**Subject: Report of Faculty Retirement**

**Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir**

**Daniel F. Hayes, M.D., FASCO, FACP**, Stuart B. Padnos Professor of Breast Cancer Research and professor of internal medicine in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on September 30, 2025.

Dr. Hayes received his A.B. (1974), and M.S. (biochemistry, 1977) degrees from Indiana University and his M.D. degree from Indiana University School of Medicine (1979). He served an internal medicine residency at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center, Dallas, Texas (1979-1982) and a fellowship in medical oncology at the Dana Farber Cancer Institute, Brigham and Women's Hospital, Harvard Medical School (1982-1985), where he remained on faculty from 1985-1996. He was an associate professor at Georgetown University Medical Center (1996–2001). He joined the UM Medical School faculty in July 2001 as professor of internal medicine. He was the inaugural Stuart B. Padnos Professor of Breast Cancer Research in 2008. He was the clinical director of the Breast Oncology Program in the Cancer Center (2001-2017).

Dr. Hayes has conducted local, national and international studies that have changed the practice of breast cancer, particularly in the field of tumor biomarker tests. He has been active in several organizations, especially the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO), to generate worldwide clinical practice guidelines and policies. He has authored or co-authored more than 275 peer-reviewed papers, 28 practice guidelines, and more than 195 educationally relevant publications. He has co-edited eight textbooks and served as associate editor for two journals. He has served as the Breast Cancer Section editor for the electronic textbook, *UpToDate*. He has hosted the podcast "Pioneers in Oncology," produced by the *Journal of Clinical Oncology*, and he served on the board of directors (2011-2014) and a three-year term as president (2015-2018) of ASCO.

He has won the UM Medical School Dean's Outstanding Clinician Award and the Division of Hematology/Oncology's Teacher of the Year, the Stephen Weiss Research Award, and the Ginsberg Mentoring Award. He has received ASCO's Gianna Bonadonna Breast Cancer (2007) and the Allen Lichter Visionary Leadership Awards (2021), the Komen Brinker Award for Scientific Distinction (2023), and was named a Distinguished Alumnus from the Indiana University Medical School (2024). He is an elected member of the Association of American Physicians and the American Clinical and Climatological Association.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **Daniel F. Hayes, professor emeritus of internal medicine**.
