President Grasso, members of the Board of Regents, and Executive Officers of the University, it is my pleasure to submit the following report on behalf of the University of Michigan Ann Arbor's Central Student Government (CSG):

Beginning of the Year CSG Programming and Initiatives

Fall Student Organization Funding Dispersal

On September 8th, 2026, CSG's Assembly passed the Fall 2026 consolidated budget, allocating \$329,671.48 toward student organizations – 56.92% of the Fall budget. This is the largest percentage of the budget to be allocated toward student organizations in the last five years. The fall funding wave began on September 13th.

Beginning of School Year Festivities

As the beginning of the school year has arrived, CSG has been actively engaged with students of all backgrounds and interests. In the first three weeks of the school year alone, CSG has already interacted with many students through our numerous tabling initiatives at North Campus and Central Campus Festifall, Black welcome week, the Go Blue Mix, the Resident Halls Association After Class Bash, and the University Career Center's job and internship fair. Beyond tabling, CSG's programming team has hosted a beginning of the year movie night, co-sponsored Pride Outside, and will soon be hosting a picnic on the diag and a pickleball tournament which is at maximum capacity.

Cross Campus Collaboration

CSG prides itself on representing the incredible reputation of the University of Michigan on the national stage, as evidenced by its continued involvement in the Association of Big Ten Schools (ABTS), and its extensive involvement in the creation of the United Michigan Student Governments (UMSG). Both ABTS and UMSG serve as avenues through which CSG can not only inform fellow universities (through their student governments) of Michigan's successful initiatives, but it also serves as an opportunity for CSG, and the university by extension, to learn about the successful initiatives of other campuses. It is for these reasons that CSG attended the ABTS Fall Conference, which was hosted at the University of Minnesota. At this conference, CSG had the opportunity to support peer institutions by informing them and assisting them in the proposal of programs similar to those at the University of Michigan – such as the Maize and Blue Cupboard and the creation of multicultural centers. CSG similarly

came away from the conference with ideas inspired by peer institutions – the most notable being to use CSG as a means of informing students of changes in government policy, and advocating for an increase in lighting around campus and in major pedestrian areas as a means of maximizing safety and line of sight.
