Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir

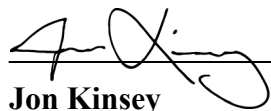
Andrew R. Barnosky, D.O., M.P.H., clinical professor of emergency medicine and clinical professor of anatomical sciences, in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on December 31, 2025.

Dr. Barnosky completed undergraduate degrees at Eastern Michigan University (B.S., 1973) and Northeast Missouri State University (B.S., 1974). He completed his medical degree (D.O., 1978) at the A. T. Still University of Health Sciences/Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Missouri, and postgraduate training (general medicine, 1979) at Riverside Hospital, Trenton, Michigan, followed by the practice pathway in emergency medicine (1982-87) at Seaway Hospital and Henry Ford Wyandotte Hospital. He received a Master of Public Health degree from the Harvard School of Public Health (1994) and was a visiting clinical scholar in end-of-life care at Churchill Hospital and Michael Sobell House, Oxford, UK (2006). Dr. Barnosky joined the University of Michigan faculty in 1998 as a clinical assistant professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine. He was promoted to clinical associate professor in 2008, and clinical professor 2014. He held additional faculty appointments in the Division of Anatomical Sciences and the Department of Medical Education. Throughout his career he has been recognized as an excellent clinician and a valued mentor and role model to medical students and residents.

Dr. Barnosky's career has been a blend of patient care and teaching anatomy and bioethics. He was the chair of the Adult Ethics Committee (1998-2014) and the director of the Division of Anatomical Sciences (2018-2021). He was the inaugural faculty advisor of the Gold Humanism Honor Society (2017) and was inducted into the League of Educational Excellence (2013). He received the Kaiser Permanente Award for Excellence in Teaching in the Clinical Sciences (2014), the Lifetime Achievement Award in Medical Education (2018), and the Society of Academic Emergency Medicine's Arnold P. Gold Foundation Humanism in Medicine Award (2018). A medical student graduation award has been named in his honor. Dr. Barnosky's scholarly activities have been focused on medical ethics and emergency medicine.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **Andrew R. Barnosky, clinical professor emeritus of emergency medicine and clinical professor emeritus of anatomical sciences.**
