Subject: Report of Faculty Retirement

Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir

N. Reed Dunnick, M.D., professor of radiology in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on August 31, 2025.

Professor Dunnick received his Bachelor of Science degree from Purdue University (1965) and his Doctor of Medicine degree from Cornell University (1969). After two clinical years at the University of Rochester, he joined the Public Health Service stationed at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) in Bethesda, Maryland. Professor Dunnick took his residency in radiology at Stanford University before returning to the NIH as a staff associate. His first faculty appointment was as an associate professor at Duke University. In 1992, he came to the University of Michigan to serve as a professor and chair of the Department of Radiology. In 1997, he became the Fred Jenner Hodges Professor of Radiology, a title he held until 2018.

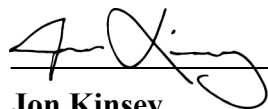
Dr. Dunnick's research focused on imaging and image-guided intervention in the genitourinary tract. He was the first to perform many interventional techniques at the NIH and led the percutaneous nephrostolithotomy effort at Duke University. He published more than 300 scientific papers, 62 book chapters and wrote 10 textbooks. His popular *Textbook of Uroradiology* had six editions. He served on the editorial boards of more than 12 radiology journals, and in 2017 became editor-in-chief of *Academic Radiology*.

An exceptional leader, Dr. Dunnick served as president of the Academy of Radiology Research, the American Board of Radiology, the American Roentgen Ray Society, the Association of University Radiologists, the Radiological Society of North America, the Radiology Research Alliance, the Society of Chairs of Academic Radiology Departments, the Society of Computed Body Tomography, and the Society of Uroradiology.

Dr. Dunnick served on more than 45 committees at the University of Michigan, including three terms on the Medical School Executive Board. He served as chair of the Faculty Salary Structure Task Force, the Faculty Office Planning Committee, and the Senate Assembly Advisory Committee on Financial Affairs.

The Regents now salute this distinguished scholar, educator, and leader by naming **N. Reed Dunnick, professor emeritus of radiology**.
