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Subject: Central Student Government (CSG) Regent Report September 2025

Interim President Grasso, Members of the Board of Regents, and Executive Officers of the University, it is my pleasure to submit the following report.

As we enter the Fifth month of the Central Student Government's 15th Session, the Executive, Assembly, and Judiciary have been hard at work advancing our collective commitment to visibility, accessibility, and community engagement. We maintain our belief in Student Government as the conduit to transformative change, advocacy, and support. This mission will serve as our guide throughout the next semester of serving, representing, and supporting our students.

Over the course of Welcome Week and the beginning of the academic year, our administration has proudly hosted and supported a number of events designed to bring students together and highlight campus resources. CSG participated in *Festifall* on both Central and North Campuses, where we connected with hundreds of students interested in becoming involved in Student Government. Additionally, at Festifall, students had an opportunity to share their ideas and concerns for where their student government can better address their needs—these ideas and concerns will serve as a roadmap for our administration's policy directives throughout the year. We also hosted *Pie-a-Representative*, a lighthearted event held outside Joe's Pizza, where students had the opportunity to engage with their representatives in a memorable and approachable way, while learning more about CSG, our goals, our services, and how students can stay involved. To finish-off the first week of classes, we co-sponsored *Pride Outside*, alongside the Spectrum Center, to bring students an affirming event designed to celebrate and welcome LGBTQ+ students and allies, and reinforced our administration's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion.

CSG hosted its own Welcome Week series featuring a town hall co-sponsored with SACUA and AAUP, a campus-wide scavenger hunt, and a Michigan trivia night. We were also proud to partner with MESA and the Blevins Scholars to support their Welcome Week programs and uplift diverse communities. Shortly thereafter, the Lights of Legacy Lantern Festival was held in Nichols Arboretum on September 8, in recognition of Suicide Prevention Month.

On September 12, CSG partnered with E-Hour to host the first installment of our Speaker Series, which launched what will become a monthly program highlighting issues tied to our policy advocacy. We look forward to building on this collaboration and connecting with the Board of Regents to establish a sustained platform for elevating student dialogue and perspectives. In addition, CSG played a central role in Parent and Family Weekend, both by hosting a Family picnic outside East Hall and by presenting at the Parent-Family Leadership Council Meeting.

Looking ahead, we are eager to continue this momentum of student-facing programming through upcoming events including our virtual "Know Your Rights" session, a tailgate with pizza and water to help mitigate risk prior to the Zach Bryan concert, and participation in signature campus events such as Harvest Fest and Earth Fest. Each of these initiatives reflects our ongoing commitment to engaging students, amplifying their voices, and strengthening their connection to the University.

A cornerstone of our agenda is deepening the connection between students and the University's governance to bridge the divides present between students, the Board of Regents, and University Administration. To this end, we would like to extend an open invitation to join us at a University Council meeting, where Unit Student Governments convene to advance student-facing initiatives and share priorities across campus. In addition, we welcome you to attend one of our CSG-sponsored events, such as *Dinners with CSG*, which create opportunities for informal conversation between student leaders and administrators. These spaces embody our commitment to amplifying student voices and fostering collaborative decision-making, ensuring that the perspectives of students remain central to the University's direction.

Supporting student organizations remains one of the most important ways that CSG empowers campus life. The Student Organization Funding Committee (SOFC) and the Wolverine Consulting Group (WCG) have already disbursed approximately \$71,724.62 over the Spring and Summer semesters, providing critical support to a diverse range of student organizations. These funds have made an immediate impact by expanding accessibility, fostering inclusion, and enabling student-led programming that enriches the Michigan experience. We look forward to the impact that Student Organization funding will have on the students' Michigan experience this Fall.

On the national stage, the University of Michigan continues to demonstrate leadership through student government. In August, CSG attended the Association of Big Ten Students (ABTS) Summer Conference, hosted by the University of Nebraska, where our delegation of both Executive and Assembly representatives collaborated with peers from across the conference to exchange ideas and strengthen collective advocacy. This fall, we are honored to be hosting the ABTS Conference in Ann Arbor, positioning Michigan at the center of ongoing conversations about student governance throughout unprecedented times in higher education. We are also proud to announce that two members of our Executive Committee were elected to serve on the ABTS Executive Board, ensuring that our institution plays a leading role in shaping the direction and priorities of student government across the Big Ten.

Looking ahead, we are exploring the creation of an ex-officio position on the Assembly for military-affiliated students, to further help advance our support of the establishment of a Veterans Center on campus, to provide consistent representation for this important community, and further strengthen our commitment to inclusivity within student government. We are also eager to continue building on our early momentum this semester through the Speaker Series, upcoming campus programs, and our work with peer institutions across the Big Ten.

We are deeply grateful for the collaboration and support we have received thus far from University leadership and partners across campus. Together, we can ensure that student voices remain at the center of decision-making and that Michigan continues to set the standard for student governance. We look forward to maintaining this partnership and to a successful year ahead.

Brief Introductions:

- **Intended VP Imaan Rao (she/her)** is a senior majoring in Health & Human Services on the pre-med track and serves as President of Red Cross at UM-Dearborn. She brings strong experience in service, preparedness, and student engagement, and will help lead SG's outreach and operations this year.

Ongoing initiatives:

We are preparing civic education programming related to the Constitution, offering brief and accessible opportunities for students to engage with foundational rights, civic responsibilities, and the document's contemporary relevance. We are also expanding mock-exam support (LSAT, MCAT, DAT, GRE, and others) to provide structured practice environments, guided study resources, and peer support, enabling students to prepare more effectively. Building on the strong interest from Go Blue Bash, we are organizing consistent student touchpoints—such as drop-in coffee hours and quick-response channels—so students can share their feedback and join committees. We expect robust participation this year as many students are eager to help one another and contribute to SG's work. Additionally, we are coordinating sustainability and leadership development opportunities, streamlining onboarding for new volunteers, and collaborating with campus partners to co-host dialogues, study sessions, and service activities throughout the term.
