental Biology, and with the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Ryoma Ohi, Ph.D. as associate professor of cell and developmental biology, with tenure, Medical School, effective September 1, 2017.

Academic Degrees:

Dr. Ohi received his Ph.D. in cell biology from Vanderbilt University in 1998.

Professional Record:

Dr. Ohi completed a post-doctoral fellowship in cell biology and systems biology at Harvard Medical School from 1999 to 2007. He was appointed as an assistant professor of cell and developmental biology at Vanderbilt University in 2007 and was promoted to associate professor in 2014.

Summary of Evaluation:

The overall goal of Dr. Ohi's research is to understand how microtubules are organized and remodeled in space and time to carry out diverse biological functions. His work focuses on the essential process of cell division, which is required for the continuation of life in all organisms. During cell division, microtubules generate forces that move chromosomes, and therefore play a key role in preserving genome stability. Because cell division is key for the proliferation of all cells—including cancer cells—cell division is a major target for therapeutic intervention of cancer. Dr. Ohi aims to leverage his finding to discover new therapeutic agents that are useful as cancer medicines. Over the past ten years, Dr. Ohi's laboratory has made several important contributions to this highly competitive field. He defined a new mechanism that governs chromosome oscillations, discovered and characterized a new pathway that can drive assembly of the mitotic spindle, and demonstrated that actomyosin contractility controls MT stability during cytokinesis. A particularly exciting aspect of his work is that his efforts focused on spindle assembly have identified an ideal target, Kifl 5, for drug discovery. His lab is currently screening for small molecule inhibitors of Kifl 5. These and other studies from Dr. Ohi's

laboratory demonstrated that he is a highly creative thinker and very effective at determining a correct path to answer critical questions.

Recent and Significant Publications

Dr. Ohi has served or continues to serve on 24 graduate dissertation committees and has served on 15 Ph.D. candidacy examination committees. In addition, Dr. Ohi served as a co-director for cell and developmental biology's research exchange seminar series for six years. This seminar series is the primary mechanism for trainees to share their research with other trainees and faculty in the department.

He also participated in writing a final draft of the Diversity, Inclusion, and Community Committee Report.

He is well poised to drive scientific advancement and training in several important areas and to collaborate with faculty not only in cell and developmental biology, but also in chemical biology and in the Cancer Center. On the recommendation of the faculty of the School of Information, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Libby Hemphill as associate professor of information, without tenure, School of Information, effective September 1, 2017.

ACADEMIC DEGREES

Libby Hemphill received her Ph.D. from the University of Michigan School of Information in 2009. In 2004, she received her master's in human-computer interaction from the School of Information at the University of Michigan. She received her bachelors, with honors in 2001, in general studies in the Humanities from the University of Chicago.

PROFESSIONAL RECORD

From 2009-2010, Professor Hemphill was a visiting scholar in the Center for Policy Informatics at the School of Public Affairs at Arizona State University. In 2010, she was appointed as an assistant professor of communication and information studies in the Lewis College of Human Sciences at the Illinois Institute of Technology (Illinois Tech). She was promoted to associate professor, with tenure, at Illinois Tech in 2016 where she directs the Collective Action and Social Media (CASM) Lab. Professor Hemphill is also the director for graduate studies in the Illinois Tech Department of Humanities.

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION

Professor Hemphill's research is interdisciplinary and draws on theory and methods from communication studies, information science, and computer science to investigate online behavior. Her greatest scholarly impact is in the area of political expression in social media, in particular the development of the #Polar Score which can be used to identify the partisan valence of a Twitter stream (e.g., allowing determination of an individual politician's partisan orientation). Professor Hemphill's 2016 paper, "#Polar Scores: Measuring partisanship using

social media content," was one of the first efforts to use an algorithm to measure partisanship using Twitter content and represented a significant improvement over previous research approaches in terms of both speed and scope for determining the ideological valence of Twitter users and hashtags which accounts for longitudinal drift. Many communication scholars are trying to understand whether new types of media, especially social media, are contributing to the high level of political polarization in the United States and other advanced democracies. This article develops a method for measuring polarization in social media posts. Additionally, Professor Hemphill and her co-authors provide documentation of their method, the open-source software to implement the technique, and their data to invite replication of the research and other research applications. Professor Hemphill's research is methodologically-driven scholarship with real-world applications that has relevance to both political science and communication research.

Professor Hemphill's research is relevant to both the School of Information (UMSI) and the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR). Her research on political partisanship, represented by the #Polar Score, previously discussed, is strongly aligned with the planned UMSI Center for Safe and Constructive Online Public Engagement (SCOPE). One aim of SCOPE is the development of a recurring index of civility and deliberativeness in social media channels. The emphasis on open data has also led Professor Hemphill to address questions about data management and curation to support computational social science — a theme directly related to her proposed role as director of the Resource Center for Minority Data (RCMD) at ICPSR.

In a related research area, Professor Hemphill examines how social media can be used by rural and marginalized urban populations to influence policy. Although this is a relatively new line of research, Professor Hemphill has already received support in the form of an NSF award and has published interesting preliminary results (e.g., an examination of how an Asian-American immigrant community in Chicago used Facebook to facilitate network development and coordination of offline activities). Professor Hemphill's commitment to social change is consistent with the mission of UMSI to help people use information — with technology — to make a better world. Her research and engagement with the changing role of data, open data, and data access for underrepresented and marginalized communities fits with and will provide a valuable vision to her proposed position as the RCMD director.

Professor Hemphill is an exemplary teacher who employs diverse materials, assessments, and perspectives in the classroom to create an experiential, engaging, and effective learning environment. She has received teaching awards from the Lewis College of Human Sciences at Illinois Tech (2015) as well as from the UMSI and Rackham Graduate School at the University of Michigan during her doctoral studies.

Professor Hemphill's teaching style, built on a foundation of diversity and experience, helps students learn to be precise; focuses on logical thinking; promotes communicating effectively and respectfully; and encourages careful analysis of information. For example, when introducing new concepts to students, she leverages course materials that range from textbooks and academic articles to popular press nonfiction books and television shows. In her Social Networks course, she uses a chapter from Easley and Kleinberg's book Networks, Crowds, and Markets and an

episode from the ABC's show Castle to illustrate concepts about affiliation networks and data capture. Using these sources, students practice documenting and presenting network data—creating an affiliation network—and providing a powerful example of the role inference places in our judgments about social relationships. The diversity of materials enables Professor Hemphill to reach and engage students with different learning styles.

In terms of professional service, Professor Hemphill has an exceptional service record. At her current institution, she is the director of graduate studies for the Humanities Department. She is also the vice-chair of the Illinois Tech Institutional Review Board on which she has served for five years. Her other Illinois Tech service included chair of the Digital Humanities Faculty Search Committee, member of the Lewis College 2025 Committee, chair of the Introduction to the Professions Curriculum Committee, and member of the Humanities Department Chair's Advisory Committee.

Within the broader research community, Professor Hemphill is an active journal and conference reviewer for top publications in information science, communication studies, and human-computer interaction. She has served multiple times on the program committees of top conferences in communication studies (International Conference on Web and Social Media (ICWSM)) and human-computer interaction (GROUP). She was also on the advisory board of the Digital Societies and Social Technologies (DSST) Summer Institute an interdisciplinary community of senior Ph.D. students, junior and senior researchers from academia and industry researchers who gather to share ideas, define new research directions, and provide one another with feedback on ongoing projects. Finally, Professor Hemphill has organized and led multiple workshops at conferences, including one on Feminism and Social Media Research at the ACM Conference on Computer-Supported Cooperative Work (CSCW).

The George Herbert Mead Collegiate Professorship was established by the Regents in May 2012. George Herbert Mead was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1891 to 1894 and was a major figure in the history of American philosophy and one of the founders of Pragmatism along with James Hayden Tufts and John Dewey. A centrally funded stipend accompanies this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Ackerman received his Bachelor of Arts at the University of Chicago in 1 979. He completed his Master of Science degree in 1981 at The Ohio State University and his Doctorate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1994. He joined our faculty as an associate professor in 2001 and was promoted to professor, with tenure, in 2009. He is also a professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science in the College of Engineering and a professor in the Department of Learning Health Sciences in the Medical School.

Professor Ackerman's major research areas are human-computer interaction (HCI) and computer-supported cooperative work (CSCW). His research addresses a variety of issues concerning social media, collaborative information access, pervasive environments, organizational memory, privacy, the design of technical systems, and the sociology of information. He has published widely in HCI and CSCW, investigating collaborative information creation and access in online knowledge communities, medical settings, and

expertise sharing. His current research examines how expertise may be shared in medical settings. Based on ethnographic, interview-based, and technically-based studies, Professor Ackerman's research group has examined how different information configurations help people with chronic conditions, their caregivers, and their clinicians. He has also examined the sociotechnical engineering of those configurations. This will lead to benefits to patients, communities, medical institutions, and systems as well as to the companies who produce electronic health records (EHRs).

Professor Ackerman is widely recognized by his peers and profession. He was named a fellow of the Association of Computing Machinery (ACM) in 2013 and was elected a Computer-Human Interaction (CHI) Fellow in 2009. His published works have been cited over 12,800 times and his h-index is 48 (Google Scholar as of July 2017) indicating his strong impact in his field. He has a strong funding history and is currently the co-principal investigator on one grant and a co-investigator on three others.

She has also been involved in organizing many other conferences and workshops in addition to typical service rendered as a referee for peer reviewed papers and grants.

Professor Calvet co-authored a major review in the field's most prestigious review journal, Annual Review of Astronomy and Astrophysics (ARAA), as well as papers in Nature and Science. She continues to receive invitations to speak at topical conferences and present colloquia at peer institutions. She involves undergraduate and graduate students in her research, including visiting international students from her close ties with National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM). She has initiated four funded research projects since the last renewal in 2012, including a new multi-year NASA grant to support her research. Professor Calvet has demonstrated that the strength of her mentoring results in early career success on more than one occasion, including a former mentee starting a junior faculty position at Boston University. She continues to be a leader in the study of circumstellar disk structure and evolution, star and planet formation, and early stellar evolution.

Professor Calvet teaches a regular load of courses, specializing in the advanced "Stellar Astrophysics" classes for undergraduate concentrators and graduate students. The size of this undergraduate class has swelled in recent years to double or triple in size due in large part to the positive word-of-mouth reviews by previous classes coupled with our expanding cohort of majors for which she is largely responsible. She has taught the popular "Introduction to Astrophysics" course for majors and other physical scientists. Finally, she has taught several courses that introduce undergraduate students to the excitement of research in the field including "New Discoveries in Astronomy" as well as "Senior Seminar." She is a thoughtful teacher, always extremely well prepared, and willing to go the extra mile for any student in need.

This professorship was established in the Provost Office and was named in July 2012. A stipend from college resources will accompany this professorship. Appointments may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Duan is a world-leading theorist on quantum information science and is well-known for his research in this field. His studies solve critical issues for scalable quantum computation, simulation, and networking, and guild the experimental efforts at the research frontier. Together with other colleagues, he proposed an architecture for trapped ion quantum computation through a photon connection; this architecture is taken now as one of the leading candidates for realization of large-scale quantum computation and heavily funded by the U.S. government. He proposed and demonstrated the first universal set of geometric quantum gates using diamond defect spins. The geometric quantum gates help to make quantum computation most robust to noise. He proposed a scheme to realize macroscopic quantum superposition of nano-diamonds. He and his post-doctoral scholar proposed the first scheme to realize an exotic state of ultracold matter, the Weyl exception ring, which was featured as the editor's suggestion upon its publication this year in *Physical Review Letters*.

He has published 52 papers in renowned physics journals since 2012, including a number of publications in *Nature*, *Nature Communications*, and *Physical Review Letters*. As a concrete measure of the impacts of his research in physics, Professor Duan has published 158 papers in refereed journals during his 20-year research career. His papers have been cited over 20,000 times and among them about 9,000 citations are from the past five years. Professor Duan's

group has been well funded and he is sought-after by many teams for large quantum information or AMO collaboration projects.

Professor Duan has taught several different courses including Quantum Information Science, Advanced Atomic Physics, both undergraduate and graduate Quantum Mechanics, and Mathematical Methods for Physics. In addition, he has consistently supervised a number of graduate students in his group during the last five years. Six graduate students obtained Ph.D.'s from his group since 2013 and most continued their academic careers by pursuing post-doctoral study at renowned universities such as Harvard, Yale, National Institute of Standards and Technology, and Maryland.

Professor Duan has served in several important departmental committees during the last five years, including the executive committee, faculty search committee, and graduate admission committee. He acted as the co-director of Tsinghua-Michigan Joint Center for Quantum Information and organized the visitor, student exchange, and summer school program. He also served as an organizer for a number of national and international workshops and conferences in the quantum information or AMO field.

The Gertrude Buck Collegiate Professorship in Education was named in April 2007. Gertrude Buck received her BS in 1884, her MS in 1895, and her PhD in 1898, all from the University of Michigan. She joined the English Department at Vassar in 1897, and taught there until her death in 1922. At Vassar, where she developed the First Year Composition program, Professor Buck was a beloved teacher, admired for her sincerity. On the national scene, Professor Buck became known for her work in rhetoric and composition. In her scholarly work, she emphasized an organic approach to the processes of writing; a contextualized, rather than isolated, approach to the study of grammar; and an emphasis on democracy in teaching. As she put it, "Only as we relate other people's experiences and ideas to our own are we able to see what we have to contribute, however small it may be, to the sum of human consciousness." Appointments may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Gere received her BA in 1966 from Colby College. She earned a Master of Arts in teaching degree in 1967 from Colgate University and a PhD in 1974 from the University of Michigan. From 1967 to 1970, Professor Gere was a teacher of English at Princeton High School in Princeton, New Jersey. She served as a lecturer at the University of Michigan from 1970 to 1971 and a research associate from 1974 to 1975 in the Center for Research on Learning and Teaching. In 1975, she was appointed as an assistant professor of English at the University of Washington and was promoted to associate professor in 1981. Professor Gere returned to the University of Michigan in 1987 as an associate professor in the Department of English and in the School of Education. She was promoted to professor in 1989. She currently serves as the

director of the Joint PhD Program in English and Education. She has been the director of the Sweetland Writing Center since 2008. In 2010, she was appointed as an Arthur F. Thurnau Professor in recognition of her excellent teaching of undergraduates.

Professor Gere's research interests include the teaching of writing, literacy development, composition studies, teacher education, and the figure of the female teacher. She regularly teaches courses on composition studies and methods of teaching English, and her most recent project explored the topic of knowledge transfer in first year writing curriculum. The Richard Carl Jelinek Professorship was established in January 1992 by a gift from Dr. Jelinek and donations from graduates and friends of the Department of Health Services Management and Policy. The Professorship is intended to provide support for an internationally recognized expert in the field of health services management and policy who will, through his or her teaching and research, strengthen the management of the nation's hospitals and health care organizations. This award is for five years and is renewable.

Professor Grazier received a B.S. degree from Valparaiso University in 1973, a M.S. degree from Notre Dame in 1976, and both a M.P.H. and Dr.P.H. degree from the University of California in 1978 and 1981, respectively.

Upon completion of her doctoral degree, Professor Grazier was appointed as an assistant professor at the Yale University School of Medicine, where she was promoted to associate professor in 1986. From 1987 until 1992, Professor Grazier held the position of assistant professor, King Sweesy and Robert Womack Chair in Medical Research and Public Health at the University of California-Berkeley School of Public Health. From 1992-1997, she served as an associate professor of health care finance and program director in the Sloan Graduate Program in Health Services Administration at Cornell University. Professor Grazier joined the University of Michigan in 1997 as an associate professor of health management and policy, with tenure, and was promoted to professor in 2003. She served as the chair of the Department of Health Management and Policy from 2011-2016. In 2006, she was appointed as a professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the Medical School. She also serves on the steering committee of

the U of M Comprehensive Depression Center, and the leadership group of the Institute of Health Policy and Innovation.

Professor Grazier teaches graduate courses in corporate finance, insurance and payment systems, and case studies in healthcare management. She consistently receives high student evaluation ratings for her courses. She has also taught extensively in international and national executive programs.

One major area of Professor Grazier's research is in health care finance, with special emphasis on the effect of managed care arrangements and risk adjustment methods on mental health and substance abuse services, costs, and quality of care. Under sponsorship from the Center for Healthcare Research and Transformation, she is studying the impact of changes in the federal behavioral health parity law, and conducting a meta-analysis of depression and primary care. Supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, she identified models of integrated services for vulnerable populations. She completed a study of health plan choice behavior, funded by AHRQ and BCBS-M Foundation. With support from the NIMH and NIAAA, she has studied the effects of a mental health carve-out on use and cost of mental health and medical services among an employed population, and the long term consequences of alcoholism in a community-based sample. Through support from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the BCBS-M Foundation, she has examined the reintegration of medical and mental health services in employed and Medicaid populations. These sponsors have also supported study of the variation in risk adjustment methods used in provider profiling.

On the recommendation of the Departments of History of Art, Philosophy, Comparative Literature, and with the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the reappointment of Daniel A. Herwitz as the Frederick G. L. Huetwell Professor, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

As a result of a generous gift from the estate of Frederick G. L. Huetwell, the provost and the president awarded the college four endowed professorships, which were approved by the Regents in April 1995. A fifth professorship was approved in August 2012. The primary objective of the professorships is to attract and honor distinguished senior faculty in the social sciences and humanities. The appointments are for five-year renewable terms.

Professor Herwitz first received the Frederick G. L. Huetwell Professorship in September 2012. Since then he has continued to be active in his area of research which includes heritage, art and culture in decolonizing, and transitional nations. He has published two scholarly monographs, Aesthetics, Arts and Politics in a Global World and Heritage, Culture and Politics in the Postcolony, in addition to numerous essays, book chapters, catalogue essays, and edited books during this time. Notably, Professor Herwitz wrote an essay called "Joel and Ethan Coen" for Makers of Jewish Modernity; this book won the National Jewish Book Award for anthologies in 2016. He also recently published a short story "In the Tropic of..." in the Michigan Quarterly Review and has submitted a collection of twelve short stories titled Those Who Come and Go to publishers. These endeavors reflect his research touching on political and social changes in South Africa and their effects on the everyday lives of those returning to the country. He currently has two forthcoming catalogue essays, one book chapter, and one volume for which he edited and wrote the introduction. Professor Herwitz was the recipient of four fellowships between 2012 and 2016 that have supported his research.

During the past five years, Professor Herwitz has taught upper-level courses at the undergraduate level and two courses at the graduate level in the departments of comparative literature, philosophy, and the history of art. He also taught courses during spring-summer term with broad appeal to students. His high teaching evaluations reflect the enthusiasm of students for his lively presentation of ideas and his dynamic presence in the classroom.

Professor Herwitz's service extends far beyond his teaching. He was the director of graduate studies in Comparative Literature from 2013 to 2015. He has consistently served on department and promotion committees and serves as a board member of the University Musical Society, the Advisory Board for HUMA (Centre for the Humanities in Africa), and the editorial board for the University of Michigan Press African Studies Book Series, and on the Steering Committee of the International Institute and the African Studies Center. He is a prolific and engaged scholar as well as committed teacher.

The collection was also a New York Times Notable Book, received the Rike Award for Poetry in 2012, and named one of the Top Three Best Poetry Collections by National Public Radio. Professor Kasischke has been a finalist for the Kingsley-Tufts Award, received the Bess Hokin Prize in 2013, and received the Prix Elle in 2014. In 2014, her novel, <u>White Bird in a Blizzard</u>, was released as a feature length film and premiered at the Sundance Film Festival. Two of her previous novels have been made into films while all of her other novels are presently under option.

Professor Kasischke received the Distinguished Faculty Achievement Award in 2013 for her teaching and much of her time is devoted to judging submissions for literary prizes. She has taught at dozens of conferences and seminars at many universities including the Michener Center, Boston College, Smith College, and the Geneva Writers' Conference. She gave a poetry reading at Harvard's Phi Beta Kappa Exercises in 2015 and each year she teaches at University

of Michigan's Bear River Writers Conference. Professor Kasischke has served as an advisor for dozens of graduate students as well as undergraduate creative writing theses with many of these students receiving Hopwood Awards and having their first collections of stories or poetry published. Many of her students have gone on to top graduate programs in creative writing or English.

Professor Kasischke has taken on the role of Hopwood Awards program director and director of undergraduate creative writing. She has mentored all "Introduction to Creative Writing" graduate student instructors and serves as an advisor to undergraduate students studying creative writing in the department. She has also worked to streamline the application process for the creative writing minor classes. Professor Kasischke has served on review committees for lecturers and one tenure committee while participating in general tenured faculty proceedings for promotion and tenure. She has assisted in the editing of several colleagues' works and has served as an outside reviewer for over a dozen tenure and promotion candidates at other colleges and universities. In 2012, she was the chair of the National Book Awards poetry committee and has been a featured participant in the Festival of North American Writers in Paris as well as a featured reader at the Associated Writing Programs Conference.

I am pleased to recommend the reappointment of Terrence J. McDonald as director, Bentley Historical Library, for a second five-year term, effective September 1, 2018 through August 31, 2023. This recommendation follows a reappointment review process.

Professor McDonald received his B.A. degree from Marquette University and his Ph.D. from Stanford University. After receiving his doctorate, he joined the University of Michigan faculty in 1980 as an assistant professor and was promoted through the ranks to professor in 1992. He served as the interim dean of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts (LSA) from July 2002-July 2003 and as the dean from July 2003 through August 2013. His first term as director of the Bentley Historical Library began in September 2013.

Professor McDonald is an award-winning historian of the United States, the recipient of almost every teaching award the university offers, and a seasoned administrator. The author or editor of four books and author of numerous articles, he has made important contributions to two fields, American urban political history and historical method. He has received prizes for his work from the Social Science History Association and the California Historical Society, has been a Guggenheim Fellow, and received other fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the University of Michigan Humanities Institute. In 1991, he was the Richard Hudson Research Professor in the Department of History, and in 2001, he was a Directeur d'Études at the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales in Paris.

Professor McDonald is widely recognized as an accomplished teacher and he has served the university in many administrative capacities. As dean of LSA, he skillfully led the college community through a period of transition and growth despite one of the most financially challenging periods that the university has ever seen.

As the director of the Bentley Historical Library, Professor McDonald has inspired appreciation throughout the university of the fundamental role of archives in the work of the university. This has been especially important during the university's bicentennial year. Under his leadership, the

Bentley has provided superb service leading up to and during this celebration of the university's history. He and the Bentley staff spent enormous amounts of time planning the Bicentennial and helping various units launch their efforts

With Professor McDonald's direction, the Bentley is working to achieve national leadership in general and specifically in digital curation and undergraduate education. The Bentley has received a Mellon Foundation grant to begin a nationally visible project to reinvent the workflow of archives. It has launched a system for tracking the use of its materials, which permits online advance reservation so researchers may find their selections waiting for them on arrival—a dream of researchers for decades. The library is also dedicated to improving undergraduate engagement with primary research materials. A new course on the history of the University of Michigan is the first step step in a plan to enhance the Bentley's contribution to engaged education at the undergraduate level as well as to begin a research program that will reveal the best way to use primary historical sources in undergraduate teaching. The Bentley is also rapidly becoming a national model in the training of archivists. The program, patterned after post-doctoral programs in the sciences, accepts applicants who have completed graduate training and who then gain experience by working in an archive.

Terrence J. McDonald is an outstanding scholar, a dedicated teacher and an accomplished administrator, and he has long been dedicated to the University of Michigan and its ideals. I am confident that he will continue to provide superb leadership to the Bentley Historical Library. With great enthusiasm, I recommend his reappointment, effective September 1, 2018.

Searle Professor and Chair of the Department of Internal Medicine, and with the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the reappointment of Shaomeng Wang, Ph.D. as the Warner-Lambert/Parke-Davis Professor of Medicine, Medical School, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

The Warner-Lambert/Parke-Davis Professorship in Medicine was established in December 1993 and was made possible through an endowment from the Warner-Lambert Company. Monies generated from the initial endowment reached a sufficient funding level to permit the establishment of two additional professorships in February 2006 to support Medical School investigators in scientific research in the fields of basic chemistry, molecular biology, biotechnology, genetics and/or human gene therapy. The appointment period is up to five years and may be renewed.

Dr. Wang's research has continued to focus on the discovery of novel small-molecule therapeutics. He has expanded his research program to target a number of PPIs, which regulate epigenetics, including histone readers, writers, and erasers, and from this research has advanced several classes of compounds into advanced preclinical development. Dr. Wang has established extensive collaborations with basic scientists, translational scientists and clinical investigators at the University of Michigan, as well as other institutions. He co-founded four University of Michigan start-up companies to help bring drugs into clinical development.

Dr. Wang has published more than 270 peer-reviewed articles, is the principal investigator of three R01 grants and several industry and foundation grants. He mentors sixteen post-doctoral students and junior faculty members, as well as five graduate students. Dr. Wang was recipient of the University of Michigan Distinguished Innovator Award in 2014, and serves as the editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Medicinal Chemistry*. He was appointed as the director of the Michigan Center for Therapeutic Innovation at the University of Michigan in 2016.

This professorship has allowed Dr. Wang to explore new and exciting research areas and generate new intellectual properties and preliminary data for grant applications. I am please, therefore, to recommend the reappointment of Shaomeng Wang, Ph.D. as the Warner-Lambert/Parke-Davis Professor of Medicine, Medical School, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Michael S. Barr as the Frank Murphy Collegiate Professor of Public Policy, Gerald R. Ford School of Public Policy, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

The Frank Murphy Collegiate Professorship in Public Policy was established by the Regents in August 2017. A stipend funded by school resources accompanies this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Frank Murphy attended the University of Michigan Law School, and graduated with a B.A. in 1912 and L.L.B. in 1914. He performed graduate work at Lincoln's Inn in London and Trinity College, Dublin and taught law at the University of Detroit for five years. Mr. Murphy was appointed as the first assistant United States attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan on August 9, 1919. He was elected judge of the Recorder's Court, Detroit's Criminal Court, and took office on January 1, 1924, serving seven years. In 1930, Mr. Murphy was elected as the mayor of Detroit and served from 1930 – 1933. He was appointed as the governor-general of the Philippines from 1933-1935. Mr. Murphy was elected the 35th governor of Michigan on November 3, 1936, and served one two-year term. He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Law degree by the University of Michigan in 1939. Also in 1939, he was appointed the 56th Attorney General of the United States. He established a Civil Liberties Unit in the United States Department of Justice to centralize enforcement responsibility for civil rights statutes. He served as the associate justice of the Supreme Court from 1940-1949.

Professor Barr received a B.A., with honors in history, *summa cum laude*, from Yale University in 1987. A Rhodes Scholar, he received a M.Phil. in international relations from Magdalen College, Oxford University. In 1992, he received a J.D. from Yale Law School. Following his legal education, Professor Barr served as a law clerk, first in the U.S. District Court, Southern District of New York, for the Honorable Pierre N. Leval, and then as clerk to Associate Justice

David Souter of the United States Supreme Court. Continuing in public service, he joined the policy planning staff of the U.S. Department of State. In 1995, he moved to the U.S. Department of Treasury where he was a special assistant to Secretary Robert E. Rubin before moving into the position of deputy assistant secretary of the treasury for community development policy, a role in which he served from 1997 to 2001. He concurrently served as a special advisor to President William J. Clinton, from 1999 to 2001. Professor Barr joined the University of Michigan Law School faculty in 2001 as an assistant professor of law. He is a leading scholar in the field of financial law and policy. He will continue to hold his current appointment as the Roy F. and Jean Humphrey Proffitt Professor of Law. On leave from the university in 2009-2010, Professor Barr again served in the Department of Treasury as an assistant secretary for financial institutions. In that capacity, he was a key architect of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010. Professor Barr played a central role in the development of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, and in policies to expand access to capital for small businesses.

Since returning from leave, Professor Barr has established and directed a new interdisciplinary Center on Finance, Law and Policy, bringing together faculty from across the university on projects designed to help make the financial system safer, fairer, and better harnessed to the needs of the real economy. His books include Financial Regulation: Law & Policy (Foundation Press 2016, with Howell Jackson and Margaret Tahyar), No Slack: The Financial Lives of Low-Income Americans (Brookings Press, 2012), Insufficient Funds (Russell Sage, 2009, co-edited with Rebecca Blank), and Building Inclusive Financial Systems (Brookings Press, 2007, co-edited with Anjali Kumar and Robert Litan). He has served as the Joan and Sanford Weill Dean of Public Policy since August 2017 and will continue in this capacity through July 2022. Professor Barr has served as an advisor to a range of public policy initiatives and organizations, including the Brookings Institution and the Center for American Progress, the FDIC Advisory Committee on Economic Inclusion, the Gates Foundation, and the Washington Center for Equitable Growth.

From 2005-2013, she was an associate director of the UM's Center for Managing Chronic Disease; in 2014 she served as the center's interim director.

Professor Connell's research focuses on the psychological and social context of health behavior and illness self-management from a lifespan developmental perspective. Her research interests include dementia family caregiving; knowledge and attitudes about dementia and dementia diagnosis among the general public; the role of art, creativity, and pets as sources of support for people with dementia; and strategies for scaling up evidence-based interventions for community-dwelling older adults. Professor Connell has published over 80 peer-reviewed articles and contributed eight book chapters. Her grant activity is extensive. Since joining the UM faculty, she has been the principal investigator for 24 research grants including an ongoing project funded by the National Institutes on Aging to adapt and implement an evidence-based heart disease self-management program for older adults in Detroit. She has been a co-principal investigator on 17 additional research projects and has delivered over 100 presentations at conferences nationally and internationally.

Professor Connell has served as an invited reviewer for a number of government and private agencies both in the U.S. and abroad, including the National Institutes of Health, Alzheimer's Association, Centers for Disease Control, Administration on Aging, and the Singapore National Medical Research Council. Since joining the UM faculty, Professor Connell has covered a menu of eight required and elective courses to master's and doctoral students. She also offered courses in the School of Public Health's On-Job/On-Campus program to executive master's students. Her current courses focus on aging and health behavior and chronic illness interventions. Her service to the School of Public Health and the university at large has been extensive, ranging from serving as chair or member of search, curriculum, admissions, and accreditation committees to being a member of the advisory board of the Google Faculty Learning Community, the Center for Research on Learning and Teaching and the MHealthy Advisory Committee. With the concurrence of the Executive Committee of the Medical School, I am pleased to recommend the appointment of Pierre A. Coulombe, Ph.D. as the G. Carl Huber Professor of Developmental Biology, Medical School, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

The G. Carl Huber Professorship in Developmental Biology was established in September 2002 and is intended to support the activities of a senior academic investigator in the Department of Cell and Developmental Biology. Professor G. Carl Huber was an internationally recognized expert on the structure of the autonomic and sympathetic nervous system. He held an appointment as a professor of anatomy and histology at the University of Michigan from 1887-1934. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Dr. Coulombe received his Ph.D. in pharmacology from the Université de Montréal in 1987. He completed a fellowship at that institution in anatomy and a fellowship in molecular genetics and cell biology at the University of Chicago. Dr. Coulombe was appointed as an assistant professor at Johns Hopkins University in 1992 in the Department of Biological Chemistry and rose through the ranks to a professor in 2002. In 2008, he was appointed as the E.V. McCollum Professor and chair of the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Dr. Coulombe joined the faculty at the University of Michigan in 2017 as the chair and a professor of the Department of Cell and Developmental Biology, with a secondary appointment in the Department of Dermatology.

Dr. Coulombe's research focuses on the regulation of cell differentiation and tissue homeostasis in complex epithelia such as skin, which he studies from the perspective of keratin intermediate filament genes and proteins. Through this research it was discovered that keratins impact the survival, growth, and architecture of keratinocytes in skin epithelia, and that such contributions can be important during wound repair, in the lifelong growth cycle of hair follicles and in the context of cancer, psoriasis, and related diseases. He currently is assessing whether targeting select keratin expression could be beneficial in the setting of chronic diseases. Dr. Coulombe has been well-funded for his research from the NIH. He has published more than 140 peer-reviewed publications, one book, and holds one patent.

Dr. Coulombe is an outstanding candidate for this professorship as an internationally recognized researcher in his field. I am, therefore, pleased to recommend the appointment of Pierre A. With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Peter Ho Davies as the Charles Baxter Collegiate Professor of English Language and Literature, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office and was named as the Charles Baxter Collegiate Professorship in English Language and Literature in July 2017. Charles M. Baxter was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1987 through 1999. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Davies is a prolific and prize-winning novelist, short story writer, and essayist. He has taught in the department's creative writing program since his arrival at the University of Michigan as an assistant professor in 1999. He has published four books, including two acclaimed novels and two collections of widely anthologized short stories. His writings have won five major fiction awards, appeared in three annual editions of Best American Short Stories, and have led to his selection for national fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and twice from the National Endowment for the Arts. Professor Davies' wide-ranging and exemplary contributions have been recognized in a Rackham Master's Mentoring Award, a Faculty Recognition Award, and a faculty fellowship from the Institute for the Humanities. His latest novel, The Fortunes, examines the experiences of Chinese Americans at four distinct moments in US history, from the building of the transcontinental railroad in the 1860s and the travails of the first Chinese American film star in the Golden Age of American cinema to the murder of a Chinese American mistaken for Japanese by two xenophobic Detroit auto workers in 1982 and a Chinese American writer's vexing journey to China to adopt a baby. The Fortunes, published only this fall, has already been widely lauded, receiving starred reviews in Publishers Weekly and Booklist and praise in the pages of The Guardian, The Huffington Post, Entertainment Weekly, The Los Angeles Times, and innumerable other publications.

Professor Davies has taught an enormously popular contemporary novel course for undergraduate students. At the graduate level, in addition to fiction workshops, he instituted craft classes which focus on specific topics and challenges for writers. He has also mentored dozens of students who have gone on to secure book contracts and garner their own impressive list of prizes and accolades. His defining characteristic is that of tireless generosity; he not only has an exhaustive line-editing practice but engages in the much more demanding task of helping students develop clear, forceful phrasing. Professor Davies sustains this level of attention for entire manuscripts, giving novel-length projects the same line-level attention that he does for short stories and writing exercises.

Professor Davies has served the department in numerous, demanding roles, most notably as the Helen Zell Director of the MFA Program in Creative Writing from 2003 through 2006 and again as interim director in 2010. He was later appointed as the director of the Hopwood Awards Program. His leadership in shaping hiring priorities and the direction of the MFA program contributed to its having been consistently ranked as one of the top two programs in the country during the past decade. Professor Davies has been a vital voice in the program and department on issues of race and inclusion. The Writing Race initiative he began over five years ago offers students in the Helen Zell Writers Program the opportunity to think through and discuss issues of race and diversity as they emerge on the page and in writing workshops.

On the recommendation of Harry L.T. Mobley, Ph.D., the Frederick G. Novy Distinguished University Professor and Chair of the Department of Microbiology and Immunology, I am pleased to recommend the additional appointment of Daniel R. Dr. Goldstein joined the faculty at the University of Michigan in April of 2016 as a professor in the Department of Internal Medicine. Previous to that, he was on the faculty of Yale University. His research is focused on defining how activation of specific inflammatory pathways results in organ rejection after transplantation. His work has been clinically translated and has led to the development of TLR inhibition strategies in solid organ transplantation. His laboratory also examines the interplay between aging and inflammation. He has examined the efficacy of novel vaccines to protect aged hosts from influenza viral infection and novel pathways by which aging impairs immune regulation of allografts. His group has also discovered pathways by which aging induces increased inflammation in vascular smooth muscle cells and increased macrophage apoptosis, findings that may explain how aging enhances atherosclerosis.

With this additional appointment, Dr. Goldstein will be expected to contribute several lectures each year in support of the department's teaching mission. He would also provide mentoring for graduate students and post-doctoral fellows, and participate in departmental seminars. Dr. Goldstein's research expertise and teaching interests will strengthen the ties between the Department of Microbiology and Immunology and the Department of Internal Medicine and will add to the spectrum of research interactions available to the faculty, post-doctoral fellows, and graduate students in the Department of Microbiology and Immunology. With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Elizaveta Levina as the Vijayan N. Nair Collegiate Professor of Statistics, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office and was named in August 2017. Vijayan N. Nair was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1993 until his retirement in 2017. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Elizaveta Levina received her Doctorate at the University of California, Berkeley in 2002 and was appointed as an assistant professor at Michigan that same year. Professor Levina was promoted through the ranks to associate professor, with tenure, in 2009 and to professor in 2014. She has been serving in the department as the Ph.D. program director (2012-present) and as an associate chair.

Professor Levina works in the forefront of modern statistics. Her scholarly contributions to high dimensional data analysis and network data analysis are fundamental and profound with lasting impact. In recent years, there have been many important developments in this area, and Professor Levina has been one of the major contributors. Two of her well-cited papers (co-authored with P. J. Bickel in *Annals of Statistics*, 2008) have combined citations of well over 1000. Professor Levina's recent contributions to the area of network analysis are highly significant. She has played a leadership role in the collaborative research. She has also been involved in interdisciplinary work on remote sensing and Raman spectroscopy, among other areas. Her recent work in spectroscopy has developed a model that could be used to relate spectroscopic images to an outcome variable. The motivating application for the work (arising through a collaboration with researchers in the UM Department of Chemistry) is to monitor bone healing non-invasively using Raman spectroscopic images.

Professor Levina's scholarship is widely recognized in the international community. She received the 2010 Junior Noether Award from the American Statistical Association, which is the most prestigious award given to mid-career researchers in the areas of nonparametric statistics, and is given to one recipient each year. Professor Levina became an elected member of the International Statistical Institute (ISI) in 2011 as further recognition of her contributions to the field of statistics. In 2016, she was on the "Highly Cited Researchers" list from the Thomson ISI, which recognizes the leading researchers in the sciences and social sciences from around the world. In that same year, she was elected a fellow of the Institute of Mathematical Statistics (IMS) and a fellow of the American Statistical Association (ASA). A fellowship in either organization is a great honor. Professor Levina's research has been continuously funded by the National Science Foundation. In 2016, she also received a sole principal investigator grant from the Office of Naval Research to study coherent networks. For her methodological work, her level of external funding is admirable. She works with other scientists at Michigan and actively participates in MIDAS activities. She is well sought after as a collaborator on campus.

Professor Levina has taught a wide range of courses and has had a significant impact on many undergraduate and graduate students in Michigan. She is always highly organized and well prepared, and is constantly modernizing the curriculum. In recent years, she taught STATS 503 "Applied Multivariate Analysis," which is among the most challenging courses to teach due to the diverse student backgrounds. Nonetheless, she received higher than the average scores. In recent years, she developed a course for Ph.D.s in statistics with a focus on professional writing and communications. In a friendly and encouraging way, she tailors her class to the students and helps them hone their skills in preparing research papers, proposals, and necessary documents for job searches. Students greatly appreciate this class.

Professor Levina has been the director of Ph.D. programs in the Department of Statistics for several years. She led its recruitment efforts and improved the quality and diversity of incoming students. She led departmental efforts to enhance the Ph.D. program by introducing new sequences in computational methods and to revamp the qualifying exams. She advises all the Ph.D. students in their first one or two years to make sure they make the necessary progress in course work and find their theses advisors. She is passionate and meticulous in her advising. Professor Levina's work in student mentoring is simply outstanding. She has been extremely successful in graduating many of her own Ph.D. students and has placed a number of them in top statistics programs across the country. Several of her students have won Best Student Paper awards from the American Statistical Association and in other student paper competitions. She is among the most sought-after thesis advisor in the department and is currently advising four students.

Professor Levina's service to the profession is greatly appreciated by her peers. She was elected to the Council of the Institute of Mathematical Statistics (IMS) (2016-2019), which is the governing body of the society. She served or is serving on the editorial boards of several major journals in statistics, including *Annals of Statistics*, the flagship journal of the IMS, and *Statistica Sinica*, the flagship journal of the International Chinese Statistical Association. The editors of those journals have raved about how valuable Professor Levina's editorial work has been. In recent years, she served on several National Science Foundation (NSF) review panels, and as a

reviewer for other federal funding agencies, including the National Security Agency and the Army Research Office.

She plays a very important role in the department overseeing the Qualifying Review Examinations for Ph.D. students and chairing the Ph.D. Admissions Committee. Under her leadership, the Statistics Ph.D. program has improved in significant ways on quality and diversity. She led the efforts as the principal investigator to apply to the NSF for a Research Training Group (RTG) grant in complex data analysis. The grant application received very positive reviews, and the cognizant NSF Program Officer has recommended full funding of the proposal at 2.5 million dollars. The program is expected to start in fall 2017. For the first time, the RTG will enable the department to provide vertical integration in education and mentoring, from undergraduate students to post-doctoral scholars.

Professor Ruetsche is a world-leading philosopher of physics and an important contributor to feminist philosophy of science. She is an outstanding teacher. She was a very successful departmental chair and she has done more than any other colleague to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in the department, university, and profession.

Professor Ruetsche is among the top four or five philosophers of physics in the world. Her book, Interpreting Quantum Theories (Oxford University Press), won the 2013 Lakatos Award, the highest international award in philosophy of science. She regularly publishes in *Philosophy of Science*, which is the leading journal in this research area in the world. Her research essays are considered required reading for graduate students. Professor Ruetsche is in international demand as a speaker, having addressed audiences in Canada, China, France, Greece, Israel, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom, as well as leading venues in the U.S. Her current book project, The Physics of Ignorance (forthcoming from Oxford University Press), is further developing the argument of her first book, showing that realist interpretations of these theories are tied, not just to our local applications, but to the facts of our own ignorance! Professor Ruetsche has also made distinguished, well-placed contributions to feminist philosophy of science, including "Contingent Natures and Virtuous Knowers" (with R. Kukla) and "Virtue and

Contingent History." Her work is a model of how feminist insights can inform ideas about scientific justification, and is considered a "must read" in this subfield.

Professor Ruetsche is an excellent teacher with evaluations superior to colleagues teaching the same or comparable courses. Students rate her highly for knowledge, clarity, enthusiasm, and respect for students. She frequently meets with students outside of class to help them understand material and she makes vital contributions to the department's teaching mission. In addition to her yeoman service teaching introductory logic, Professor Ruetsche also teaches feminist philosophy and ancient philosophy. She has repeatedly stepped up to teach courses when no one else wanted to, even as acting chair of the department. Professor Ruetsche has created two new courses: "Science and Gender," a pioneering exploration of feminist philosophy of science, and "Worldview of Modern Science," an exploration of what a scientific worldview is in the context of the history of several scientific revolutions. These courses critically engage the interactions of politics with science. Although she specializes in the smallest, most technically difficult subfield of philosophy, Professor Ruetsche has served on six dissertation committees since her appointment in 2008.

Professor Solomon received the B.S. degree in chemical engineering from the University of Wisconsin at Madison in 1990, and the Ph.D. degree in chemical engineering from the University of California at Berkeley in 1996. He was a Rotary Foundation International Fellow in economics at the Université d'Aix-Marseille II from 1990-1991. From 1996-1997, he was a post-doctoral research fellow at the University of Melbourne. He joined the University of Michigan in 1997 as an assistant professor in the Department of Chemical Engineering. He was a Dow Corning Assistant Professor from 2000-2003 and rose through the ranks to professor in 2009. He has received numerous faculty awards including the UM's Henry Russel Award in 2003 and Faculty Recognition Award in 2008, the College of Engineering's Education Excellence Award in 2010, and in 2016 he was elected a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Professor Solomon served as the associate dean for academic programs and initiatives in the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies from 2013-2017. In 2015, he was selected as a fellow in the CIC Academic Leadership Program.

Professor Solomon's research interests are in the area of complex fluids – soft materials with properties intermediate between fluids and solids. His research group has developed and applied 3D confocal microscopy methods to study the soft matter phenomena of self-assembly, gelation, and the biomechanics of bacterial biofilms. His work has also included discovery of a universal scaling for polymer scission in turbulence that identifies the limits that scission imposes on turbulent drag reduction. Other research interests have included the rheology of polymer nanocomposites, the microrheology of complex fluids and the microfluidic synthesis of

anisotropic particles. Professor Solomon has over 100 articles in refereed publications and has delivered numerous invited and keynote presentations world-wide. His service to the profession includes AIChE representative to the Programming Committee for the 2018 International Congress of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, elected member-at-large on the executive committee of the Society of Rheology, editorial board member of *Rheologica Acta*. He is a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, the American Chemical Society, the American Physical Society, the Society of Rheology and the American Society for Engineering Education.

Professor Solomon's teaching interests have included development of undergraduate courses in polymer science and engineering, molecular engineering, and chemical engineering process economics as well as graduate electives in nano and colloidal assembly and light scattering. He has received the NSF CAREER award, 3M's non-Tenured Faculty award, and the 2011 Soft Matter Lectureship from the Royal Society of Chemistry's journal *Soft Matter*. He has mentored six post-doctoral fellows, 37 doctoral students, and 52 undergraduate research students in the College of Engineering. He has also served on many university committees. He is a member of the faculty advisory board of RELATE, a community engagement program designed to improve dialogue between researchers and various public audiences. From 2015-2016, he was a member of the College of Engineering Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Strategic Planning Subcommittee for graduate students and post-doctoral fellows, and he has served as a member of the ADVANCE College of Engineering Advisory Committee.

With the endorsement of the Executive Committee of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, we are pleased to recommend the appointment of Nils G. Walter as the Francis S. Collins Collegiate Professor of Chemistry, Biophysics, and Biological Chemistry, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, for a five-year renewable term, effective September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2022.

This professorship was established through the Provost Office and was named in July 2017. Francis S. Collins was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1984 to 2003. A stipend funded from college resources will accompany this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Professor Walter is a biophysical chemist who is interested in how the structure of biomolecules results in their functions. He has established a highly visible research program pioneering the use of single-molecule experimental and computational techniques to understand the structure, function, and dynamics of RNA both in vitro and in human cells. His research activity and reputation have been growing consistently throughout his years at the University of Michigan. His outstanding scholarship has resulted in 125 research publications and reviews. Professor Walter's citations have an h-index of 39 and many of these publications are in high-impact journals such as *Science*, *Nature*, and *Cell*. He has received international recognition in both the RNA and biophysics communities; he has received significant external awards including the Camille Dreyfus Teacher Scholar Award in 2004, election as a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2011, the Alumnus of the Year award from the Sherbrooke RiboClub, the Jean Dreyfus Boissevain Lectureship from Trinity University in 2015, and the RNA Society's Mid-Career Award in 2017. Professor Walter has consistently been in the top five to ten percent for department funding and has raised a remarkable \$1.5 million in direct costs for his research this calendar year. This funding reflects the significance and appreciation of his work by the community.

Professor Walter is a dedicated teacher who works hard to connect with his students at all levels in all contexts while developing courses that meet needs based on our changing demographics and new science. The department has seen large growth in majors since introducing the "biomolecular science" major and this growth has required the addition of new bio-related courses and enrollment

pressure on these courses. Professor Walter's teaching is both organized and creative with extensive use of real-world examples to connect with students. In addition to teaching upper-level undergraduate biochemistry series, he was also instrumental in designing the curriculum and teaching of a new course in "Nucleic Acids Biochemistry" in collaboration with two other chemistry faculty. This course filled an important gap in the graduate curriculum for students in chemistry and biology-related programs in both the Medical School and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. Professor Walter has mentored over 60 undergraduate research students, many of whom have gone on to graduate school at Stanford, and the University of California at San Francisco and at Irvine, among others. One undergraduate student went on to become an instructor in pediatrics at Harvard Medical School.

Professor Walter has been active in faculty recruiting and mentoring, having served on multiple committees for these roles. He is passionate about recruiting graduate students from diverse backgrounds and since founding M-CORE, the population of graduate students from underrepresented groups has increased dramatically. Professor Walter's efforts to improve diversity have been recognized with the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts' Imes and Moore Faculty Award and the University's Harold R. Johnson Diversity Service Award. He has also been a driving force in improving research infrastructure; he led the effort to bring single-molecule detection, previously restricted only to specialized labs, to the level of a fee-for-service with the founding of the Single Molecule Analysis in Real-Time (SMART) Center for which he raised a Major Research Instrumentation grant from the National Science Foundation. Professor Walter is also leading an effort to create a University of Michigan Center for RNA Biomedicine, serves as co-director of the Microfluidics Training Program, and is associate director of the University of Michigan Post-baccalaureate Research Education Program.

This professorship is being established through the generosity of the Indian Trail Charitable Foundation and the family of Bertram Askwith. It is intended to support a faculty member in the Food Allergy Center who focuses on food allergy research. The appointment period may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Bertram Askwith was born in 1911 in Battle Creek, Michigan. He was an economics student at the University of Michigan with a minor in journalism and served as the editor of the student newspaper, *The Michigan Daily*. In response to the New York Central Railroad strike in the fall of 1928, Mr. Askwith rented a bus and sold tickets for the ride from Ann Arbor to New York for students trying to return home. This set him on a lifelong professional path. He shifted his business to New York City after graduation in 1931, and began Campus Coach Lines. In 1986, Bertram Askwith started the Indian Trail Charitable Foundation with his daughter, Patricia Kenner.

Bert Askwith supported many programs within the University of Michigan, including serving as the vice chair of the Michigan Difference Campaign from 2000-2008. He established the Askwith Food Allergy Fund at the Mary H. Weiser Food Allergy Center, the Mary Sue Coleman Endowed Fund for the Raoul Wallenberg Fellowship, the Benny Friedman Fellowship in Sports, and the Livingston Awards for Young Journalists. Mr. Askwith helped create multiple spaces for the purpose of casual collaboration, relaxation and study, in the Shapiro Undergraduate Library. Bertram Askwith passed away in 2015 at the age of 104.

Bertram Askwith was inspired by his grandson who lives with a severe food allergy to create the Askwith Fund for Innovation in Asthma and Allergy Management in the Center for Managing Chronic Disease at the School of Public Health. This professorship will honor his contributions and commitment to the University of Michigan. I am pleased, therefore, to recommend the establishment of the Askwith Research Professorship in Food Allergy, Medical School, effective September 1, 2017.

Carol T. Mowbray attended Tufts University and graduated with a B.S. degree in 1970 and a M.S. in 1971. She earned her Ph.D. degree in developmental psychology from the University of Michigan in 1975. She joined the University of Michigan faculty in 1994 as an associate professor and was promoted to professor in 2000. From 1996-2001, she was the associate dean for research at the School of Social Work and from 2003 until her death, she was a co-director of the school's Center for Poverty, Risk and Mental Health.

Professor Mowbray was a prolific author, contributing more than 130 scientific articles, chapters, and books. The recipient of numerous awards, she was honored as the 2005 recipient of the American Psychological Association's Harold Hildreth Award, given annually to a senior professional whose career and accomplishments embody the highest principles of public service. The U.S. Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association also honored her by renaming its Early Career Research Award the Carol T. Mowbray Award. Professor Mowbray's work continues to be at the forefront in identifying psychosocial and mental health services correlates of illness and recovery. Her work laid the groundwork for the development of early interventions, treatment, and rehabilitation for adults with serious mental illness diagnoses. Professor Mowbray's prodigious service to state, national and professional organizations promoting psychosocial rehabilitation, advocacy for mental health, and program evaluation is nothing short of astonishing.

A distinguished faculty member will be nominated to receive this honor. The initial term of the appointment will be for five years with the possibility of renewal

The School of Social Work is pleased to recommend the renaming of an existing unendowed collegiate professorship from the Rose C. Gibson Collegiate Professorship in Social Work to the Rosemary A. Sarri Professorship in Social Work, School of Social Work, effective September 1, 2017.

This professorship was established through the Provost's Office and was names the Rose C. Gibson Professorship in Social Work in June 2015. Rosemary A. Sarri was one of the first graduates of the Joint Ph.D. Program in Social Work and the Social Sciences. She was a faculty member at the University of Michigan from 1962 through 1993. A stipend funded by school resources will accompany this professorship. Appointments to this professorship may be up to five years and may be renewed.

Rosemary A. Sarri attended the University of Minnesota and graduated with her B.A. in 1946 and her M.S.W. in 1955. She earned her Ph.D. degree in social work and sociology from the University of Michigan in 1962. She joined the University of Michigan faculty in 1962 as an assistant professor, was promoted to associate professor in 1964 and to professor in 1970. She served as a faculty associate with the Institute for Social Research from 1979 through 1993. Professor Sarri served as the M.S.W. admissions director from 1960 through 1967, as the M.S.W. program director from 1967 to 1970, and as the Joint Ph.D. program director from 1970 through 1975.

Scholars and professional practitioners the world over consider Professor Sarri to be a leading expert in the areas of child/family welfare policy and juvenile and criminal justice systems. She collaborated with universities in Australia and Korea on the topics of child welfare and adoption, and was appointed by the minister of education to the Russian Social Welfare Commission to help develop educational standards and curriculum guidelines for social work education programs in Russia.

The characteristic of Professor Sarri, which makes her stand apart from her academic colleagues, is that she does not merely "let the research findings speak for themselves," she is insistent that these research messages be heard by legislators, executive policy makers, and organizational leaders, who can then act on behalf of the marginalized populations. She does not limit her endeavors to the academy and the "ivory tower;" and she is not afraid to encounter firsthand the women and girls from whom she gathers data and on whose behalf she speaks. She is "in the trenches," going into the women's prisons, the juvenile detention facilities, and the inner city social agencies that serve teen prostitutes. From 1991 to 1999, Rosemary A. Sarri was the federal monitor for a Consent Decree related to conditions in the Scott Facility, a women's correctional institution in Metropolitan Detroit, arising out of a Federal Court case, Glover v Johnson. Professor Sarri is an inspirational teacher, mentor and social researcher who devoted her career to the improvement of social welfare systems.

Vijayan N. Nair earned his Bachelor of Economics with first class honors at the University of Malaya in 1972 and completed his Doctorate at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1978. Professor Nair began his professional career as a member of the technical staff in the Operations Research Center of Bell Laboratories in New Jersey and was promoted to research supervisor in 1981. He joined the faculty at the University of Michigan as a professor of statistics, with tenure, and professor of industrial and operations engineering, without tenure, in 1993. He was the Donald A. Darling Collegiate Professor of Statistics from 2002 until his retirement in 2017 and he served as the chair of the Department of Statistics for twelve years.

Professor Nair is an outstanding researcher who has made significant and pioneering contributions in theory, methodology, and substantive applications. He is widely viewed as one of the top researchers internationally in industrial and engineering statistics, particularly in the areas of experimental and survey design and analysis. His high standing, his leadership and impact on the profession, and his dedicated service are praised by leading scholars. His work is impressive in the impact it has had, especially in several areas of engineering. Professor Nair has published on statistical methodology, reliability and survival analysis, design of experiments, and engineering statistics. He is a former president of the International Statistical Institute and of the International Society for Business and Industrial Statistics. He is an elected fellow of leading

professional societies: American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Statistical Association, American Society for Quality, and Institute for Mathematical Statistics. He is also a former editor of several journals and has chaired numerous committee, including the Board of Trustees of the National Institute of Statistical Sciences.

Professor Nair's contributions to the university and the college are equally outstanding and impressive. The Department of Statistics' rapid rise in quality and reputation is widely recognized and applauded in the statistics profession. As its chair and leader, Professor Nair deserved more credit than any other single individual. In spite of the administrative burden, he did more than his share of thesis supervision.
